CHARLOTTETOWN RACES.—The entries for the races to be held on the Charlottetown Driving Park on Wednesday and Thursday 13th and 14th of September will close tomorrow (Wednesday) night. There is every prospect of a grand field of entries in each class.

INQUEST CONCLUDED.—The inquest on the body of James McKenna, who was drowned at Rocky Point last week was concluded last evening when a verdict of accidental drowning by falling over the wharf was returned. The jury strongly recommended that a railing be placed along the sides of the wharf at Rocky Point to ensure the better safety of passengers.

DIDN'T LIKE SCHOOL.—About two months ago, a Mrs. Martin and her two children, the oldest a lad of 14, came to Prince Edward Island from Montreal, and took rooms for the summer at one of the hotels at Pownal. The oldest had been attending school in New Brunswick, but he was evidently not a lover of school or books for he did not wish to go back saying he preferred to go to work. As the time began to draw near for him to return to school he set about devising ways and means to take him to Moncton where he thought he could obtain work. A camera which his father had sent him was disposed of, and with the money realized thereon the lad yesterday started for town, walking all the way. Shortly after his arrival the police were telephoned to detain him, which they did. They found him in a boarding on Water Street, and held him until the arrival of his mother, which was not long afterwards.

On Sunday evening, Rev. J. A. Gordon preached his farewell sermon as pastor of the Main Street Baptist Church, St. John, prior to going to Montreal to enter upon his charge there. The large auditorium was taxed to its utmost capacity.

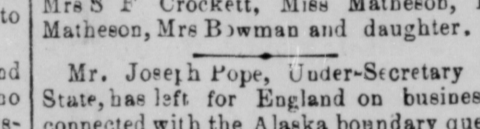
Mr. Joseph Pope, Under-Secretary of State, has left for England on business connected with the Alaska boundary question. He will be gone two months.

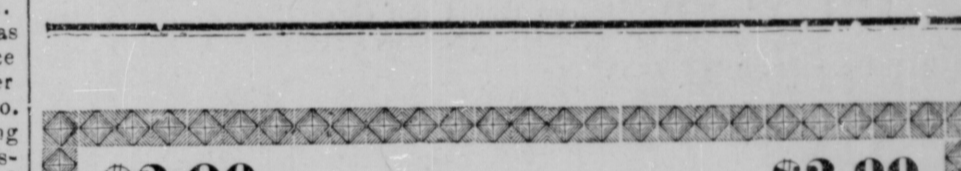
