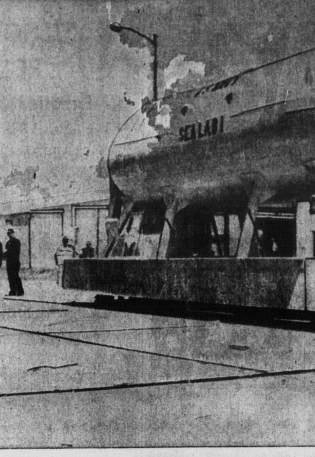

**More Dynamic Nation Urged In Manifesto**

MONTREAL (CP)—A committee of seven young Montreal intellectuals has published a manifesto challenging Canadians to build a more dynamic nation, based on "human values."

The committee, citing itself as the "Committee for Political Reform," says Canada—and Quebec — need policies "better adapted to our world and our times."

Rejecting the idea of an independent Quebec, the committee says: "We refuse to let ourselves be locked into a constitutional frame smaller than Canada."

However, it says: "Canada today is a country in search of a purpose. Emphasis on personal interests and the absence of leadership from the central government risk the ultimate disintegration of the federal state."

The manifesto appears in the original French in the current issue of Cite Libre and in English in the current issue of the Canadian society's antiquated editions of the Montreal Star.

The authors are professors Albert Breton, economist, and Pierre-Elliott Trudeau, political scientist of the University of Montreal; professors Raymond Breton and Maurice Poirand, two sociologists, of McGill University; Dr. Yvon Gauthier, a psychiatrist at Ste. Justine's Children's Hospital; and lawyers Claude Bruneau and Marc Lalonde.

**TREND TO HUMANISM**  
"The most valid trends today are toward more enlightened humanism, to ward various forms of political social and economic universalism. Canada is a reproduction of a smaller and simpler scale of this universal phenomenon."

"The challenge for a number of ethnic groups to learn to live together. If Canadians cannot make a success of a country such as theirs, how can they contribute to the world, the elaboration of humanism, to the formulation of the international political structures of tomorrow?"

The authors call upon Canadians to discard attitudes based on regional or ethnic prejudice. "It is on the basis of human criteria," their 1,000 word manifesto says, "that we demand policies better adapted to our world and our times. This is our only motivation."

They say that "in the present context of Canadian politics, it is necessary above all else to reaffirm the importance of the individual, without regard to ethnic, geographical or religious accidents."

"The cornerstone of the social and political order must be the individual man and his common, not those that differentiate them. An order of priorities in political and social life must be based on the individual that is founded upon the individual."

**POLICE SENT TO CYPRUS**  
A BARRING OF ROADS — Australia will send 40 police to join the United Nations police force in Cyprus. External Affairs Minister Paul Hasluck said Wednesday. He added the men would begin their duties within three weeks.

**Leadership Absent**

They describe absence of leadership in political affairs as one of the country's gravest problems. "Politicians proposed so incoherent that the voters can be sure of the relationship between what is said today and done tomorrow."

The manifesto also condemns administration of justice in Canada as antiquated and inadequate.

In Montreal alone there was a backlog of more than 17,000 cases before the Superior Court. Many had been delayed for one or five years.

"Justice has become intolerable in two respects: it is too slow and too expensive."

The committee calls for action to ensure that all citizens have access to adequate medical care, regardless of their economic status.

"Government and the medical profession tend to forget that sickness is still quite capable of suddenly destroying without warning the economic well-being of a great many people. Certainly, health insurance has a role of great importance in this regard, but it has not solved them all."

**NATIONALISM BLAMED**  
The committee blames nationalism, in Quebec and Canada as a whole, for distracting attention from such problems.

It describes Quebec separatism as "not only a waste of time but a step backward."

Nationalist thinking was accompanied with emotion, more concerned with appearance than reality, and had led to a re-evaluation of the constitutional problems.

The Canadian constitution was a relatively unimportant cause of current problems and changing it would accomplish little.

"The so-called building of a new constitutional structure is as futile as a huge game of blocks."
