

Anniversary Items.

MONDAY, October 6.—The Trollope Family, as Frances (who died on the 6th of October, 1863), and her two sons, Thomas Adolphus and Anthony, were called, were all novelists, and wrote abundantly. It was the mother who wrote the "Domestic Manners of the Americans" when 53 years old, and greatly influenced our sensitive cousins. Thomas wrote "The History of the Commonwealth of Florence" 1865, and Anthony, who was long employed in the Post Office, published writings on New South Wales and Queensland, Australia, Tasmania, etc. His work, "How We Live Now," was issued in 1875.

The business at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon consisted of three drunkenness cases of profane language, one of malicious injury to property, and the serious case of Marshall Flynn vs. George McDonald, reported in another column.

DR. ROGERS, late of H. M. 70th Regiment, Chief Surgeon of Dr. M. Souvielle & Co's. Throat and Lung Institute, will be at the Rankin House on Tuesday 7th and the remainder of the week; and will be glad to see his old friends and those wishing to consult him.

THE Boston Comedy Co., under the able management of H. Price Webber, will perform in Market Hall to-night, opening with the ever favorite drama of "Fanchon the Cricket." As the Company are well liked here, we predict a full house for them. Mr. Webber's excellent reputation, made last year, will do him good service now.

FRED BARCOCK, foreman rigger for the Messrs. Richards, met with a severe accident, at Richmond Station, on Saturday last, while superintending the unloading of an iron mast from the cars. The lever, owing to some cause, sprung upwards while Mr. Barcock was on the end, throwing him into the air about twelve feet. In the fall, his head was badly bruised and cut, and one of his arms broken. The injured man was removed to Port H B, where surgical skill was procured. He will likely recover. The masts were landed from the barkentine Olivett, now in Ch'town, and are intended for a new ship building for the Hon. John Yeo.

The tramp has lately been seeking fresh scenes and pastures new. It is stated that he visited Summerside a few nights ago, and put up at the Ocean House. During the night the landlady woke up to the fact that there was a man in the room, and raised an alarm. The tramp vanished, but did not leave the house until he had first paid a visit to the room of the servant girl. Then there was a lively time in the Ocean House; but the tramp escaped in the darkness. On searching his room a mask, apparently of his own manufacture, was found in his bed. It is an extraordinary piece of workmanship—highly prized, no doubt; and the owner may have had it "on application." Should it not be called for, it will probably be exhibited at the Apothecaries Hall or some other place of public resort.

At the Y. M. C. A. Convention, held in Picton last week, papers were read by Mr. McNutt on the "Past and present history of the Association in the Maritime Provinces"; an interesting report from the executive committee was read by the same gentleman. Short speeches on Y. M. C. A. work were made by J. K. Blair, C. Primrose, T. C. James, Prof. Forrest, and others. Full reports from the Halifax Association were given by H. Theakston; from Charlottetown by John Ball; from Queen's College, Kingston, by Mr. Murray; from New Glasgow, by Rev. Mr. McGregor; from Stellarton, by Mr. Grant; from St. John, by J. E. Irvine. F. W. Hales, of Charlottetown, delivered an address on the future prospects of the associations in the provinces. It was followed by earnest practical remarks by Judge Hensley, John S. MacLean and O. W. McLeod.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.]

A Franco-Chinese Engagement.

LONDON, Oct. 4.

Advices from Hanoi, under date of to-day, state two French gunboats, while cruising in advance of a party which was reconnoitering in the valley of Lochnan, were attacked by Chinese regulars. One French officer was killed and 130 men wounded. Reinforcements have arrived at the scene of the encounter.

The French Account.

PARIS, Oct. 5.

General Delisle sends a despatch stating that, hearing that the Chinese troops between Baicle and Langsomo were moving forward, he took measures to drive them back into gunboats. A brilliant engagement ensued, four thousand Chinese troops being pitted against him. Commander Chalie, of the Massue, was killed in the fight. When the despatch was sent the Chinese were being steadily driven back and had lost heavily of their number. Col. Neguer is marching troops to march against the Chinese in Tonquin, and an engagement is soon expected.

The Egyptian Situation.

LONDON, Oct. 6.

A Cabinet Council has been suddenly summoned for Tuesday next. It is reported that the Council is called to consider the position that has been taken in Egyptian affairs. It is believed that there is a basis of truth in the reported recall of Gen. Lord Wolseley. He will go as far as Dongola; but the expedition up the Nile will be abandoned if communication is open by Gen. Gordon's co-operation. Gen. Gordon being at Berber, it is now projected to advance the camel corps with a small force of cavalry from Suakin to his support. New proposals for the settlement of the Egyptian financial question will be presented to the powers upon the return of Earl Northbrook.

News from Cairo.

CAIRO, Oct. 4.

Brigadier General Grinnell, of the Egyptian army, has been appointed to the command of Assouan and its line of communications.

It is reported that the Mahdi is advancing towards the White Nile. He probably intends to cross the river at Duern.

Major Kitchener reports that Colonel Stewart, with troops from Khartoum, is stranded on the rocks in the cataract at Wady Gavana, and asks that the Mudir of Dongola's troops be sent to his assistance. The Black Watch regiment is at Assouan. Three hundred and seventy Egyptian cavalry horses have gone to Wady Halfa by water for use by the 19th Hussars.

News from Wady Halfa.

WADY HALFA, Oct. 5.

Messengers reports that Gen Gordon has returned to Khartoum.

The robatal tribe dispersed on hearing of the death of their leader in the battle of Kartiz.

Gen. Wolseley is here and is reported to remain sometime.

Statesmen at Loggerheads.

LONDON, Oct. 5.

Mr. Gladstone and Lord Salisbury fail to agree. Gladstone absolutely refused to entertain a proposition to introduce the redistribution bill in the House of Commons, before the House of Lords should pass the Franchise Bill.

A Surrender.

DUBLIN, Oct. 5.

A report here says the actress Miss Fortescue receives \$125,000 and surrenders the letters in her possession, including those of Lord Cairns. Lord Garmogle refused to submit to cross examinations by Counsellor Russell.

Great Fire.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 5.

A fire occurred here to-day, burning Hancock's storage warehouse, Crown street. Nine adjacent dwelling houses were also destroyed by falling walls. Loss, \$250,000.
