

# Teachers Hear Address By National President

Miss Carolyn Robins, President of the Canadian Teacher's Federation, addressed the delegates to the annual P.E.I. Teacher's Federation yesterday afternoon at P.W.C. Auditorium, which was almost filled to capacity for the occasion.

Introduced by the President of the Island Federation, Miss Mabel Matheson, the National President dealt with the role of the Dominion Association in relation to the various provincial organizations, and the role of the teacher in the modern world.

"This Dominion is a vast country and the Canadian Teachers' Federation can operate only by the support of the locals—the Federation is the only link which can bind us together, and it is the organization that should speak for the teachers of Canada," Miss Robins said.

Stressing the position of the teacher in the educational world, she declared that, no matter what fine buildings are constructed or what the curriculum is the teacher remains the most important part of education. The National body remained in contact with international organizations, she said, and had, in April, 1953, established a research department, one of the few now equipped to do educational research. The material thus obtained was utilized for

briefs before Royal Commissions, etc.

**IN TEACHERS' HANDS**

"We mold not only Canada's future," the guest speaker said, "but the destiny of the world is in our hands. The greatest material resource of a country is its children. Business and industry have come to realize this and become interested to give support to education. National growth is dependent on what the schools are doing; they are a great force to maintain the democratic way of life."

Noting that many of the problems encountered in education today were prevalent in Aristotles' time, Miss Robins said that a good school should "stimulate all-round development of a child, and be staffed by enthusiasm and competent teachers, who must educate people to be human beings."

Having stated that the most important function of the modern government is that of education, the National President declared that the people of Canada must soon decide whether education is to be treated as an expenditure or an investment. "There is no profession more important than our own," she said, adding: "A new day dawns—we must go forward to meet the challenge. In order to do this, she said, the right people must be recruited and retained in the

## Cases Heard In Court Yesterday

Two residents of Fort Augustus appeared before Magistrate Gilbert Gaudet yesterday morning, charged with intoxication in a public place (the Soudia train). Both were convicted of possessing intoxicating liquor in a place other than his residence, and was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days.

Also on the Queen's County Magistrate's docket were three residents of the City and one from Mount Herbert, all charged with failing to register a motor vehicle for the current year, for which fines of \$5.00 and costs were imposed. Another City resident was reprimanded for the same offence. All of the above accused had purchased the vehicles outside the Province.

Charged with operating a motor vehicle without license plates, a resident of West Royalty and a resident of York were each fined \$5 and costs. A City resident, similarly charged, was fined \$10 and costs for operating an unlicensed person to operate his motor vehicle, a resident of Brackley was fined \$10 and costs or ten days in default of payment, and a resident of Central Royalty was fined a like amount for speeding.

Two residents of the City, charged with possession of spirits unlawfully manufactured, were again remanded to May 1st at the request of the Crown.

## Tanker Docks At Charlottetown

The Imperial tanker "Imperial Sarnia" docked at the Railway wharf at Charlottetown yesterday morning at 9:30 with a cargo of 60,000 barrels of diesel, stove and furnace oil. The ship left Halifax Easter Sunday morning, came around the ice field into Cabot Strait and the Gulf, and around North Point and the Northumberland Strait to Charlottetown. The trip took approximately seventy hours.

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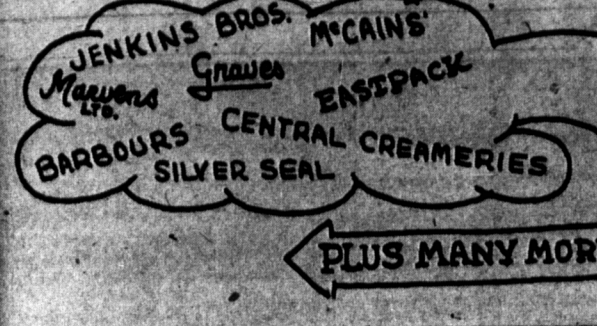
