Death Yesterday At Montague Of Mr. L. H. Coffin

The sudden death of Luther H. Coffin occurred at his home in Montague at approximately 5:30 last evening.

The late Mr. Coffin, who was in his 71st year, was born in Charlottetown, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Henry Coffin. In his early childhood he attended West Kent School and later spent two years at Prince of Wales College. He then entered the Merchants Bank of P. E. I. with which he was associated for three years when it was sold out to the Canadian Bank of Commerce. Mr. Coffin continued to serve at this bank at Charlottetown before being transferred to Montague, about 1911. He retired in 1939 and continued to live in Montague for a number of years before moving to Charlottetown, where he resided during the past several years. He returned to his home in Montague this year.

The deceased took an active interest in all civic affairs, which had for their purpose the betterment of the community. He was a faithful member of Trinity United Church, Montague; a past Noble Grand of Hillside Lodge No. 22, I. O. O. F., and a chartered member of the Montague Curling Club.

Besides his widow, nee Agnes Sinclair of Charlottetown, he leaves to mourn four daughters, Marie (Mrs. James Dewar, Brudenell); Frances (Mrs. C. A. Shaw, Montague); Margaret (Mrs. Ralph Douglas, Montreal); and Enid (Mrs. John Dewis, West Advocate, N.S.); three sons, Gordon, manager of the Bank of Commerce at Alberton; Eric in Charlottetown, and Douglas in Montague.

Funeral arrangements were not completed at time of writing. The sympathy of the entire community is extended to the family in their sad bereavement.

the softest suede texture found in any glad. The petal substance reminds one of chamomile-skin. This is a magnificent flower. Manchu is another origination of Beatrice Palmer and it blooms in eighty days. It is a yellow flushed pink with a burst of vivid red in the throat and it is very oriental looking. There were three glads of yellow and buff with striking "orchid throats" of scarlet or red. Paeolus, Sparks and Manchu. All three were blooming in this garden and the flowers were so beautiful that I wished to have some of each one. Paeolus won first prize at the Provincial Exhibition.

October Sunshine is as lovely as its name. It is a light orange in color and reminds you of a day in Indian Summer when a golden haze hangs over the silent landscape and Nature is in one of her relaxed moods. It is a glad that is plain-petalled and softly recurved. Athlonie is a beautiful shell pink and Ladronie another Palmer glad with long willow spikes that are ideal for basket work in salmon and gold. Margaret Rose is another glad that is suitable for decoration.

Dusty Miller is one of the best flowers of dusty pink in the smoky class, a reddish mark and cream pencillings enliven the throat.

Algoma Lavender Prince, Sparks, Dawn Glow and Salmann's Glory were other beautiful glads noted in this wonderful garden.

Magistrate's Court At Georgetown

The regular weekly sitting of the Magistrate's Court was held in the Court House in Georgetown on Thursday, August 30th with Stipendiary Magistrate for King's County, Joseph W. MacDonald, K. C., presiding.

A Murray River resident pleaded guilty to unlawfully operating a motor vehicle on the highway in excess of 5,000 lbs., at a speed greater than 30 miles per hour. He was fined \$100 and costs or 10 days in jail.

A resident of Seal River pleaded guilty to having liquor in his possession in a place other than his residence and was fined \$200 and costs or 30 days in jail. A Mitchell River resident charged with unlawfully consuming intoxicating liquor in a public place, pleaded guilty and was fined \$200 and costs or 30 days in jail.

A Georgetown resident had a plea of guilty entered on his behalf to a charge of having intoxicating liquor in his possession not purchased at a Vendor. He was fined \$25.00 and costs or 30 days in jail. Court was adjourned for one week.
