During his campaigning here he was driven by James McGregor and after he left by Frank McAlduff. Early in the season Mr. Campbell received an offer of \$2,500 for Buddy but he liked him too well to part with him and has no regrets for turning down the offer. All season he was looked after by Mr. Campbell's son Sheldon, who is one of the most conscientious caretakers that we know of.

Buddy returned home fat and slick and as keen to race as he was the first of the season. Mr. Campbell said that Sheldon is a great admirer of Frank McAlduff and likes the way he trains and drives a horse and paid tribute to his good work at Foxboro with Campbell's Buddy, also the pacer Pat D. and the trotter Miss Eloise. Pat D. had his best season in years and Miss Eloise was also a winner. The pacer Sandy Burlington, that Mr. McAlduff trained from a yearling to his four-year-old form, was a winner at Foxboro where he was driven by Harry Mount.

And now we hear from our friend S. Thane Belyea, Fredericton, N.B.:—"The John A. Forbes stable arrived in Fredericton Thursday night with Pat D., Miss Eloise and Sandy Burlington from Foxboro. Frank McAlduff and son have severed their connection with the Forbes stable and both have returned home to the Island with Myron MacArthur. We hope that this is true because he has been a great asset to us during our Fredericton Exhibition races. IN THIS CORNER

There is no more doubt in the minds of local fans that Leo Lamoureux really has his Islanders hockey machine rolling in high gear for the season as they skated to a 6-4 verdict over Glace Bay on Thursday and a 4-2 win over Halifax last night to make it four straight wins after a seven-game losing slump. Their win last night now puts them on a tie basis with the Saintamarians for fifth spot and just one game away from overtaking Sydney Millionaires for sole possession of fourth place. A win over Moncton Hawks here tonight could consolidate the position.

Local sports followers will get their fill of action during today when both intermediate football when both intermedie football and Big Six hockey will be on their program of sporting entertainment. The scene of the pigskin pushing will be at St. Dunstan's University where the intermediate brigade of the red and white clan will clash with the boys in airforce blue from the Summerside airport in an exhibition English rugby tilt. In a previous clash the fast hitting Saints walloped the airmen 21-0, but the R.C.A.F. boys are willing to have another try at it.

But they will have their work cut out for them. A. J. McAdam's second-string griders have been making a habit of cleaning up on their opposition in roaring fashion. In fact some observers think that the intermediate Saints are a smoother passing squad than their senior brothers at the University who were just recently nosed out by Mount Allison University for the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island intercollegiate title. In addition to their lopsided shutout victory over the airforce club, they have also handed out a 19-0 drubbing to the Prince of Wales intermediate intercollegiate club this season.

The biggest feature in the sporting limelight for the day, however, will be Johnny Horek's Moncton Hawks opening appearance of the season here at the Forum against the Islanders. Everyone has been looking forward to this meeting ever since the opening of the schedule on October 15th. Particularly now that the Islanders have snapped out of their losing slump (which incidentally was against the Hawks over their home ice) interest has been mounting daily in anticipation of the clash.

Carrying on in the manner of past tradition, once again this Province is doing its part in contributing its player material to Maritime hockey circles of amiable calibre. Even at this early stage of the 1951-52 season nine hockey products have left these shores for mainland points. Two of the most notable from this City, Lorne Hennessey and Orne Carver have already rejoined the Halifax Saint Mary's Junior squad, a team they both performed well for all last season. Hennessey who earned with Islanders during one clash this season showed up well with the senior bracket and should prove a valuable candidate with the Saints club this season. Two other Charlottetownians, forwards Brian Lewis and defenceman Stewart MacLure left for Amherst, N. S. this week where they will seek berths with the junior squad of that town. Both are products of the juvenile and junior play of hockey promise.

From the Western Capital of Summerside comes news of the same nature. Paul Schurman and Ron MacArthur are also in the Nova Scotia capital to try out with the Santamarian Junior squad, while Syl Bernard and Mark Delaney are trout prospects with the Pictou Marinas of the A. P. C. League. Coke Grady, another Island junior product has departed his Summerside home for Amherst where he will no doubt be working with the City trouts, Lewis and MacLure for a berth with Amherst Juniors.

Saint John Beavers Down Millionaires 4-2 In First Game At Sydney

SYDNEY, N. S., Nov. 2 (CP)—Saint John Beavers racked up a 4-2 decision over Sydney Millionaires here tonight in their first Cape Breton appearance of the Maritime Major Hockey League schedule.

Never in arrears, the league-leading visitors gained a two-goal advantage in the first period. Centre Dusty Blair opened the scoring at the 7:07 mark of play, beating Sydney's Nick Pidsodny with a hard flip. Blair used Sydney defenceman Joe Levandoski as the screen.

Two and a half minutes later Bill McGracken bounced the puck off Pidsodny's pads for a corner, this time with safeguard Dean MacBride limiting the goalkeeper's view.

Millionaires charged back in the second period to take the offensive and shooting edge but managed only one tally against the close riding opposition. Ed (Whitey) Prokop leveled on the left side with Joe Levandoski's push up pass and wheeled a one handed shot that completely fooled Beaver netminder Phil Hughes.

Hughes was tested hard and often thereafter by Millionaires who showed more fight and speed than in any previous outing here this year. Hughes saved the advantage for the Beavers with several brilliant, diving saves late in the second period and again in the third.

Johnny Ubrico, given clearance by Tom Smellie's forward pass while the Millionaires gaged inside the Beaver end, ranced down the left boards to plant a 3:25 slap to the short corner at 30 feet of the final period.

Don "Red" McRae, continuing his outstanding home ice play, roamed around the right side and into the backboards at 17:03. An intended pass out grazed the post and kicked back into the net off Hughes' skate.

The score came with Beavers at full staff but at least eight minutes after a series of three overlapping Saint John penalties. Millionaires took too long to wind up and got brzen blockade from a three-man defence on two stretches when they were two men shy.

Islanders Down St. Mary's 4-2 For 4th Straight Win

HALIFAX, Nov. 2 (CP)—Charlottetown Islanders defeated Halifax St. Mary's 4-2 here tonight to run their winning streak to four straight and move into a fifth place tie with the Halifax club. The loss was the fifth in a row for the Saints and fourth in succession on home ice.

It was a fast, slam baag game most of the way with Islanders dominating play in the last half of the contest after a slow start.

After a scoreless first period that was highlighted by the work of goalies Hal Gordon of Charlottetown, and Larry Frechette, St. Mary's pulled into a 2-0 lead near the nine minute mark of the middle period. They blew the margin before a furious attack by the Islanders who popped in two goals in 30 seconds before the half-way mark of the frame.

After that, the Saints never recovered their drive of the opening period. They tried to get back at Gordon in the final chapter but few of them gave the Island goalie any trouble.

The winning goal was a bit of a fluke, the puck rolling in off Morley McNeil's skate from a scramble early in the third period.

Islanders served the game without the services of veteran centre Bucko Trainor and winger Bill Morrow. Trainor is under treatment for influenza, but is expected back next week. St. Mary's dressed new centre Dewar Thompson who set up one of the Halifax goals.

Winger Conny Bonhomme pumped in two of the Island goals, both unassisted, and the others were scored by Willie Marshall and Walt Pawlyshyn. Marshall's first game with the Charlottetown team after a layoff with a back injury.

Doug Lewis and Morley MacNeil were the Halifax snipers. It was a fast opening period but both goalies kept the door shut despite the many narrow escapes. Larry Frechette was especially hot in the initial frame. Three times Island players swept in with the goalie playing it alone and each time, Frechette held them off.
