The last Cape Ann Advertiser says: The best mackerel fare of the season was brought in by the schooner Mollie Adams, Capt. Solomon Jacobs, from the Bay St. Lawrence, on Sunday. She had been gone from home five weeks, and had sent home 200 bbls. during that time, making her total catch 920 bbls. The latest sufferer is Mrs. Haliday, wife of the assistant pastor of Plymouth Church, Brooklyn, who slipped on a banana skin on the sidewalk a few days ago and fell, breaking her hip, an accident which will probably result fatally in her case owing to her advanced age. In reply to the anxious enquiries of our correspondent "Citizen," we are desired to state that Mr. Tomlins, as a magistrate, was obliged to sit upon the case referred to, and for that purpose gave up his dinner hour in order that he might be in his office as usual during the afternoon; but the case occupied more time than he anticipated. Mr. Tomlins, we may add, is rarely absent from his office, and it cannot truthfully be said that he is not, as a rule, attentive to the duties he is called upon to discharge as an official of the city. The Harris Nickel Plated Show exhibit in Charlottetown on Wednesday and Thursday. We copy the following from the Halifax Chronicle:—"The ring show is, without doubt, one of the best ever witnessed on the Common, everything that is promised in the advertisements being given to the letter. The gymnastic and acrobatic feats are of the most difficult character and well performed, while the exhibitions of tight-rope walking and dancing, by two female members of the company, are of the most skillful description. The trapeze acts form one of the best features of the circus. The bareback riding is as good as ever seen here, the performances of a little girl and boy winning loud applause. Two clowns furnish abundant amusement, with funny acts and jokes, often original. The menagerie in connection with the circus is, as the management advertise, small, but it contains a curious and interesting collection. The umbrella-eared elephant, with ears three feet long, is one of the wonders exhibited.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] The Dilke Scandal. DIFFERING STATEMENTS. Dilke's name expunged from the List of Speakers.

LONDON, Aug. 10. In order to mitigate as far as possible the disastrous results of the Crawford-Dilke scandal, the Liberals are circulating a statement to the effect that Sir Charles Dilke denies that he had criminal intercourse with Mrs. Crawford, and that to-day she herself has withdrawn the confession made to her husband, and when in the witness box she will declare that the confession was made under hysterical delusion. Crawford's friends, on the other hand, insist that he has evidence apart from his wife's confession, but that he will not persevere in the action he has begun, unless convinced that it is perfectly justifiable and absolutely necessary. The trial will be the last on the list to be heard in the Divorce Court in September next. It is significant that the name of Dilke has been in the meantime expunged from the list of speakers for the coming electoral campaign.

GEN. GRANT'S FUNERAL

A GREAT PAGEANT Dense Crowds en Route NEW YORK, Aug. 10. The last sad rites over the mortal remains of General Grant took place on Saturday. The pageant was the most superb ever witnessed in this country. The funeral car was drawn by twenty-four black horses, each led by a black man. The crowd was so dense that the military at one time had to drive them back with fixed bayonets. At the tomb the services were conducted by Gen. Meade, of the Grand Army Post, and by Bishops Harris and Rev. Mr. Newman.

The Past Fiscal Month shows a Handsome Surplus. OTTAWA, Aug. 10. A permit has been granted the Canadian Pacific Railway to build a \$250,000 grain elevator. The total revenue of the Government for the month of July was \$2,332,691; the expenditure of the Government was \$2,099,301.

The Salvation Army General in Trouble.

NEW YORK, Aug. 10. General Booth, of the Salvation Army, is in trouble about a girl. He is accused by a Mrs. Armstrong of sending an agent to decoy her daughter from her home for the purpose of making the girl a spectacle as a minor who was saved from a life of wickedness by the Salvationists. General Booth refused to give up the girl, and the mother has applied to the courts.

Fatal Fire.

MANCHESTER, N. H., Aug. 10. "The Webster Block," in this city, containing many tenements, was destroyed by fire yesterday. The loss of property is heavy and seven persons lost their lives in the flames.

A Manslaughter Case.

FATAL RESULT OF THE CARELESS USE OF FIREARMS. On Wednesday last, Judge Senkler, of Perth, heard the case of Patrick Ryan, son of Hugh Ryan, contractor, found guilty of manslaughter by a coroner's jury. Some weeks ago the young man went into the garden to test a new rifle, and used as a mark the seat of a swing. The bullet passed through the board, a boundary fence and a box, after which it entered the back of Charles Cooper, seated in a chair amusing himself with a violin, passed from the right side of the spine through the young man's bowels, and was found afterwards in his clothes in front with a piece of flesh clinging to it. Young Ryan, almost distracted by the result of his shooting, did all in his power to aid the doctors, but the wounded man died, and the jury brought in the verdict indicated.

Who has not read or heard of the grains of wheat, thousands of years old, found in the wrappings of Egyptian mummies, and which grains duly germinated on being planted? Grave doubts are now cast upon the story. The New York Journal of Commerce, in reply to correspondents, says:— We doubt if there is any well authenticated case of a grain of wheat retaining the power of germinating for a decade, and certainly after twenty years the case would be hopeless. The samples in the British Museum were undoubtedly Egyptian wheat, as they had the three spikes peculiar to that variety; and the grains probably came to England with a veritable mummy, as this was packed in straw; but Dr. Birch, of the museum, when written to on the subject, declared positively that the grains could not have been found inside of the antique wrappings, and were evidently a late Egyptian harvest.
