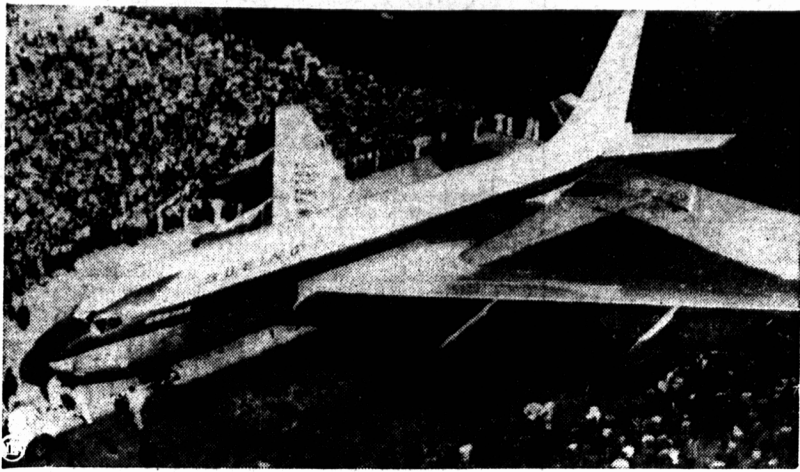
It is regretted that Mr. Roy Dixon of Bothwell, has had the misfortune of getting his arm broken on May 17.
