Harvest prospects are causing anxiety in some parts of England

Active preparations are going on at Woolwich for the despatch of war munitions to Egypt.

The London Times has a warning article on Chicago wheat owners, in view of the present harvest prospects.

The London, Eng., committee have sent £500 to assist the refugee Russian Jews who are in distress at Winnipeg.

The Panama Canal Company are issuing bonds for £250,000 for the purpose of purchasing the Panama Railroad.

Large quantities of freight are being sent from the United States for shipment in Montreal in consequence of the strike in New York.

Mr. M. P. Ryan has been appointed Collector of the Port of Montreal, in the place of Mr. W. B. Simpson, who has been superannuated.

The Quebec lumber market at present is dull and rather overstocked. Mr. Dobell who had a contract for supplying the Imperial Government, has now 4,000,000 feet on his hands at Quebec.

An Alexandria despatch says—The action of the Sultan in conferring the order of the Medjidie on Arabi Pasha has had a bad effect. Many disposed to oppose Arabi now regard him as the recognized executor of the Sultan's wishes.

Diplomatic circles at Washington are gossiping over an alleged insinuation letter that Martinez, Chilean Minister, wrote to Mr. Frelinghuysen just before he delivered his letters of recall. The subject of Martinez letter, it is said, was Mr. Trescott's conduct after he returned from Chili.

The Toronto Mail remarks—"And now the defeat of the Grit party is attributed to 'the French vote.' Of course it is very wrong for people of French origin to vote, but as the law stands the 'outrage' cannot be prevented. Mr. Blake should introduce a bill next session disfranchising all French-Canadians of Conservative proclivities. In this age of liberty of thought and action the introduction of such a measure would seem out of the question, but Grit precedents for such a measure can be found; the attempt to disfranchise Tories in Prince Edward Island, for instance."

In the five months ending May, British India sent to England 4,470,867 cwt. of wheat against 4,836,761 cwt. which came from the Atlantic States in the same period. The Indian wheat export has quadrupled in two years, and the best judges say it needs only a few light railways to enable North Western India to become the chief wheat exporting country in the world. Britain will doubtless encourage the new industry to the full extent of her power, for the ability of India to consume British goods is only limited by the ability to pay for them.

The art of swindling has advanced a little further. There are now, in London, artists in meat, fish, and fowl. It is their business to "touch up" inferior things till the semblance of a superior article is put on. Meat is colored and marbled to suit the fastidious palate, an attractive tint is put upon poultry, and the lordly salmon is counterfeited upon the carcass of a plebeian codfish. A cook, who lately purchased a peculiarly fresh-looking salmon, was disgusted to see the spots and the red tints boil off, and nothing but a codfish left. It will now be necessary to teach comparative anatomy to cooks.

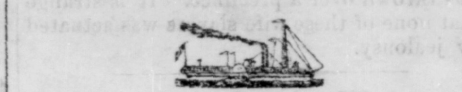

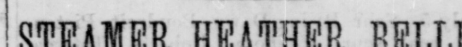
