Cards Regain Lead As Giants Lose Double-header To Bees; White Sox Upset Tigers 6-5

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, May 28—The Giants today kicked away their best chance to take a clear lead in the National League by dropping both ends of a double-header to Boston Bees, 4-3 and 5-4 here. The double win for the Bees snapped the Giants five-game winning streak and jolted the New Yorkers back into second place. Danny MacFadyen had the Giants helpless in the opener, letting them down with nine hits. The Castlemans could not hold their advantage in the nightcap, and the Bees won with a three-run spurge in the eighth and Wally Berger's homer in the ninth. Gene Moore and Bill Urbanski each had three hits in the opener, and Hal Schumacher suffered his second setback of the season. As Hayden had trouble only on his one triple, who collected three hits, one a triple. Jim Ripple, pinch-hitting in the ninth of the second game hit a homer. Brooklyn Dodgers outslugged the Phillies 13-10 in a battle of extra base blows at Philadelphia, sending Philadelphia back to the National League cellar. Honus Wagner held the Cardinals to four hits at St. Louis and Pittsburgh Pirates tied their series by making it two straight over the league leaders, 7-2. The Cardinals regained their half game lead over New York, however, as the Giants dropped both ends of a twin bill with Boston. Gus Suhr led the Pirates batters with two doubles and two singles in five times up. In a game spiced by a free-for-all brawl at home plate that resulted in four players and coaches being banished from the field, Chicago's Cubs defeated Cincinnati, 11-5 at Chicago. Captain Woody English, shortstop, and coach Roy Johnson of the Cubs and pitcher Lee Stine were sent off as a result of two fist fights which flared up in the third inning after English had accused Stine of using the "duster" ball. During the Cub's big second inning, in which Gabby Hartnett and Stan Heck hit homers, one of Stine's pitches hit Hartnett in the back on his second time up. In the third inning English was hit in the back by Stine and time had to be called while he recuperated. Later in the inning, English scored from third base on a fly. As he slid into the plate, English admitted later, he "got on" Stine for hitting him and Hartnett. Stine, backing up the throw from the outfield, rushed at English and the two got in a few swings before all players from both teams swarmed around them.

AMERICAN LEAGUE

NEW YORK, May 28—Chicago White Sox knocked Vic Sorrell out of the box in the ninth inning today and then pounded two other Detroit pitchers to win a 6-5 victory over Tigers at Detroit. Tigers had pulled up from behind when Goose Goslin hit a homer in the eighth with the bases loaded, but when Hayes opened the ninth for the Sox with a home run Sorrell was replaced by Kimsey, who was charged with the loss. New York Yankees piled nine runs across the plate in two wild innings today to turn back the Red Sox assault on their American League lead with a 10-6 victory at Boston. The flashy rookie, Joe Di Maggio, led the batting parade, and the veteran Pat Malone managing to stay the distance, although hit freely, as the Yanks stretched their first-place edge to two and a half games. A six-run spurge in the seventh started the Yanks on their way to victory. Philadelphia Athletics, who had lost all of the five games previously played with Washington, today won a 10 inning first game 4-3, but were shut out in the final engagement, 5-0 at Washington. Jimmy Deshong limited the A's to five hits in winning the final for his fifth triumph of the season. Extra base hits by Moses gave the Athletics their victory. He doubled in the eighth to score two and then in the 10th scored Warbler with the winning run. Manager Harris of the Senators was ejected from the coaching lines by Umpire Owens for making too strenuous protest. Indians waited into third place by a 6-5 victory over St. Louis at Cleveland as the Chicago White Sox defeated the Tigers at Detroit. Trailing 4-2 at the end of the sixth inning, the Tribe went out in front in the seventh when Odel Hale smacked a home run with the bases loaded, after Vosmik and Hughes had been retired. The Browns took their lead in the eighth, with a four-run barrage and threatened Cleveland's lead in the eighth, but Milt Galatzar saved the day with a spectacular, one-handed catch of Tom Carey's drive to right centre.

