Religion and Life

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FOR OUR FATHER IS SUPREME REALITY
An American humorist is credited with saying: "Faith is believing what you know ain't so." He intended to be funny and to poke fun at the elaborate creeds some religious folk professed loudly to believe. In fact however, he touched the central problem of religion everywhere.

Is the object of our worship real? If so, does He hear and He respond? We have heard of a young person who was perturbed by the idea that all religion is auto-suggestion — that is, man forms his own conception of a Being behind all that is and then worships his own highest idea of what ought to be.

Now to be a believer, according to St. John, is to recognize the reality of God and of His Son who is the Word of God. Often, by the change in a word-ending, St. John makes a subtle change of meaning from Truth to Reality, and to him Christ in God is the Supreme Reality. This is the very essence of spiritual religion — life in the Supreme Reality which is God. Frances Ridley Havergal wrote: "Reality! Reality! Lord Jesus Christ Thou art to me."

And in so doing she spoke for the Christian world. Two weeks ago we studied Jesus' dealing with the Samaritan woman at Jacob's Well and the way in which He offered her a supply for her moral need before she realized that He knew her need. But when she asked Him to give her the living water of which He spoke, He went right to the heart of her problem with this demand: "Go, call your husband and come here."

This brought out the secret of her repeated violation of the sacred relationships of life which she tacitly acknowledged. Then to turn the conversation from a theme that was becoming too personal and recognizing the stranger as a prophet, she raised the question of the living water of Jerusalem: "Is Mount Gerizim or Jerusalem the place where men ought to worship?"

OPEN VIOLATION
Now the Samaritans as well as the Jews had the law of Moses, and she was living in open violation of that law. Yet she was interested in the dispute between her people and the Jews just as many today, whose manner of life all churches condemn, take life all churches condemn, take sides in the controversy between Protestant and Roman Catholic. Jesus took her problem seriously even though He felt the shallowness of her opinions. In response He gave one of His most profound statements of ultimate truth:

"Woman, believe me, the hour is coming when neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem will you worship the Father. You worship what you do not know; we worship what we know, for salvation is from the Jews. But the hour is coming, and now is, when the true worshippers will worship the Father in spirit and those who worship Him must worship in spirit and truth."

God is our Father, and the Father is where His children are. The turf may be our shrine, and our only temple the blue arch of heaven, but wherever the spirit of the child of God moves toward his Father, God is to be found and will respond. "Worship in truth" is worship offered to God by souls aware of His immediate presence and open to His answer in love.

He is the Supreme Reality to such a spirit. Worship in spirit is worship "in that highest region

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that his new experience of God had made in his view of life and the world, and the only course worthy of his new condition that he could think of was to join an old friend in a church school which served the tribes in the Far North.

There is the difference between worship that is mere form and worship in which the spirit of man joins with the Spirit of God for the fulfillment of God's design in him and for him.

God, the Creator, is so much more than the human mind can conceive that His being is shrouded in mystery, but this much of Him we know — that He is a person who commits Himself to man and links them with Himself on the highest levels of being for the outworking of purposes that are eternal.
