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Denies Charges Of Extravagance In Queen's Yacht

LONDON, (AP) — The government has denied charges of a labor buster that the Queen's new yacht Britannia was built in a wild burst of extravagance. J. P. L. Thomas, first lord of the admiralty told the House of Commons Wednesday that the late King George VI, the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh, had requested that "every kind of economy" be used in building the vessel. "If I may say so there has been a great deal of exaggeration about this," Thomas said. "The increase in the expenditure on the royal yacht is comparatively small, indeed very small compared with increases of shipbuilding costs generally since the period when the yacht was laid down."

Mr. MacDonald spoke of the excellent results obtained from the dairy display booth at the Maritime Winter Fair. It was the first time such a booth had been operated and it drew much favorable comment and many visitors who were particularly attracted by the island cheese shown. Helicopter From S'side Fails To Find Sealing Ship With Injured Seamen

—Poor visibility in falling snow yesterday afternoon prevented the navy helicopter from locating the sealing ship M.V. Truls with two injured seamen on board, in an area reported to be about 10 miles southwest of Amherst Island in the Magdalen Islands. The helicopter, carrying a medical officer, returned to base at Summerside about 4 p.m. after a three-hour flight in which an unsuccessful search of the area was carried out in an effort to locate the ship. One of the men is suffering from a cut in the head from a sealing knife, and was reported to be in serious condition from loss of blood. The other seaman is reported to have a broken arm. It is believed that there is no connection between the two injuries as one of the men was transferred from the 800 ton M.V. Theron to the 270 ton M.V. Truls when it became known that a helicopter would be sent to the area on this mercy flight. Both vessels are reportedly owned and operated by Karl Karlsen out of Halifax. The helicopter traveled the 95 miles to the spot which the ship was reported to be distant from Summerside, and conducted a search of the area. It landed on the ice beside the only ship it was able to locate, and was advised that the ship they were looking for would be about five miles distant. However, a search of the area in extremely poor visibility was unsuccessful and the helicopter was obliged to return to Summerside. Its pilot reported that the snow covering ice, together with the snow falling at the time, made it impossible to see any distance. This morning at dawn, aircraft from Summerside will be sent out to locate the ship, and the helicopter will return to the area with an R.C.A.F. doctor. As the ship does not have enough deck space on which to land the helicopter, and as it would not be advisable to try to lift the injured man by winch, it
