Auto Race Seen
Steel sources said the request for earlier-than-scheduled delivery could mean only one thing: GM was moving up the timetable for its coming production race with Ford—a race that should see the world's two biggest auto makers rolling at top speed well into the second quarter.
From the steel industry's point of view, it couldn't happen a moment too soon. Cutbacks have been increasingly frequent of late and the hoped-for rash of orders for first quarter delivery slow in coming. Last week U. S. Steel Corp., citing lack of demand, banked another blast furnace, while the industry's scheduled operating rate slumped to 87 per cent of capacity—lowest since the 1952 strike.
But the holiday slowdown won't stop 1953 from being the biggest production year in the steel industry ever had. Output for the year is estimated by the trade weekly "Iron Age" at just under 112,000,000 tons. The previous record was 105,000,000 million in 1951.

Economy Campaign Issue?
The general state of the U. S. business came in for renewed attention this week. There were increasing signs that the prosperity-versus-depression theme was being over-hyped for the next year in the congressional elections.
On the Democratic side, Senator John Sparkman of Alabama served notice that economic conditions will certainly be a campaign issue next year and Senator Paul Douglas of Illinois said we're "in a real recession" right now.
Senator James Duff, Pennsylvania Republican retorted: "I see no sign of recession. The Democrats tried to win the election last year on the old depression issue. They failed."
The U. S. commerce department noted a decline in factory output and employment in the first two months of the current quarter but stressed that industrial production and consumer income were still ahead of the same period of 1952.
