



GEORGE MOORE

Couple were found seriously injured by girl's parents who had rushed over to George's house after Beverley had hurriedly interrupted a telephone conversation with her mother. The girl died two hours after admittance to hospital. The boy succumbed four hours later.

Fourteen-year-old Beverley Thrush and her steady "boy friend" George Moore, 15, both of Toronto, died in hospital shortly after they had been found lying unconscious on the floor of the boy's home. They both had bullet wounds, caused by a .22 calibre rifle, found on floor near boy's body, in the head. Police said they believed the couple had struggled, but added there was no signs of a struggle.