Lewis-Godwin Bout Scheduled For Tonight

P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, May 28—John Henry Lewis, light-heavyweight king, returns to Madison Square Garden tomorrow night for the first time since he walloped Jock McAvoy, British title holder, last March, in the 10 round main bout against Bob Godwin, husky 180-pounder from Daytona Beach, Fla. It is an over-the-weight affair and John Henry's title will not be in peril. The colored lad is a top heavy favorite, although there is a possibility he may run into trouble from the southerner who looked good defeating Joe Knight in the south some weeks back. Another champion, who will show his wares is Balthazar Sangchili, who recently took the European bantamweight crown away from Panama Al Brown. Sangchili, said to be the hardest hitter to grace the bantamweight division in years, bows his way into the Garden in a 10 round bout with Lew Farber, New York featherweight. This also is an over-the-weight match.

Tide-Way Is Favorite For Oaks Today

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) EPSOM DOWNS, England, May 28—(C. P. Cable)—With 21 three-year-old fillies likely to start, the problem of choosing the likely winner of the Oaks, to be run tomorrow, appeared almost as difficult as the task of selecting the Derby winner. Lord Derby's Tide-Way, winner of the one thousand guineas, appeared to be one of the leading candidates on the eve of the race. But Tide-Way is not partial to hard going and the Epsom turf has had little rain lately. The Oaks is run over the Derby course of 1 1/2 miles five yards, while the one thousand guineas is over a mile route. These are the two classics for three-year-old fillies. Feola, which ran second in the one thousand guineas, also will be watched closely. Feola is owned by the King but has been leased, along with the other horses in the Royal stable, to Lord Derby during the period of court mourning. Major D. McAlmont's Expectation and Lord Derby's Somersault were scratched.

Scottish Champ Favorite For British Golf Title As Field Is Cut To Eight

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, May 28—The British amateur golf championship tonight was a matter for settlement within the Empire. Two more 18-hole rounds over St. Andrews links today reduced the field from 32 to the final eight and left in the picture Cyril Tolly, the terrific driver who won the title in 1920 and 1922; Hector Thomson, Scotland's champion, par-cracker de luxe of the tourney and the favorite; Jim Perrier, broad-shouldered Australian titleholder; Cecil Ewing, steady golfer; D. H. R. Martin; Gordon Peers; G. Alec Hill and Morton Dykes. The last four named Britons are not so well known as the others, but if one of them should survive tomorrow's two short knockout rounds and Saturday's 36-hole test, he will be the talk of the golfing world. Thomson, hope of the golf-wise Scots of this village, boasted his stock this morning by shooting five under 4's for the 14 holes that were necessary to put out Colin Brown. In the sixth round this a hernia he had a stiffer argument with Andrew Jamieson, but still had the shots and steadiness to win, one. Ewing, heretofore little known internationally, splined Roger Weir, a former champion, by 2 and 1 in the morning with the aid of a bad hook Weir's woods developed on the back nine. However, as though to show it was no fluke, the Irishman drubbed his afternoon opponent, Cameron Conn, by 5 and 4. The hefty Tolly had no trouble with Major W. H. M. Atken in the morning, winning 5 and 4, but needed all of the distance his tremendous woods could give him to beat down Dennis Kyle by 2 and 1 in the next round. Robert Sweeney, the last American-born player shooting for the title left undefended by Lawson Little of California, was shut out in the afternoon after a spectacular opening duel with Perrier. The lucky Australian stroked down a nine foot putt on the 21st green after Sweeney, now a resident of London, had struggled upward with wms on the 17th and 18th to square the match. Perrier had trimmed C. W. Timmins one up in the morning after another tough fight, while Sweeney was surmounting with a 2 and 1 win over Edward P. Storey, a veteran front-ranker. Peters scored a morning upset by putting out Harry Bentley by 2 and 1, then outstripped R. S. Walker in the afternoon for a two up triumph.

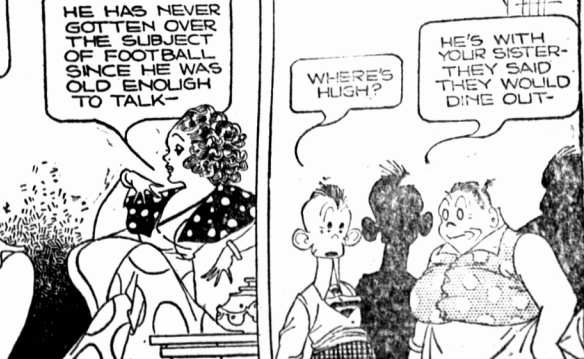
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
