First Canadian Built Gas Buggy



Pictured above is the first gasoline driven car ever built in Canada, the Le Roy. For years parts of the old car lay in an attic in Stratford, Ont.; where it was rediscovered by auto mechanic Lionel (Sandy) Rider, three years ago. Five months ago, Rider purchased the skeleton, put it together, and gave it a fresh coat of paint. Soon it will go on a tour of all important Canadian Cities. The original upholstery is still in excellent condition. The Le Roy was the brain child of three Kitchener, Ont., men in the year 1899. The frame was made in George Hoffman's Blacksmith shop in Waterloo, Ont.; the castings were made by August Trump in Phillip Gue's Foundry, where it took three weeks in those days to design a wheel alignment. The original cost of this hand made auto was \$650.00. The entire car weighs 1000 pounds. It is powered by a one-cylinder 1000 cc. engine, which generates 4 h.p. The old-new car will appear this summer at the Centennial celebration in Kitchener, and at the St. Catharines-Niagara Grape Festival. Later, Mr. Rider may drive his Le Roy to Charlottetown and Summerside.

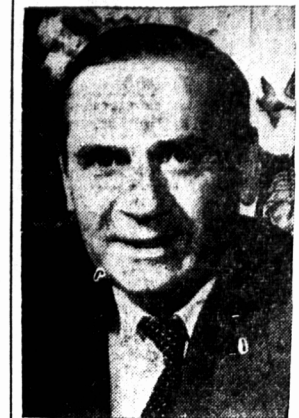
