Moore Wants Title Fight

MONTREAL (CP) — Ringmaster Archie Moore bounced happily into his dressing room Wednesday night after retaining his world light-heavyweight title and announced he has sent Ingemar Johansson a \$1,000,000 offer for a heavyweight title match.

Moore, holding court from a cloth covered rubbing table, said "the match would be promoted by 'Canadian and United States interests.'"

Moore would not elaborate further but his manager Jack (Doc) Kearns said the \$1,000,000 "would be strictly Johansson's cut. Our share has not been discussed."

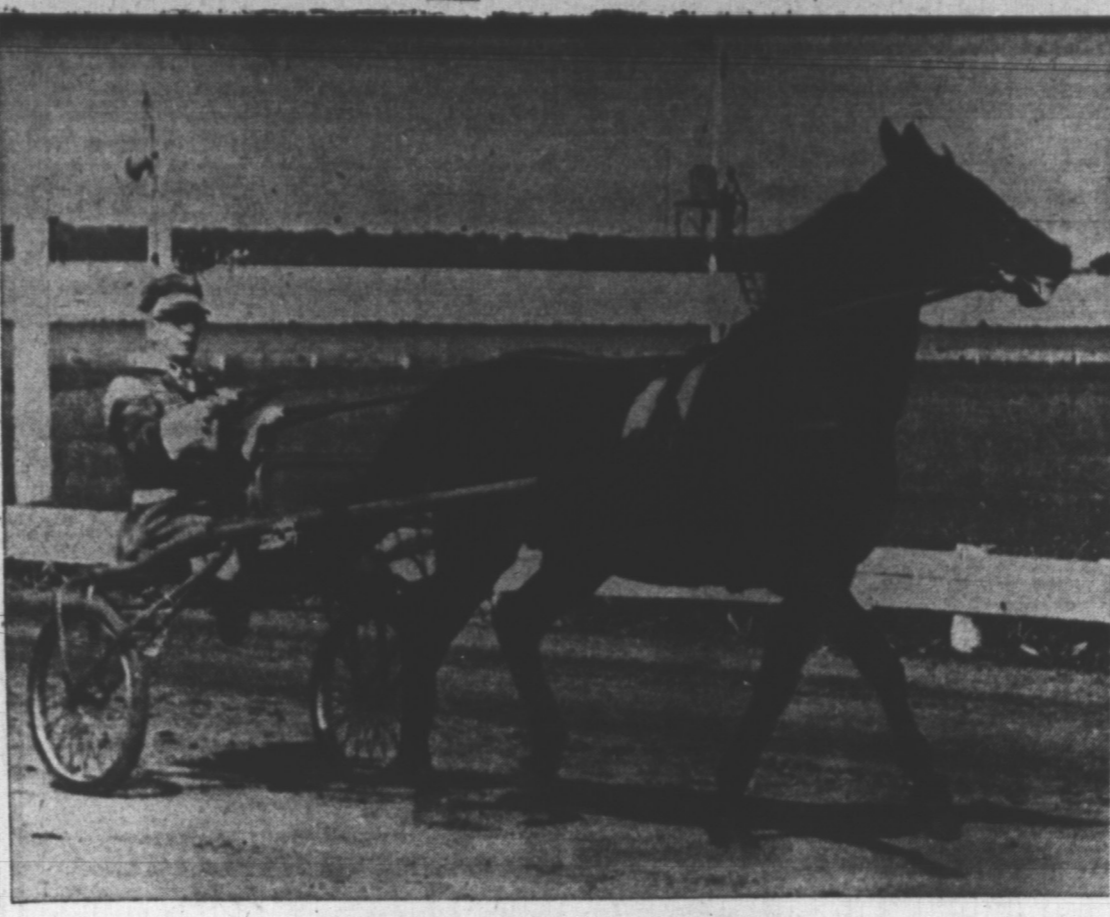
He, too, declined to name the prospective promoters. He said "the idea is to bring the title back to America."

Moore, in his white ring robe and dripping sweat heavily, calmly accepted the congratulations of well-wishers. He was unmarked.

Moore said a good left hook he landed just under the heart of challenger Yvon Durelle was the blow that set up Durelle's downfall.

"That took the steam out of him and after he fell I knew it was just a matter of time before I had him," Moore said.

B.C. Lions Meet Bombers Tonight

VANCOUVER (CP) — The apprentice challenges his instructor tonight as British Columbia Lions and the Grey Cup champion Winnipeg Blue Bombers open the Canadian football season's play-for-keeps schedule.

The apprentice says he's got a definite advantage — but it may not be enough to win. The last time Wayne Robinson, hard-driving tacklemaster of the Lions, runs up against Bud Grant, third-year Bomber genius who last year had Robinson as an assistant as the club went to the Western Inter-provincial Football Union championship, then won the national title.

"Sure, it's a definite advantage," said Robinson when asked if his work during the last two years as an assistant to Grant would be of any great benefit in planning for tonight's game.

Archie Moore Retains World Boxing Crown

Archie Moore retained his world light-heavyweight title by knocking out Yvon Durelle in the third round of the fight at the Agricultural Show in Charlottetown.

Moore landed two solid left hooks in the opener and Durelle countered with a flurry of lefts and rights to the head to floor Durelle four times in the third round.

Durelle went down for the fourth and last time with a right to the head. He staggered into the ropes near Moore's corner, struggled to a sitting position but couldn't make it up.

He went down earlier in the round to two nine-counts and a seven.

DURELLE ROCKED
Archie rocked the challenger the first time with an overhead right, then sent Yvon into the ropes with a right and left to the jaw.

