### One-Man Company Pays No Dividend

LONDON, May 15th.—The formation of one-man companies in Canada which never declare a dividend is said to be the latest method which many English inventors in Canadian securities have adopted the British Government. Your correspondent knows of one man, the holder of two thousand shares of Canadian Pacific Railway stock who has adopted this ingenious method, which has been copied by others having investments in Canada and other Dominions or colonies. The investor in question has registered as a company in Canada under his own name, and has placed his holdings as the company's assets. All dividends paid by the railway on the stocks are placed to reserve account, and no dividend is ever declared by the company. This man has a grown family, whose members will in time inherit his holdings. By that time, it is hoped, the income tax will be reduced, and meanwhile it is not being paid.

when we voted against this, and I think it is very unfair to be asked to stand against what we have already done.  
Premier Bell: The first thing we have to do is this: My hon. friend raises a constitutional question and that will have to be decided. Mr. Hessian says that the same thing cannot be brought in during the same session after it has been voted down. The question is for the chairman to decide, whether or not the clause shall be thrown out because it has been previously brought up for consideration.  
Mr. Saunders: Of course a bill I self could not be introduced a second time, but a clause is different. This is only part of a bill.  
Mr. Hessian: A part forms the whole, you know.  
Mr. Stewart: You mean the whole contains the part.  
Mr. Hessian: Well, it's the same thing. (Laughter.)  
The Chairman in his ruling agreed with Mr. Stewart, that if a bill presented to the House was iniquitous it should not prevent certain clause of it under the cloak of which the bill might have been introduced, for coming up under another bill.

Mr. D. C. McDonald: You say a bill was introduced which was iniquitous and that some sections of it were all right, and under the cloak of these the attempt was made to get the bill into committee and I submit that that language is a reflection upon the promoter.  
The Chairman said that he had said it might be illegal, he did not intend any reflection.  
Mr. D. C. McDonald: That was the suggestion.  
The House took recess until 3 p. m.  
May 2. Afternoon Session. 3.50  
The House in committee on the Act to amend the common law procedure Act, 1873. The clauses passed.  
When the Speaker had resumed the chair and before the Chairman reported on the bill, Mr. Hessian again objected to the adoption of Clause 4, quoting Bourinot to support his contention that if a bill on its second or third reading is rejected it cannot legally be revived in the same session. If it is allowed that this section need not be struck out, then the Attorney-General might bring in his entire bill again, of which this clause formed a part. If certain sections can come in in the shape of another bill, then the whole bill can be brought in—could be brought in again, for instance, under the name of E. T. Higgs & Company. The only thing that would be necessary to change would be the name.  
The Speaker: The motion before the House is now for the adoption of the report of the committee and the only thing before the House is the adoption of this report.  
Mr. Hessian moved that the report be referred back to the committee for reconsideration of section 4.  
Mr. McArthur: Does the hon. gentleman take this to be tantamount to asking the Speaker for his ruling while I was in the chair?  
Mr. Hessian: Yes.  
Mr. Saunders: The suggestion is out of order. The motion before the House is that the report of the committee be adopted.  
Mr. Hessian: If I let that pass then I would certainly be out of order.  
Mr. Stewart: The matter has gone beyond my hon. friend now. When the chairman gave his ruling he should have made his motion for an appeal to the Speaker

The Speaker: He can't make his appeal now. The decision of the chair, since it was not disputed at the time, is final.  
Mr. Hessian: Can't it be referred back? I ask that the matter go back into committee.  
The Speaker: It has already gone through the committee and been adopted.  
Mr. Hessian: No!  
The Speaker: I am taking the report of the chair for it. It has been reported that the report was adopted and now—  
Mr. Hessian: I am taking objection to that.  
The Speaker: You can't raise the point after you have already raised it and got the ruling of the chair on it. If you handed this back into committee you would be faced with the same answer. The question is already settled.  
Premier Bell: I suppose what the hon. gentleman means is that the report of the committee be not adopted, but that it be referred back to committee of the whole House for the purpose of striking that clause out on the ground that it had no right to be inserted in the bill, having been dealt with and disposed of before. It seems to me that it is a direct appeal to the Speaker—for the first time this session.  
The Speaker: It is altogether irregular to appeal to the Speaker from the chair.  
Premier Bell: It seems to me that it is a proper place to raise the question. I don't see how he could raise it any other place.  
Mr. Stewart: I can't see for a moment as my hon. friend the Leader of the Government does. It is quite true that a motion of this kind would be in order if objection were taken to the merits of the bill itself or any clause in it. But it is now a question of jurisdiction, because he claims it is *intra vires*. That is a matter for the chairman of the committee. If he wanted to appeal to the Speaker from the chairman's decision, he should have done so right at the time. That is the practice. When he allowed the section to pass he virtually accepted the ruling of the chair and the committee then passed on to the next section.  
Mr. Hessian: I didn't accept the ruling at all. How could I appeal to the Speaker when the Speaker was not in the chair? This is the time to appeal.  
Mr. Dewar: I think we are losing valuable time over this.  
The Speaker: I would like to see my way clear in this matter. A point was raised in committee and the ruling of the chair was had upon it, and I certainly cannot decide this question now. My best judgment is that you can't go back into committee for the purpose of raising the point again.  
Mr. Hessian: I will cite your own ruling last year. A bill came before the House to amend the town of Montague Act, and there was a section in that bill objected to by the government.  
The Speaker: That was on the third reading.  
Mr. Hessian: That's the same thing. The Premier brought in a motion to strike out that section dealing with the planking of the Montague bridge.  
Mr. Stewart: And he was declared out of order.
