Dutchmen Edge Fort William 7-6 To Take 3-1 Lead In Cup Series

KITCHENER, Ont. (CP)—Kitchener Waterloo Dutchmen came from behind twice Tuesday night to defeat Fort William Beavers 7-6 in the fourth game of their best-of-seven Allan Cup final. The Dutchmen lead the series 3-1.

Behind 6-3 midway through the second period, the Eastern Canada champions reduced the margin to 6-5 before the session ended and added two more goals in a fast third period.

Defenceman Joe Schertz paced the winners with three goals—one in each period. Left-winger Charlie Brooker got the final with less than two minutes remaining in the game.

The Dutchmen thrilled the hometown crowd of 5,409 with their uphill battle. They didn't get in front until the final—and game-winning—goal.

Other Dutchmen goal-getters were Ken Laufman, with two, and Clare Martin.

For Fort William, Alex Birukow got a pair of goals and Harold Brayshaw, John Irving, Tom Kompon and Morris Saplywy each got singles.

The first period ended 3-3 and showed their best spurt midway through the second period when Birukow scored a pair of goals while his team was one man short and Saplywy fired another to boost the Beavers lead to three goals.

The Dutchmen came to life, Schertz scored from close in front and Laufman capped off a pass-play for another.

At 8:15 of the third period, Schertz carried two men on his shoulders as he struggled in to beat Martin from close to tie the game. Brooker's tie-breaker came at 18:33.

"What can you say after a comeback like that?" asked coach Bobby Bauer of the Dutchmen. "For a while I didn't think my club would ever get rolling."

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Bob Turley Pitches 5-0 Shutout As N.Y. Yanks Take Over American League Lead

(By The Associated Press)

Bullet Bob Turley, winning his third straight game of the season with a sparkling one-hitter, sent the New York Yankees into the American League lead Tuesday with a 5-0 shutout over the Chicago White Sox.

While cold and rain wiped out three-fourths of the National League schedule in the east, two other games were played in the American. Bob Lemon registered his fourth pitching victory and hit a home run to lead the Cleveland Indians to a 3-2 triumph over the Washington Nationals. A ninth inning home run by Al Kaline gave the Detroit Tigers a 3-2 victory over the Baltimore Orioles at Detroit.

In the National League, three games were postponed—Cincinnati at Brooklyn, St. Louis at Philadelphia and Chicago at Pittsburgh. The Brooklyn and Philadelphia games were rescheduled for tonight, opening date on both their schedules.

Two games were scheduled Tuesday night, one in each league. The New York Giants were host to Milwaukee in the National League. The Kansas City Athletics were host to the Boston Red Sox.

STRUCK OUT 10

Turley, central figure in the big winter trade between the Yankees and Baltimore Orioles, struck out 10 as he racked up his third victory of the season against no defeats.

It was the first one-hitter in either league. Sherman Lollar, Chicago catcher, was the only man to get a safety off Turley's deliveries. Turley walked nine but never let the game get out of hand.

A two-run double by Irv Noren sparked the Yankees' three-run rally in the first inning. Mickey Mantle's double and a single by Bill Skowron produced another and then Skowron produced the final Yankee run with a home run in the ninth.

Lemon's home run for Cleveland came in the fourth following a first inning blow by Bob Avila, scoring Al Smith ahead of him. Maurice McDermott was the losing pitcher although he went the route and gave up only five hits compared with nine off Lemon.

McFater Wins Boxing Title

TORONTO, (CP)—Alan McFater of Toronto won the Canadian welterweight boxing championship with a 12-round unanimous decision over titleholder Tony Percy of Drummondville, Que.

It was the third victory for the 24-year-old McFater after a two-year layoff. McFater weighed 145½ and Percy, who had to sweat off 1½ pounds in two hours earlier Tuesday, made the 147-pound limit.

Randy Turpin New British Light-Heavyweight Champ

LONDON (AP)—Randy Turpin, former world middleweight champion now on a comeback campaign, became the new British light heavyweight champion Tuesday night with a second-round knockout of Alex Buxton.

It was one of the strangest knockouts seen in a British ring. The referee twice warned both boxers for mauling and brawling. Then in the fifth minute of the contest Buxton went down and was counted out.

Ringside observers could not make out the punch that put Buxton out. It came just after the referee's second warning. The boxers tore into each other in a welter of swinging fists and Buxton went down.

Turpin weighed 171½ pounds, and Buxton 162½.

Ross Lowe Most Valuable AHL Player

NEW YORK, (AP)—Ross Lowe, New York Rangers forward, was named the American Hockey League's most valuable player for the 1954-55 season in the closest vote in league history.

The result of the vote gave Springfield Indians two of the league's special awards and reflected the astuteness of owner-coach Eddie Shore in transforming Lowe from a defenceman into a centre.

As a reward for winning MVP honors, Lowe will receive the Leslie Cunningham trophy and a league bonus of \$300.

Lowe edged out Pittsburgh defenceman Frank Mathers by two points, 13 to 11, in the voting.

Lowe, a native of Oshawa, Ont., played with Hershey and Buffalo in the AHL, Boston and Montreal in the National League and Victoria in the Western League, always at a defence post. Shore drafted him from Victoria last summer and installed him at centre. Lowe finished the season tied with Ken Wharram of Buffalo for second place in league scoring.

Boxer Jackson Replaced in Bout

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Promoter Herman Taylor announced Tuesday that heavyweight contender Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson has suffered a sprained ankle in training and has been replaced by Julio Mederos of Cuba as the opponent for Harold Johnson in the May 6 boxing show headliner at the arena.

Taylor said the Jackson-Johnson bout will be rescheduled here for late June.

Mederos knocked out Roland LaStarza at Miami on March 2, and in his last bout lost a close decision to heavyweight Bob Baker.

\$212,000 For Tam O'Shanter

CHICAGO (AP)—A \$212,000 purse for Tam O'Shanter's all-American and "world" golf tournaments in August was announced Tuesday by promoter George S. May.

The big plum is a \$50,000 first prize in the "world" with an accompanying potential of 100 exhibitions appearances at \$1,000 each.

A total of 218 players can place in the money in the Tam series which includes the all-American, Aug. 4-7; the international matches, Aug. 9-10; and the "World," Aug. 11-14.

Reprimand In Tennis Case

GENOA, Italy (AP)—A leading Italian Tennis Federation official said Tuesday he believed "a reprimand" is justified in the incident of tennis star Art Larsen of San Leandro, Calif., and a Genoese ballboy.

The official, Uigi Maffei, director of last week-end's international tournament here added, however, he did not think the case warranted any more serious action against the American player.

The U.S. Lawn Tennis Association temporarily banned Larsen from further international play after the incident last Saturday when the Californian batted a ball which struck 13-year-old ballboy Benito di Martino, alongside the head.

Larsen batted the ball in a fit of irritation when the ballboy failed to understand his request to get off the court.

The Italian Federation decided to take no action in the case.

Father of Modern Skiing Dies At 64

NORTH CONWAY, N.H. (AP)—Hannes Schneider, 64, long regarded as the father of modern skiing, died unexpectedly Tuesday of a heart attack at his home.

Head of the ski school here bearing his name, he developed the Arberg technique of skiing used throughout this country. It was named for the section of Austria where he was born.
