An amusing incident occurred in one of the cases tried at the County Court at Amherst this week. In order to prevent men being enlisted in a militia corps who are undersized, under age and too weak to perform the duties of a soldier, it is ordered that the enrolling officer, before permitting the recruit to sign the roll of the corps, is to satisfy himself that the man's height and age are as required by regulations, that his general health is good, and that in all respects he is fit for the duties to be required of him.

A MONSTER MEETING was held in the Mechanics' Institute, St. John, N. B., on Thursday evening last, to protest against the proposal to make Halifax and Portland the winter terminals of Canadian trade. Resolutions were adopted asking the government to give the delegates to Ottawa an explicit promise that Portland be struck out of the ocean mail contract and St. John inserted. The meeting was entirely non-partisan in character, leading representative men on both sides taking part.

Boston Markets.

NOVEMBER 10. EGGS.—The demand for fresh Eggs is fully equal to the supply and prices are firm. Sales of Eastern extras at 26c, and Eastern and Northern firsts range from 23 to 25c. Best marks of P. E. Island and Nova Scotia command 24c. Ice house stock dull. Lined quiet at 17 to 18c.

POTATOES.—Receipts continue liberal and prices have eased off a little more. For the best Houlton Hebrons 60c is a top price, and Rose do not go over 55c. Burbank and Potatoes 45 to 50c. Chenangoes and other Provincial stock are hard to sell at over 45c.

FISH TRADE.—The demand for mackerel is not active, but stocks are small and prices are well maintained. Receipts the past week foot up 1,900 bbls, including 1,439 bbls from foreign ports and 431 bbls from domestic sources. The total New England catch up to date is 78,704 bbls against 327,005 bbls same time last year and 415,933 bbls in 1885. Sales of Bay at \$28 to \$30 for extra No. 1, and \$11.50 to \$12 for No. 2. Very few P. E. Island or Nova Scotia mackerel offering. We quote nominally as follows:—Un-culled lots \$11 to \$14; No. 1 extra \$25; No. 1 ordinary \$15 to \$18; No. 2 \$11 to \$12, No. 3 large \$9 to \$10 per bbl. Sales of Bay mackerel in fares at \$15 per bbl, sea packed, an advance of 50c per bbl.

Frightful Loss of Life.

"It is astonishing," says the North Sydney Herald, "the number of Nova Scotia and Cape Breton lives that are every year sacrificed while fishing in American vessels. At one time during the past summer there were nineteen dories missing, some of the occupants of which died a most horrible death. If the American government had any regard for the lives of those engaged in their fishing vessels, they would pass a law compelling the masters of fishing vessels to supply each dory with a store of water and some hard bread before it is sent out to tend the trawls. This would prevent many of the horrible deaths that are constantly occurring where fishermen, unable, on account of fog or storm, to find the schooner, are left to drift in their dories. A number of men have been lost in this way this season, and many more have been picked up in the last stages of exhaustion or starvation. In one case a dory has been picked up in which the hunger had become so severe as to lead to cannibalism."

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.)

Captain Glen Arrested.

HALIFAX, Nov. 12. Captain Glen and Mate Gordon, of the bark Joy, have been arrested for the murder of the seaman Pierce, on the high seas, off the coast of Java 13 months ago. This is the first British port the ship touched since the crime was committed. In the Captain's letter to the Chronicle he says: "I am not going to make any reply at present, other than to say that the statements you published are wholly untrue so far as they charge me with any misconduct or any offence or crime or cruel treatment."

Storms and Tidal Waves.

PARIS, Nov. 12. The city of Nice has been visited by immense waves. From the Mediterranean the water swept away quays and promenades in the Angler's plantation. Upwards of a hundred persons were carried off their feet and the promenade covered with sand. At Cannes a fierce storm has been raging and two vessels are known to have been wrecked. Men standing on the quays were carried out to sea on immense waves. The city of Aix is so badly flooded that travelling the streets is impossible, except in boats.

The Afghan Rebellion.

BOMBAY, Nov. 12. The Ghilzais rebels in Afghanistan, have been attacked by an Afghan general sent to subdue them, and badly defeated. The general sent to Cabul ten carloads of heads of rebels killed in battle, as a token of the victory his forces had won.

Archer's Funeral.

LONDON, Nov. 12. The funeral of Fred Archer took place to-day at Newmarket. Business was suspended in the whole town. One hundred wreaths were placed upon the jockey's coffin, among the senders being the Marquis of Ailesbury, Mr. Lorillard, and various racing clubs.

A Throne Declined.

SOPIA, Nov. 12. The King of Denmark, on behalf of his son, has sent a telegram to Tirnova, expressing thanks for the honor conferred upon his son, but declining upon any condition to allow him to accept the throne.

Shipping Disaster.

NEW YORK, Nov. 12. The steamer San Marcos, from Galveston, Nov. 6th, which arrived here to-day, reports that off Coffins Hatches beacon she passed a large English vessel bottom up, directly in the track of south-bound vessels.

A Revolting Case.

MONTREAL, Nov. 12. Dumais, charged with maltreating Marie Joubert was before the court to-day. Joubert's testimony places the case among the most revolting ever before the courts.

Assignments.

MONTREAL, Nov. 12. Six firms and individuals assigned to-day with liabilities ranging from \$50,000 to \$120,000.

The Stockyard Strike.

CHICAGO, Nov. 12. The impression to-night is that the Stockyard strike will be settled before Monday.