More right and left combinations by the champion sent the big fisherman back against the ropes. He was up at seven, only to be knocked out seconds later.

Moore weighed 174½, Durelle 173.

Durelle got few really solid punches at Moore, who took them with his unique wrap-around defence or on the top of his head.

At the knockout, Moore was ahead on points.

Judges Leon German and Johnny Gow had it 5-4 in both rounds for Moore. Rene Ouimet called it 5-4 for Moore in the first and 5-4 for Durelle in the second. The Canadian Press had it 5-4 for Moore in both rounds.

The fight started slowly in the first round, in contrast to the wild opening of the fighters' first meeting, Dec. 1. Durelle floored Moore three times in that round.

Moore landed two solid left hooks in the opener and Durelle countered with a flurry of lefts and rights to the champion's mid-section.

In the second, Durelle had Moore against the ropes, but the agile champion's arms, crossed over his body, protected him. Durelle's punches landed harmlessly on the arms or grazed the top of Moore's head.

Moore was bleeding slightly from the mouth at the end of the round after fighting off the ropes and getting in a couple jabs before the bell sounded.

Moore rocked the husky fisherman early in the third round, then started hitting him almost at will. Durelle went down from a punishing right for a nine count and was on the way out.

It was Moore's eighth title defence and his sixth straight titlematch knockout.

Moore won the crown in December, 1952, from Joey Maxim.

He also increased his knockouts record to 128, two more than the late Young Stribling's record. He topped the old record when he beat Durelle last December. Archie's record for 22 years of professional boxing now is 176 wins, 24 losses and a six draws. Durelle in 14 years has won 77, lost 21, drawn in two.

7 WINNERS TAKE NEW TABS

Record-Smashing Miles Highlight Afternoon Card

Record-smashing miles were the order of the day at the Charlottetown Driving Park yesterday afternoon. Seven out of eight winners took new marks on the exciting program.

Dominator Pick, a 7-year-old brown gelding owned by Mrs. Richards of Truro and driven by D. Pikney was the only double dash winner on the program, lowering his mark on both times out. He toured the oval in 2:10:2 in his first time out and went in 2:10 flat in notching his second victory. His original mark was 2:11:3.

Other winners taking new tabs were: Blake Hanover, Long Dan, Colonel Henry, The Sheik and Connie French. The other winners were Gallant Way.

Blake Hanover was second in the first dash of the AA Trot but in the second dash of this event, led the three other entries to the wire in a record-breaking 2:09:3, lowering his mark by 1.5 of a second. Dainty Diane, the 12-year-old bay mare who made her first start this year, was a close second in this second dash. The mare, owned by Mrs. L. Thomson of Craupaud, took a mark of 2:11:2 this season. Blake Hanover's winning mile was the fastest time on the eight dash card. Gallant Way the winner of the first dash and Lady Lakeburn were other entries in the feature trot.

In the first dash of the C Trot, The Sheik, owned by James Poulton and driven by Harry Poulton of Charlottetown, lowered his mark by two seconds, dusting the oval in 2:13.

The Sheik, a long shot in this first heat of this event, nosed out the betting favorite, Connie French, and a win ticket on the Poulton-owned horse returned lucky ticket-holders \$23.70.

Blake Hanover was second in the second dash of the C Trot. Connie French edged out The Sheik in 2:11. This was a new tab for the 9-year-old bay mare, formerly owned by the general pharmacist Sydney Stead and now owned by the Scotian Stables of Halifax. The mare was reined by James 'Roach' MacGregor.

The present holders of the Charlottetown Driving Park trotting and pacing records were paraded before the large crowd. Watchim, a 23-year-old horse, who set the local track trotting record of 2:07 way back in 1945, was the first to be paraded.

Col. Dan MacKinnon, another oldtimer was reining Watchim. The aged horse, who also set marks at 5 other tracks in the Maritimes, trotted like a 10-year-old as Col. Dan scored him a couple of times.

Mighty Lee, who set a new track record of 2:08:3 during the Queen's visit, and who was supposed to go a couple of exhibition miles against time in an attempt to again lower the track record also made an appearance.

Plans for these two exhibition miles were changed however as Mighty Lee will be racing in the Free-For-All on Friday. Instead of an attempt to break the track record, the roan gelding went an exhibition mile in 2:07. The first daily double yesterday afternoon paid \$153.60 on a combination of Long Dan and The Sheik. The second double returned \$78. The quinella in the fourth paid \$12.90 and the exactor in the seventh returned \$6.90.

Long Dan in the second dash paid \$10.60 to win and a ticket on Ken's Pride in the 6th dash paid \$25.80.

MONDAY NIGHT'S two junior free-for-alls produced plenty of excitement for the large number of fans present.

The biggest surprise was the first dash win or Sir Joseph who stepped the mile in 2:08:4 and rewarded his backers at the mutual wickets in rather handsome fashion. However, looking back on the showing of July 30, the triumph certainly should not have been the type of upset it was. This season Sir Joseph has looked better than he has for years and Horace Willis is looking ahead to several more victories before the curtain falls on the 1959 season.

Favorites had a hard time of it Monday night with Morley's Pride starting the upsetting right in the first dash. Jack Anear's colt was very lightly regarded by the bettors. However the Pride showed his first triumph was no fluke by landing a bang up second in the final trip, something that gave him the best summary for the big stake.

ANOTHER STARTLING UPSET was the triumph by Leah's Girl in the second mile of the C pace. In the first trip Leah's Girl came home on the run, a very poor sixth. She was placed seventh and nobody looked to her for any great feats in the final trip. But Claude O'Brien had no trouble whatever in this outing and went by the pack as though they were standing still.
