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OBITUARY.

"In the midst of life we are in death" has never probably been so clearly exemplified as in the sad death of Mr. John Hughes, proprietor of the Dominion House, Emerald, which sad occurrence took place on his return homeward from St. John on the evening of the 14th inst. Although death is that supreme law before which all must in obedience bow, a thought we see that heartless messenger every day, in every form, striking right and left without discrimination as to persons, station or age, yet the daily recurring spectacle does not in any way remove the bitterness of the sting it inflicts nor lessen in any degree the incredible sense of pain it carries with it, for beneath the darkened shadows of that Angel's wing, separation from all we cherish and love is involved. To one, who has reached the allotted span of life's years death whenever it comes, cannot be said to come unexpected, but when it occurs, as so suddenly and unexpectedly, in the prime of vigorous manhood, a man of honor, of integrity, of sterling honesty and repit, ten-fold greater than becomes death's sore sting and ten-fold deeper does its grim visit fill the hearts of those who are left to mourn. Such a death it is our sad and painful duty to chronicle. On the morning of the 14th inst., Mr. Hughes in the prime of life, in the full enjoyment of health, left his home about ten o'clock and having completed his business in Summerside was soberly and quietly returning home with a span of horses, and a heavy load of lumber and a barrel of lime when he accidentally fell from his wagon and thus met his death. There he lay but a few miles from Summerside and not long distant from his home, until found by Mr. O. K. E. The holding of an inquest been deemed unnecessary by the coroner the body was removed to the undertaker's in Centerville from where it was taken to his home early on the following morning. On Wednesday night his eldest son entertaining some apprehensions in not finding his father home at the regular hour started for Summerside in search of him and passed the very spot, where a few hours before, his father had been killed. Under such sad circumstances has death in one of its most appalling forms taken by surprise the wife, children, relatives and many friends of the deceased, and being wholly unprepared for the sad event it is almost impossible to convince the unwilling mind that the subject of this passing notice has passed away from earth, that he, whom we know so well, is gone, that his face so familiar will be seen no more, and that his gentle voice is forever hushed. But alas, too true are the sorrowing revelations of the night's accident. But while we, sorrowing, gaze in the face these distressing facts, we are, however, consoled to know that the prayerful chorus of acquaintances and admirers will arise in devout fervour, that his sudden and untimely death after all is but a removal from this unstable world to a higher and brighter land into which no sorrows enter but where peace and bliss abound. The deceased being one of our most progressive farmers, he was consequently well and most favorably known throughout the province. As a farmer he was industrious, thrifty and highly successful and all to-day with him his occupation brought him extensively into business relations can bear testimony to the fairness, straightforwardness, honest and exact principle which characterized him in all his business transactions. He was an enthusiastic worker in many cause tending to elevate the interest of his fellow farmers and was one of the largest patrons of the Emerald Dairying Association, for the establishment of which he was a zealous advocate. As a citizen he was ever identified with every movement calculated to advance and promote the welfare of the community in which he lived. As a man he was obliging, sociable and intelligent, of a sober and exemplary character and ever ready to assist and relieve the needy by that, genial hos-

pitality and charity of which there remain abundant evidences to testify to the kind philanthropic sympathy which filled his generous and noble heart. In him hypocrisy and double-dealing had a stern denunciator for honour and justice were the principles to which in life he closely adhered. He was a model Christian, a devout Catholic and a prominent member of the Benevolent Irish Society of Emerald, which society, in regular and in full force, together with over one hundred and thirty carriages, followed his remains on Friday morning to Kinkora, where a solemn requiem mass was chanted by Rev. J. J. McDonald, while the sad rites at the grave were performed by Rev. Dr. Doyle, Vernon River. The funeral cortege in which Charlottetown, Summerside and other parts of the province were represented, was the largest ever seen in this community and bore evidence of the esteem and popularity in which the deceased was held. The pall-bearers were: James Eden, G. R. McMahon, Albert Craig, Terrence Goodwin, James Porter and James McDona'd.

At a regular meeting of the Benevolent Irish Society on the 17th inst., the following resolution of condolence was passed: Whereas, it has pleased Almighty God in His Divine wisdom to call from our much esteemed and highly respected brother, the late John Hughes; and Whereas, the members of the Benevolent Irish Society, Emerald, have learned with deep feelings of sorrow of the sudden and untimely death of such an esteemed member of this Society. Be it resolved that we extend to Mrs. Hughes and family the assurance of our heartfelt sympathy in the great sorrow, which has fallen upon them through the loss of a model husband and loving father, whose sudden and unexpected death has ended an exemplary life, well spent in works of usefulness and in the practice of manly and christian virtues. Be it further resolved that these resolutions be incorporated in the minutes of this Society, and that copies be forwarded to the sorely bereaved wife and family and to the Watchman and EXAMINER for publication.

So with him now life's journey is o'er, and in his native parish his remains are silently resting while his soul has been summoned to a higher and brighter world far beyond the confines of earth. By his death the province has lost an honest, upright man, the church a true and faithful member, the community of Emerald an ideal and respectable citizen, his wife a kind and zealous husband, and his family a model and loving father. To his sorrowing wife and bereaved family our heartfelt sympathy flows out, while we pray God to give them fortitude and strength to bear the irreparable loss they have sustained. May his soul rest in peace.
