TUESDAY

Messages from Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth and His Honour Lieutenant Governor Prowse, and a personal visit from Premier J. Walter Jones, were among the many tokens of felicitation received by Mrs. William Smith, of Lower Newtown, on the occasion of her 100th birthday anniversary last Sunday.

Mrs. Smith, who was formerly Miss Mary Elizabeth MacTavish, now lives at the home of her daughter, Katie (Mrs. D. A. MacTavish) at Lower Newtown, where she herself was born a century ago.

She was married in 1887 to Mr. William Smith, and after her husband's death in 1903 went to the United States, where she had previously spent some years, and later resided some time with her son in Western Canada. Since her return from the West in 1925 she has lived with her daughter in Lower town.

Mr. F. A. Driscoll, Parkdale, head poultryman at the Dominion Experimental Farm, Charlottetown, retires today after thirty-three years service with the Dominion Department of Agriculture.

The date has added significance for Mr. Driscoll, for it also marks his sixtieth birthday, and it is the anniversary of his enlistment with the Princess Patricia's in World War One.

Part of Mr. Driscoll's service with the Department of Agriculture was served at the Experimental Farm Branch at Kentville, Nova Scotia.

"Not one man in the station service, a sectionman or a bridge and building department employee will be effected by the proposed change over to bus service," said Mr. Frank A. Gaffney, Chief of Transportation Research for the Canadian National Railways.

Mr. Gaffney also brought out that there would be no stations abandoned in the Province and that there would be a daily freight service maintained. Both of these points he emphasized were contrary to rumors prevalent.

He said that the Railway was not asking for anything as he pointed out that the company was present in response to recommendations by the Provincial Government and private individuals to the Turgeon Royal Commission on Transportation.

He added: "I think I should

stress to you that our proposal is unique in this respect. We are offering a modern highway service with all of the flexibility, comfort and speed made possible by the operation of the best type buses. In addition, we say to you that, during the periods of the year when it is impossible to give a service by highway, we will restore service by rail." He also stated that "despite weather and road conditions" all passenger services will be continuous.

The body of a man found on a sandbar at Black Banks on May 23rd by James MacDonald of Portage and Frank Arsenault of Summerside has been identified as Joseph Blais of Pabos Mills, Gaspé South, Quebec, who has been missing from his home since last December and was believed to have been drowned.

Identification was made by a sock, which was knitted by a daughter of the deceased, and part of the index finger being missing from the right hand. The late Mr. Blais was a married man with a large family and was about sixty-years of age.

The freak storm, amounting to a miniature cloudburst which passed around the outskirts of the city from Bunbury, via the golf links and westward to the lower Malpeque Road yesterday morning caused damage on many of the roads and brought grief to farmers who had fields flooded. In several places the recently planted seed and even fertilizer, was washed away, necessitating re-planting at considerable loss of time and material.

The unusual rush of water caused by the heavy rain made the north end of the lower Malpeque Road one huge gully which overran the embankment at Gates mill, filling the pond to the extent that the wastegate was carried away. Government men were engaged during the late afternoon repairing the highway bridge, which had also been damaged.

ly damaged. By evening traffic was moving cautiously over the flooded area. Work of restoring the wastegate is being done under the supervision of Mr. Fred Gates, on whose property the pond and mill are located.

Strong emphasis on the serious overcrowding in this city was placed last night by Dr. Wendell MacDonald, City Health Officer when he presented his report at the regular monthly meeting of the Council.

He said there was a serious housing problem existing and citizens should realize how acute it has become in the past five years through failure of building to keep pace with the growth of the city. He did not know how it could be overcome, as he realized the city could not go into the real estate business. But he insisted that something had to be done.

At the same meeting four citizens offered a partial solution in agreeing to give the city land to cut a new road from North River Road down to meet Crestwood Drive and Admiral street. This would permit the opening up for new housing developments of over 30 acres of land. The new road will go between the homes of Mr. Donald MacKinnon and his son, L.P. MacKinnon, passing towards the West River through lands owned by Mr. Charles Toombs and Maj. T.B. Rogers.

A hearty "Welcome Home" reminiscence of the receptions tendered veterans returning from World War 2 was given to the four veterans of the conflict in Korea who arrived in Charlottetown by train at 6:15 last evening. The men were met on arrival by a reception committee headed by President Charles M. Sinclair of the Charlottetown Branch, Canadian Legion, B. E. S. I. and conveyed to Legion headquarters where they were warmly greeted by relatives and friends.

