**Canada's Aid To  
The British Empire**

LONDON, Sept. 12—(CP)—The Empire has decided, the Daily Telegraph (Conservative) said today discussing Canada's decision to enter the war, and the alignment of the Dominions with Great Britain.

"What form the action may take is for the decision of their own governments," the newspaper said. "The New Zealand cabinet has already announced that it will raise military forces to serve with us in or without the country. It is a gallant deed, and the stricken fields of Gallipoli and France have shown us the value of New Zealand troops."

"Prime Minister Menzies told the Australian parliament yesterday that plans must be made, and finance and manpower organized, for a long war."

"Canada has taken over the defence of Newfoundland and the French Islands in that region and Premier Mackenzie King has announced is preparing for effective cooperation with us on the same lines as Australia."

"There is no doubt of the warmth of feeling in both countries. The opposition to the participation of Canada in a war beyond the frontiers was not pressed, and writers of authority have used the immediate training of men for service overseas."

"How the nations of the Empire can most usefully bring their power to bear is not a question to be answered hastily. They are all much stronger than they were in 1914, stronger by military experience and by the development of their natural resources and population."

"The military strength of India has greatly increased from the lessons learned in the first war, from the modernization of her army and from the results of Lord Chatfield's report."

"But it is not only by the dispatch of expeditionary forces that the Dominions can serve the common cause. To maintain the industries which will give a constant flow of munitions and an agricultural efficiency which will assure food supplies for the fighting front and the home base is of first importance."

"That twofold task we are now well assured will be accomplished. The Empire has decided."

**West Coast Boat  
Claims "Fired Upon"**

ANACORTES, Wash., Sept. 13.—Manager Fred Burman of Far West Fisheries said today Captain Eugene Schultz of the company's cannery tender Violet Ray reported the boat was "fired upon" at 10 a. m. yesterday in the Strait of Juan de Fuca, separating Washington State from Vancouver Island.

Burman quoted Captain Schultz saying "a shot landed 20 feet from the boat" but that he "could not tell where it came from." The Captain said the Violet Ray, en route to Neah Bay, was not flying the United States flag at the time.

VICTORIA, Sept. 13—(CP)—No word is reported here of gunfire in the Strait of Juan de Fuca, south of here.

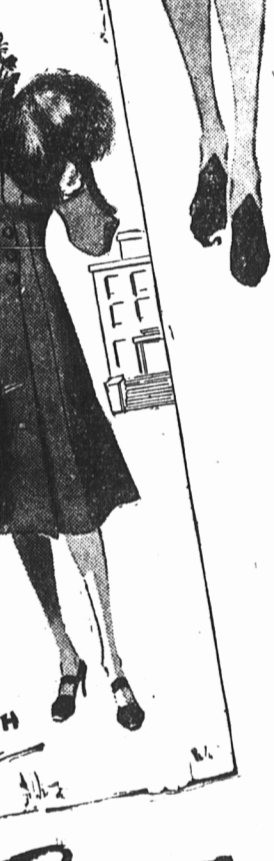
