WHAT THEY GET.—In answer to a correspondent the New York Herald says the aldermen of that city get \$2,000 a year salary. Most of them seem to have got more money than that, while several of them have got a number of years in Sing Sing, and not a few have been given an unlimited vacation in Canada.

THE CAPTAIN WISS.—A telegram from Boston, received here by Longworth & Co. late on Saturday afternoon, conveys the information that the law-suit between Captain Trainor and his steward, to which reference was made in Saturday's issue, had been decided in the captain's favor, and that the captain would arrive home this week.

CAPTURED.—A pig escaped from its owner's premises in this city, on Saturday, and becoming frightened by the noise made by those who were trying to recapture it, ran down Pownall wharf and jumped over. Two young men put after it in a punt, and amid the shouts and jeers of the large number of people on the wharf, brought the animal to the shore, and thence back to its quarters.

LECTURE.—Charles Watts, who is recognized as one of the ablest speakers in the Dominion, is expected to lecture at Summerside on Monday and Tuesday evenings, July 2nd and 3rd, at 7.30 in Charlottetown, commencing on Wednesday evening, July 4th. His opening subject here will be "Science; its struggles and its triumphs." In speaking of a recent lecture in Toronto the Globe says: "Mr. Watts is a clear and an incisive speaker of fine elocutionary ability."

FISH.—A considerable quantity of codfish and haddock has already been secured along the eastern part of the Island. Mackerel have also made their appearance, a few having been taken in the nets, but none as yet by seining. We hear that a good deal of dissatisfaction prevails among some of our shore fishermen in view of the extensive preparations that are being made all along the line for seining this summer, many of them asserting that the practice of seining should be stopped altogether.

IMPROVEMENTS.—The Old London House, on Water street, has recently been thoroughly renovated and improved. The walls of the billiard room and restaurant have been painted and frescoed and present a very nice appearance. Some of the latest improvements including a clock which times the games, have been placed in the billiard room, which now ranks with the finest in the Maritime Provinces. Crittendon, McKay, Gloucester; Pendragon, Johnson, Gloucester; George Willard, Leighton, Portland, Me.; W. D. Daisley, McDonald, Gloucester. All these vessels have more or less mackerel, having seined them on their way down. One has over 200 barrels No. 1's and 2's. The steamer Novelty has gone home with 600 barrels of mackerel, freshly caught in Guysboro Bay, N. S.

THE COURT IN MOURNING.

Other Tributes of Respect.

LONDON, June 16. The Times, in commenting on the death of the Emperor, says: "Germany has lost a devoted, high-souled ruler, and a noble-minded, faithful man. The first Emperor William was as much a soldier as his grandson, the present Emperor, William II. and it may now be hoped, with Bismarck's influence, that the grandson's efforts will likewise be given to averting war."

BERLIN, June 16. It is stated that Emperor William II. and Bismarck have compiled a programme, and that the Emperor will continue the former policy. It is reported also that the ex-Empress will go to Italy after the funeral.

A person who saw the Emperor at Charlottenburg preserved a paper whereon the Emperor had written the following: "One of the most consoling circumstances of my severe trial is to be shown what is said of me in the French papers. I certainly endeavored by every means in my power to mitigate the hardships of war when I was at Versailles. But still war was very rigorous and it must always be to be conquered. It gives me fresh faith in human nature to find how the French forget the evil I had to do them and remember only the good. Their present state of feeling makes me hate war more than I ever did in my life."

BERLIN, June 16. Emperor William II. has issued a general order to the Army. He says: "This, is, indeed, a serious and sorrowful time in which God's decree places me, at the head of the army. It is from a deeply moved heart I address my first words to my army. But the confidence with which I step into the place to which God's Will calls me is immovably strong, for I know what sense of honor and duty my glorious ancestors have implanted in the army, and I know in how great a measure this feeling has at all times been manifested in the army. Firm and inviolable attachment to the war lord is an inheritance handed down from mother to son from generation to generation. I refer you to a long line of glorious ancestors whose names shine brightly in history, and whose hearts beat warmly for the army. Thus we belong to each other, I and the army; thus we were born for one another; thus we will stand together in indissoluble bond in peace or storm, as God may will it. You will now take to me the oath of fidelity of obedience, and I swear ever to remember that the eyes of my ancestors look down upon me from the other world, and that I shall one day have to render up an account to them of the glory and honor of the army."

(Signed) WILLIAM.

Dated Fredricksburg. The Court has been ordered to go into mourning for the late Emperor for three months. The period of general mourning will be eight days.

An Imperial decree summonses the Reichstag to assemble on the 25th inst.

MONTREAL, June 16. The tri-color was hoisted at half-mast to-day at the French vice-Consulate out of respect for the memory of the late Emperor of Germany. Many French residents are much incensed at the vice-Consul's Act.

