Lieut. H. R. Magill Was Active In Militia

TORONTO, April 21.—(C.P.)—Herman B. Magill, 30-year-old Toronto lawyer dead at Moose River, was until two months ago a partner with R. G. H. Fleming, investment counsellor. He developed an interest in mining and left Toronto to devote his attention to rehabilitating the mine property at Moose River, of which he was part owner.

He had been spending a short holiday here with his wife and two little girls, Patricia, nine and Joyce Ariene, three, and left with Dr. Robertson Good Friday morning to inspect the mine.

Mr. Magill was a platoon commander of the Toronto Scottish Regiment. A lieutenant, he had joined the regiment five years ago and had been one of its most active young officers. Several months ago he was transferred to the reserve battalion when he requested permission to leave Toronto to go to Moose River.

FISHING, FAN MAIL OCCUPY ZANE GREY

Life has been anything but a holiday for Zane Grey, the American author and big game fisherman, since he went to Australia recently to begin his search for big fish.

He estimated after the first week that he had signed about 5,000 autographs and that he had talked with as many people. He had posed for hundreds of photographs.

Three people who traveled more than 300 miles to see him had a longer audience than most others, an "Zane Grey autographed books for them. Shows of letters came from all parts of Australia, and each day the volume increases. Zane Grey is facing new conditions in Australian waters, and is spending much time planning his tactics. He landed his first swordfish after a great struggle, and what pleased him more, he saw several others. He regarded this as the best possible indication of fine sport to come when the swordfish season begins in earnest. —Australian Press Bureau.

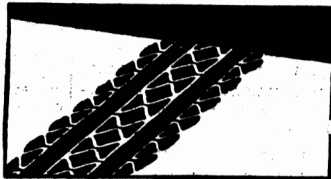

HIDING THE EVIDENCE OF YOUR COSMETICS

In these days the dressing-table is apt to become overcrowded with toilet bottles of all sizes. Few dressing-tables are fitted with a handy cupboard or a top drawer deep enough to take these bottles upright. It is a good plan to buy from the chemist a number of shorter bottles of convenient height and to fill them occasionally from the larger ones, which can be kept elsewhere. These smaller bottles can be held firmly without falling over with the motion of the drawer by a simple contrivance. Take a yard and a half of strong ribbon or inch-wide elastic and fasten one end with a drawing-pin to the wall

of the drawer in the near right-hand corner. Make a series of loops, fixing each with a drawing-pin, across to the left-hand corner. A dozen bottles may thus be kept as securely as in a dressing-case and in a private and convenient position.
