Pioneer Church Vessels To Be Re-dedicated

This coming Sunday morning at 10 a.m. the United Church first silver communion service to be used in the original Presbyterian Church at Lot 16 will be re-dedicated and will be kept in the church as a memorial to the early pioneers of the district.

The communion service bears the engraving "1826 R.P. (Richmond Parish)". It was presented to the Church by the late Robert Milligan on October 11, 1821, when the first Presbytery on P.E.I. was constituted according to the deed of the synod. The communion set was purchased in Scotland.

About 42 years ago a set of individual glasses was purchased and since that time this set has been kept in the home of an elder, James MacLean, who is presenting it back to the Church.

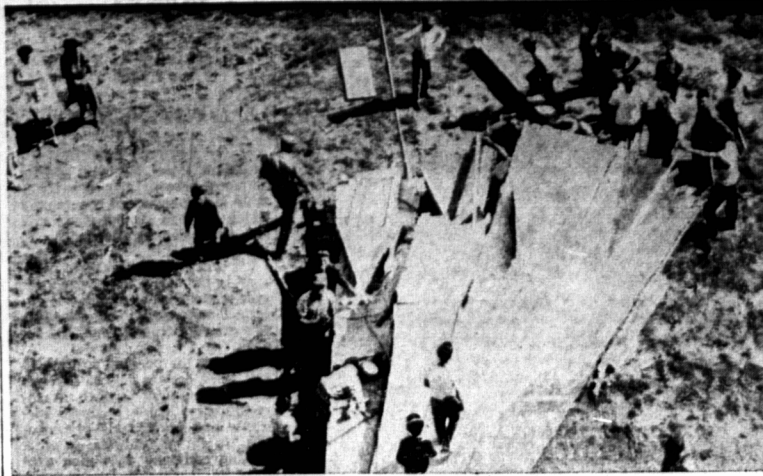

Springfield is a mile track. Regrettably, Double Scotch was not kept eligible for the "Hambledonian" for three-year-old trotters at Springfield, which is valued at about \$100,000. Scott Frost won it in 1955 as a three-year-old. Joe also won the Castleton Breeders Stake for three-year-old trotters at Springfield with Time Mr. time 2:05 1/5 and 2:04 3/5.

We notice our Cape Breton friend, Wendy Carroll, was first to the wire at Roosevelt Races, our State, that recently added a \$7,500 Colt Stake at Foxboro to a long list of season's triumphs, and now looks good enough to beat all comers.

UNDEFEATED
Torpid, 1:58, continues undefeated in the three-year-old class. He was slated to meet Good Counsel, 1:58 1/5, at the recent meeting at Du Quoin, Illinois. What a battle that meeting should be!

The top race meeting in the Pine Tree Circuit was at Gorham Raceway, Maine, recently. The power behind that track is Norman Woolworth, one of the owners of the noted Woolworth chain stores, and proprietor of the Clearview Stables, Winthrop, Maine, whose horses are raced by Earl Avery, formerly of Woodstock, N.B. To bring the tops to Gorham, Mr. Woolworth gave the race committee \$10,000, and it certainly did the trick for over 12,000 people jammed their way into the racetrack to see Duane Hanover, with Stanley Dancer in the driver's seat, lower the track record to 2:02.

Harness horsemen have been endeavouring to get a bill passed in the Ontario Legislature permitting night racing, but running horse interests oppose it. To show the possibilities of such a plant, we may mention that last Saturday evening, actually the races start at five o'clock, DST, there were 7,158 paid spectators at Old Woodbine track, and they showed over \$200,000 through the mutual windows. Old Woodbine was formerly used by the runners until a new \$10,000,000 track was built to accommodate them. The top event of the night was the \$9,170 Canadian Cup Pace. A 4-year old that took a record last season as a three-year-old of 2:03 1/5. Howard Rosecroft, won both dashes with Ezra Dean, 2:02 2/5 second in both trips, time 2:02 1/5, which was a new pacing record for the track, and 2:01 3/5, which lowered it still further. 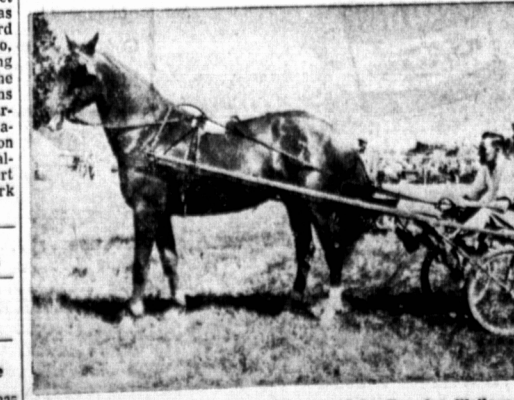

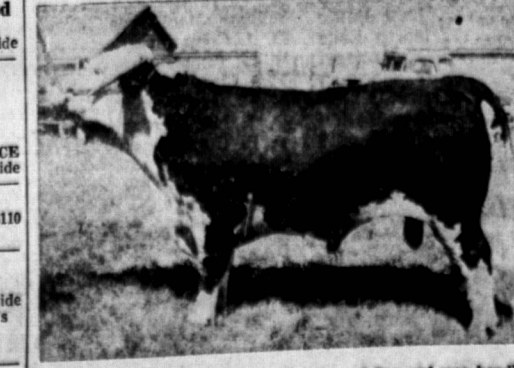

Field Day Held Yesterday At Farm In Urbainville

An illustration station field day was held at the farm of Mr. Zenon Gallant, Urbainville yesterday with several officials of the Dominion and Provincial Departments of Agriculture in attendance to address the gathering. Mr. Norman Black, director of Illustration Stations was chairman for the meeting.

The fairly large gathering of men and women was addressed by Deputy Minister of Agriculture, Mr. S.C. Wright, who spoke on the policies of his department as well as the Dominion-Provincial policies regarding assistance to farmers; Mr. Fred Cannon, who is in charge of the Entomological Laboratory in Charlottetown, addressed the farmers and their wives on the common insects of farm and garden and their identification and control; Dr. George Fisher, director of veterinary services spoke on Bangs disease and the eradication program which is a first for the Province, also on the artificial insemination program and its advantages to the individual farmer.

Other speakers were Mr. Bruce MacLean of the Experimental Farm Charlottetown who conducted the tour of the different plots in which cereal grains are being grown; Mr. George LaBelle of the Extension Services Department of St. Dunstan's University, Mr. Allan Palmer, agriculture representative for Prince County and Mrs. W.R. Shaw, Charlottetown.