After an enjoyable lunch, prepared and served by the Ladies Auxiliary, President Sinclair introduced Chief of Police Chas. MacArthur, who had been delegated to welcome the returned men by Mayor Stewart.

THURSDAY

Ignoring vested interests and trying to look at the overall picture of general improvement in service was the attitude taken by the Council of the Charlottetown Board of Trade in preparing its brief for submission to the Legislative Transportation Committee. This was told the Committee yesterday as it resumed its hearings in Supreme Court on the application of the Canadian National Railways for bus licenses in this Province.

The witness was Mr. A. Walthen Gaudet, secretary of the Board of Trade, who read the brief which appeared in full in Tuesday's Guardian. Under cross-examina-

tion he said the Board felt that any proposed change would have little effect on this city but that the prosperity of the rural areas was desired.

It was the final session of the hearings in this city. Another session of the Committee will be held this morning in Georgetown, and a final one on Friday in Summerside.

A resolution ratifying the action of the Council of the Charlottetown Board of Trade in submitting a brief to the Legislative Committee on the C. N. R. bus proposal was passed at the Board's annual meeting at The Charlottetown last night. More than 100 members and guests were in attendance and considerable discussion followed the introduction of the resolution, which was moved by secretary J. Walthen Gaudet and seconded by Mr. Frank Curtis.

Vice president J. Gordon MacDonald, who presided, was elected president for the ensuing year.

FRIDAY

The sudden death occurred at his home, 24 Upper Hillsboro Street, about midnight last evening, of Mr. James Robertson Burnett, editor and managing director of The Guardian newspaper. Mr. Burnett had been at his office as usual yesterday, and was apparently in good health. His death occurred shortly after he had retired for the night, and was due to a heart attack. He was in his eighty-second year.

A native of Aberdeen, Scotland, son of John and Mary Burnett, Mr. Burnett had spent sixty-four years in active journalism. He was a charter member and former director of the Canadian Press, a Fellow of the Institute of Journalists, a Fellow of the Royal Society of Arts and Sciences of London, and of the Royal Empire Society.

The death occurred in the Prince Edward Island Hospital last evening of Mr. T. Wiffled Bentley, C.L.U., well known former branch manager of the Maritime Life Assurance Company, from which position he retired early in the year of this year after a distinguished career in the insurance business. He was retained by the company in the capacity of Supervisor for the Province, due to his thorough grasp of the life insurance business.

OTTAWA, June 11.—Expansion of Prince Edward Island health services was recommended today in a report tabled in the Commons by Health Minister Martin. The report, one of a series being financed by the Federal Government, suggested that voluntary prepaid hospital plans be continued and extended to private preventive medicine as well as curative treatment, and for diagnostic consultation services at a minimum flat fee. It also urged that the Government pay the premiums of needy persons to bring them into the plan and that the medical profession participate in the administration.

Reassurance that the Canadian National Proposal was not part of a plan to abandon any lines was given yesterday by Mr. F.A. Gaffney in reply to Maj. John A. MacDonald, M.L.A. during the hearing in Georgetown yesterday before the Transportation Committee. Mr. MacDonald had said there was some worry about the railway taking up its lines if the proposal were granted. He said this would be serious as frequently shippers would be unable to move potatoes and turnips by truck and there were many trackside warehouses depending on the railway for service.

That there would be many poor children neglected if it were not for the work of the service clubs was stated last night by His Honour Lieutenant Governor T. W. L. Prowse as he officially opened the annual Kinsmen Spring Carnival. In expressing his pleasure at being asked to officiate he said the Kinsmen were one of the service clubs "which we are proud to have with us."

There was a good attendance even in the early hours as the parade of the colorful Prince Street School Band led the way to the Forum. They were headed by two attractive Drum Majorettes who carried a banner announcing the opening.

The origin of the Provincial Health Planning Commission, whose voluminous report was released for publication yesterday, dates from 1948. At that time the Prime Minister announced at Ottawa that \$30,000,000 in health grants would be made available annually to the Provinces. Prince Edward Island's share in 1948-49 was in the following amounts: Under the several grants: Crippled children \$7,473; professional training \$7,473; hospital construction \$27,308; venereal disease \$2,058; mental health \$53,257; tuberculosis control \$46,774; public health research (not apportioned by Province); health survey (not of annual occurrence) \$15,000; general public health \$32,900; cancer control \$26,198.
