

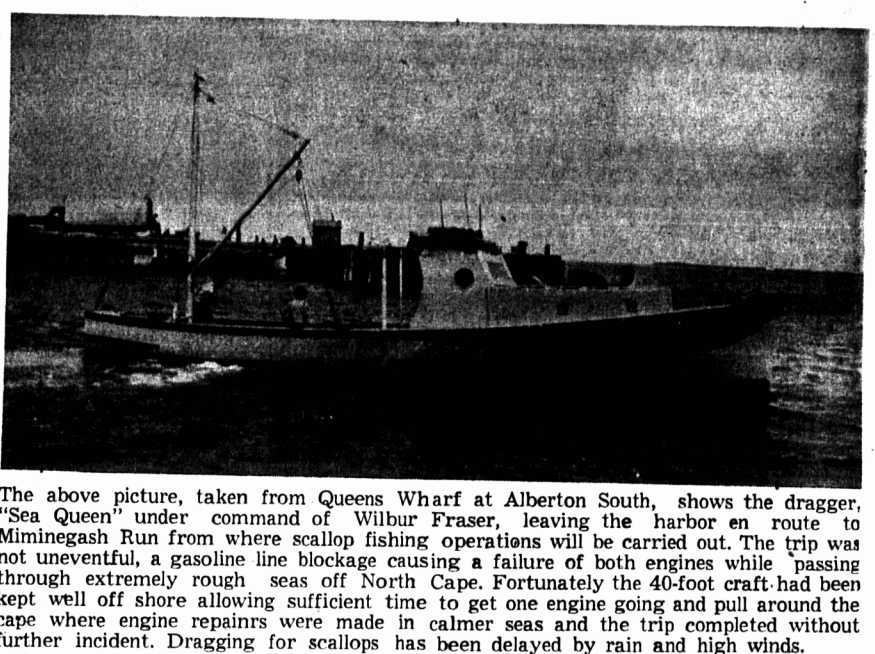
West Prince W.M.S. Rally Services Held Yesterday At United Church In O'Leary

British Scientists Probe Air Pollution As Possible Cause Of Lung Cancer

LONDON (Reuters) - Scientists here are studying city air pollution and weighing the percentage difference in lung cancer between city and country dwellers, the British cancer campaign was told Tuesday. An annual report said that not only were city men more apt to get lung cancer than country men, but they were definitely more apt to get it than city women. "A point that emerges is that for cancer of the lung the urbanization gradient is distinctly steeper in men than in women," it declared. The report said that investigations comparing air pollution and the frequency of lung cancer are being made in England, Norway, Denmark and Iceland.

Bruns- wick and one from Malpeque were each fined \$35 and costs for possession of short lobsters and a fisherman from the Malpeque area was fined thirteen dollars and costs for the same offence.

Mr. MacNaught Returns To S'ide From Ottawa

Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, federal Liberal member for Prince County and Parliamentary Assistant to the Minister of Fisheries and Game, returned to Summerside on Monday evening from Ottawa. Mr. MacNaught described the recent session of the House of Commons as very interesting with a lot of interesting legislation passed, most voluminous of which was the consolidation of and revision of the Criminal Code and the decennial of the Bank Act. This was the longest session since occurred in 1903 with 155 sitting days and the second longest took 147 days in 1907. Mr. MacNaught will be in his office on Fridays and Saturdays.
