New York, July 27.—The Rev. Dr. J. F. Dodd, of the Methodist Episcopal missionary society to-day received the following cable from Sharp Peak:—
 "Hinghua quiet; ladies, children Sharp Peak"

This message was sent by the Rev. W. N. H. Brewster, superintendent of the mission at Hinghua. Hinghua is some distance south-west of Foo Chow, and Sharp Peak is still further south. Sharp Peak is said to be a summer resort. It is inferred from the message that Mr. Brewster had gone over there to look after the women and children, but that the men were still at Hinghua, where there was no danger. Mr. Brewster has recently been instructed by a cable to cable the present location of missionaries. There are only half a dozen missionaries located at Hinghua.
