**New Industrial Revolution In Russia Gets Underway**

LONDON (Reuters) — Russia's "industrial revolution" of the atomic era is under way. The Supreme Soviet, at its final meeting in Moscow on Friday, formally gave approval to a vast plan for the reorganization and dispersal of Soviet industry, the effects of which will be felt for many years. The plan was drawn up by experts of the Soviet Communist party and government and was presented to the Supreme Soviet by party chief Nikita Khrushchev. The Supreme Soviet also halved the number of ministries of the central government in Moscow. In future, the Soviet government will comprise only 25 ministries. The abolition of more than 20 ministries concerned with the management of industry is the first step in the new plan. Khrushchev told the Supreme Soviet this stage—involving the displacement of thousands of officials and administrators—must be completed by the end of next month.