THE PLUMBER'S STRIKE. TORONTO, June 16. The Master Plumbers Association met last night and decided not to sign any agreement with the strikers, and sent a cablegram to one of their number who is at present in England, to engage 100 skilled plumbers and bring them with him, all the expenses of the transportation to be paid.

GENERAL SHERIDAN'S CONDITION. WASHINGTON, June 17 (11 a. m.) The doctors' bulletin says General Sheridan's condition contrasted with that of last Sunday, shows a gratifying improvement as to the action of the heart and lungs. The strength is greater, the desire for food is more natural, and sleep more healthy and refreshing.

FISHERIES PROTECTION. OTTAWA, July 17. The yacht recently purchased by the Government from Col. Gilmore will be utilized on the great Lakes for the protection of the fisheries. American fishermen, it is claimed, are using certain kinds of nets which destroy fish not required for market.

CORPORAL PUNISHMENT. HAMILTON, Ont., June 17. At the general sessions on Saturday the Grand Jury were of opinion that the introduction of corporal punishment into the penal system would have a beneficial effect in advancing the morality of the country.

A PROMISE. WINNIPEG, June 17. Mr. Van Horne has promised the people of Port Arthur that he intends removing the Canadian Pacific workshops from here to that place. Track laying on the Red River Valley Road is to be commenced to-morrow.

THE STANLEY EXPEDITION. BRUSSELS, June 16. Letters from the Congo confirm the fears that trouble has befallen the Stanley expedition. The Nord has received bad news regarding Stanley.

Nova Scotia's New Governor.

OTTAWA, June 17. It is understood that at a Cabinet meeting yesterday Hon. Mr. McLelan was appointed Lieut.-Governor of Nova Scotia, the appointment to date from July 9th.

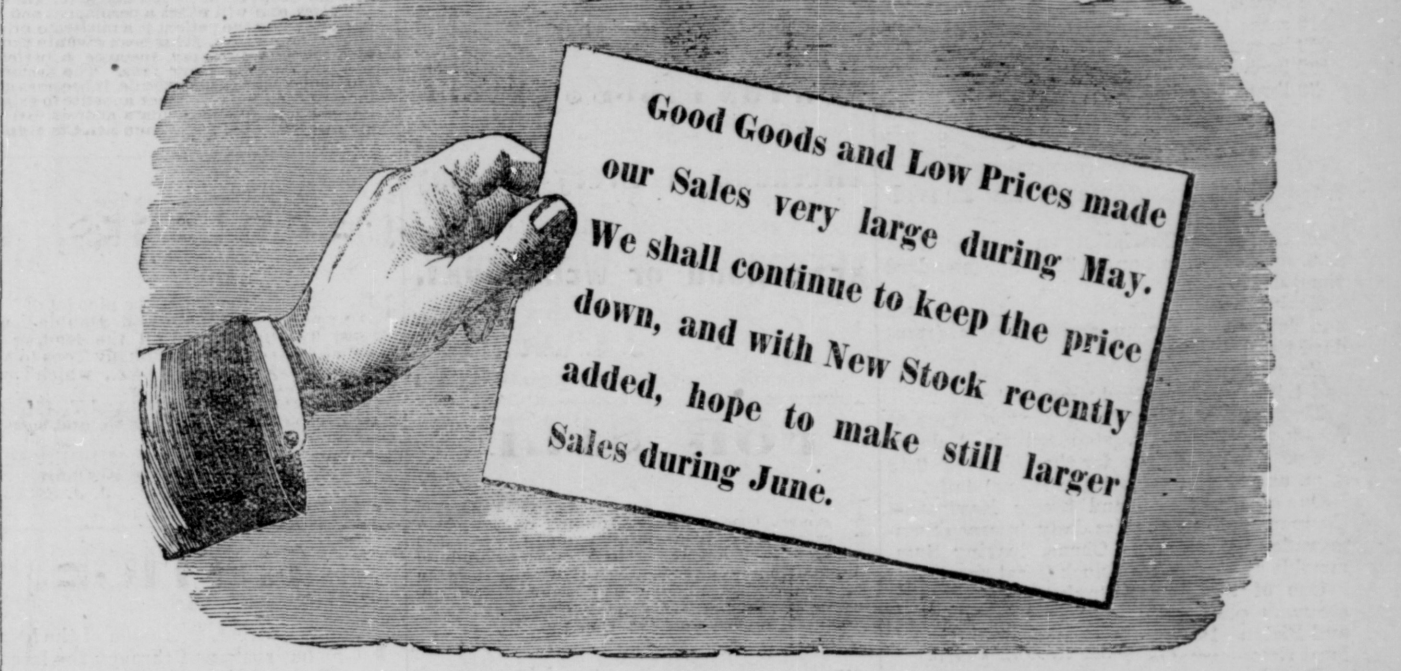
