Elegant Chic Chicken -- Beat The Drumsticks

FOR generations in this country, chicken was the most elegant among the entrees. Chickie and more chicken—that was a homemaker's dream.

Chicken was expensive. To devise or learn new ways to make it "go farther" was an important facet of poultry cookery.

At last there was a breakthrough. Chicken production was brought out of the small farm - growing class and has become a gigantic scientific industry.

Today, chicken is just as "elegant," although budget-wise in price, as it was years ago. It's a treat for everyone.

But what can be done to keep the "chic" in chicken cookery is the problem bothering many hostesses. From world travel has come new ways; many have been featured in this column.

These include Chicken Marengo; Chicken Paella; Chicken Curry; Chicken Persian, Swedish Japanese, Chinese or Caribbean, and many others; some quick, simple, easy to prepare, others calling for longer cooking.

In today's column, we feature a new way with chicken drumsticks.

TOMORROW'S DINNER Winter Fruit Saladettes Broiled Drumsticks a la Mode with

Buttered Rice, Sliced Carrots and Brussels Sprouts Caramel-Cup Custards Or Sliced Oranges Topped with Coconut Coffee or Tea Milk Measurements level; recipes for 4

WINTER FRUIT SALADETTES 2 navel oranges, peeled and sectioned 4 medium bananas, all-yellow, peeled, diagonally sliced 1 grapefruit peeled and sectioned

1 red apple, cored and sliced 1 cup seeded halved dark grapes 1 avocado, peeled and sliced Fruit Salad Dressing (recipe follows) 1/4 head Western iceberg lettuce Pomegranate seeds, optional Chill fruits and avocado, then dip in Fruit Salad Dressing to prevent darkening. Arrange on lettuce - covered salad plates Garnish saladettes with pomegranate seeds for exotic color, if desired. Pass Fruit Salad Dressing.

Fruit Salad Dressing: Mix 1/2 c. salad oil, 1-3 c. cider vinegar 1 tsp. dark brown sugar, 1/4 tsp. onion salt and 1/4 tsp. pepper. Combine and stir before serving.

BROILED DRUMSTICKS A LA MODE 1 1/2 tsp. seasoned salt 1/4 c. melted butter or margarine 1/4 tsp. each ground savory, rosemary, tarragon and thyme 2 tbsp. lemon juice 1 tsp. white vinegar 6 or more chicken drumsticks as desired

Textile Printer Of Furs Now Picasso Of The Pelts

By PEGGY MASSIN-PARIS (Reuters) — Printed furs are the latest fashion craze in Paris. Supple flat-haired furs such as river otter, seal, and pony skin are printed with textile patterns in bold multi-colored tartans, hound's tooth checks, stripes, and shadow plaids.

No new idea has so revolutionized the French fur industry since furriers launched bleached beaver and other artificial blonde pelts 15 years ago. Paradoxically, many smart Frenchwomen, who consider that the epitome of bad taste is to wear a fur coat over a printed dress, are among the strongest partisans of printed furs.

Chombert, the man who originated the novel idea of printed furs this winter, has earned the nickname of Picasso of the Pelts. This designer's new collection, featuring 200 fur models, is the largest in Paris.

Once a fur automatically became a coat, a jacket, or a stole. For the last few years, Paris furriers, with Christian Dior, Pierre Balmain, Revillon, and Chombert leading the field, have evolved supple furs in every type of garment. There are fur pants, fur shirts, fur skirts, and fur hostess clothes. Balenciaga reached the pinnacle of luxury with his floor-length dressing gown made of white mink or chinchilla.

Chombert's furs are waterproofed. Mink, otter, beaver, and leopard have suddenly acquired all the practicality of an umbrella, without in any way changing their original aspect. Roger Vivier, the shoe designer, is showing a collection of handbags and footwear in the same seemingly fragile pelts. Amusing leggings, gaiters, knee-high boots, and roomy travel bags appear in Chombert's water-repellent skins, destined to match, or contrast with his fur raincoats.

Pierre Cardin shows the most exotic monkey fur coat in Paris. He has dyed the long-haired skins bright green, and then worked them upside down. Long fronds of fur sprout out from the body, so that the model looks somewhat like a palm tree suddenly come to life.

Two hrs. or more in advance, combine and mix salt, butter, seasonings, lemon juice, vinegar in qt. shallow bowl to make marinade.

Dolls Sport Side Pigtails And Roughly Painted Faces

By JOHN BEST MOSCOW (CP)—Russian dolls in Brigitte Bardot hairdos? The idea may sound slightly absurd, but evidently some Russian toy manufacturers don't think so.

They were taken to task in the newspaper Pravda for showing poor taste and for poor-quality production.

"In shops we see a lot of dolls—small and big, in nylon dresses and cotton dresses; they differ from one another but they have something in common: roughly-painted faces and terrible hair styles."

For some reason, complained Vera Tkachenko, writer of the article, many Russian producers find it "impossible" these days to turn out dolls with side pigtails, the traditional Russian style.

Instead, dolls with such names as Svetlana, Alena and Nushenka inconspicuously sport "fashionable Babetts"—a reference to the ponytail hairdo worn by Miss Bardot in a movie which ran here several years ago, making the style suddenly popular in the Soviet Union.

TOYS REJECTED The Pravda article complained about poor quality and lack of imagination in the production of toys generally. Twenty per cent of all production in one economic region, which accounts for 72 per cent of the Soviet Union's output, was rejected on the grounds of quality, it said.

"There are few toys with mechanisms and electric engines, few construction sets. The low artistic and technical level of toys is explained by inadequately staffed design bureaus, it said, explaining that some enterprises have no painters or designers at all.

The Pravda article came out at the height of the New Year's shopping season here—the Russian exchange gifts at New Year's the way people in Western lands do at Christmas.
