Continued from page 1 or cars from Montreal to the Maritime Provinces every day to take care of this movement. The latest figures I have before me indicate that since September 1 of this year, nearly 1,500 cars of potatoes have been shipped from Prince Edward Island as against 386 in 1951.

"This by itself is quite an accomplishment and I feel confident that the Canadian National Railways will be able to take care of all the requirements of the potato growers during the next few months."

"It must be realized, of course, that refrigerator cars at a premium during the winter months and as most shipments of potatoes from Prince Edward Island are destined to U. S. points, the problem is aggravated by the fact that many of the cars do not return to Canada as quickly as we would like them to."

It might add that the management of the Canadian National Railways has begun to receive delivery of some 15 cars per day of an order of 500 refrigerator cars.
