Death Friday Of Mrs. Artemus Wright

Mrs. Artemus P. Wright passed away after a brief illness on Friday March 12th at the home of her son, Mr. Elliott Wright, in her 98th year.

The deceased, the former Louise Ellen Campbell, was born on July 19th, 1856 to the late Mr. Peter Campbell and his wife Harriet Craswell, at Bonshaw. After receiving her early education in the district school, she attended the Normal School in Charlottetown and later taught in various schools in the province. Completing a successful career in teaching, she took up the nursing profession at Danvers, Massachusetts, where she met and married her husband. A year later, 1888, Mr. and Mrs. Wright returned to their native province and settled on a farm in Middleboro where the family was born and where they spent the remainder of their lives.

The deceased was a loyal member of the Church of Scotland and was deeply interested in community and world events, maintaining all her faculties until the last. She was a woman of sterling character and highly esteemed by all cases and friends.

There are left to cherish her memory, two sons and one daughter, Harry and Elliott in Middleboro and Gertrude, Mrs. James Cairns in Summerside, seven grand children and eight great grandchildren. Her husband predeceased her in 1942.

The funeral service will be held this afternoon at 1.30 o'clock from the home of her son, Elliott Wright and interment will be in Lower Bedeque Cemetery.
