MONDAY

The largest Corpus Christi procession ever held in Charlottetown proceeded through the City Streets yesterday from the Basilica to Notre Dame Convent as the congregations of the Basilica and Holy Redeemer parishes favored by perfect weather conditions, turned out in record breaking numbers.

The procession formed up in front of the Basilica following High Mass and moved off about 11:30 with His Excellency Bishop James Boyle carrying the Blessed Sacrament. The guard of honor for the Blessed Sacrament was formed by Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, K.C.S.G. and members of the Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus.

Prior to his visit to Charlottetown on June 7, Lieutenant Governor Ray Lawson of Ontario will visit the other three Atlantic Provinces.

Accompanying him on his tour will be Mrs. Lawson, and Lieut. Colonel Tom Lawson, son of and A. D. C. to the Lieutenant Governor. The party will arrive in Halifax early this week, and will leave that centre on May 31 by motor for Sydney, Cape Breton.

His Honor will address the annual meeting of the Sydney Board of Trade that evening, and will be introduced by the Rev. Stanley Walker, President of King's University, of which his Honor is Chancellor.

The following day the party will motor over the Cabot Trail, returning to Sydney in time for the official party to fly to St. John's Newfoundland, on June 3, where they will be the guests of Sir Leonard and Lady Outerbridge at Government House.

They will leave St. John's on June 6 by plane for Moncton where they will be welcomed by the Board of Trade and city officials, and will leave for Charlottetown on the following morning.

Master Floyd Paynter, age 7, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leith Paynter of Springfield, died in the Prince County Hospital yesterday afternoon as a result of injuries received when he was apparently struck by a New Brunswick car driven by Harold Gordon Humphries of St. John, N. B. The accident occurred at about 2:30 p.m.

Along with several other children, the Paynter boy had been driving a home from school by a neighbor, Mr. Ivan Lamb, who had stopped on the highway by the lane leading to the Paynter home to let the boy out. He started across the pavement and as far as can be learned was struck by the New Brunswick car which was proceeding from Kensington in the direction of Charlottetown.

He was immediately rushed to the Prince County Hospital where he died shortly after arrival. An autopsy was performed to determine the cause of death. A coroner's jury was empaneled and after viewing the body and the car adjourned until this evening at five o'clock when an inquest will be opened in the Town Hall.

An estimated 8,000 people crowded into the Provincial Exhibition grounds yesterday afternoon to hear Rev. Patrick Peyton, founder of the Family Rosary Crusade, in a soul-stirring half hour address on family prayer.

Speaking amid rain showers on the platform of the judges' stand in centre field, Father Peyton in his humble and sincere yet forceful manner depicted the beauty of the Family Rosary and its benefits to homes.

His goal, he said, was to receive pledges from 10,000,000 families who were willing to recite the Rosary daily. The 8,000 people who braved the showers bore silent testimony that Prince Edward Island Roman Catholics would do their part.

Most Reverend James Boyle, Bishop of Charlottetown, introduced Father Peyton. Chairman of the Rally was Lieutenant Colonel Leo F. MacDonald.

One-half hour prior to the opening of the programme the Recce Band, under the direction of Bandmaster Tom MacFarlane, played appropriate hymns. The Fourth Degree Knights of Columbian were present on the stage along with the Men's Choir under the direction of Mr. Frank MacIntyre.

Four prize winning plays in the Junior Class of the Provincial Drama Festival were presented before a large audience as the Festival entered its second evening at Parkdale Hall last evening.

Miss Estelle Bowness, Summerside, Convener of the Junior section of the Drama Association, presented each member of the four casts with a pin in recognition of their excellent work. A scholarship which is to be awarded in this class will be presented this evening.

Plans for the building of draggers for the fishing industry here are still far from complete, it was learned yesterday. One of the main drawbacks to building them in the Province is the lack of a marine slip and adequate facilities for servicing the boats once they were built. Another factor is the lack of skilled labor. The 60 foot boats would require some method of hauling them up on a slip and while this would not present any serious problem in itself the lack of a slip in the first place prevents their construction here.

However, plans are still being seriously considered for the building of three more draggers, but they probably will be built elsewhere than on Prince Edward Island. It is expected that some decision on the matter will be reached within the next few weeks.

Grants To Universities & National Scholarships

OTTAWA, June 1—(CP)—An integrated system of national scholarships and federal aid to universities was recommended to the government today by the Massey Commission on Arts.

The commission said the universities face a financial crisis. It was "disturbed" at the small percentage of high-school students going through universities.

For the universities, whose "very existence" was threatened by financial troubles, the commission proposed grants on the basis of the basis of provincial population, to be spread among universities in each province in line with their student registration.

For undergraduate and graduate scholars, the commission called for several types of scholarships including exchanges with countries abroad.

The undergraduate scholarships would help an estimated 10,000 students—about one-fifth the present university population. They would be based on an enlargement of the existing federal-provincial vocational training plan.

Loans to deserving college students would be a part of the scheme for undergraduates. The assistance to the universities would be on a basis of annual grants. The commission did not suggest how large they should be, but it gave an example on the basis of 50 cents per head of population. It said that would give Manitoba, for instance, \$390,000 to be split among the province's universities.

Eligibility Grants, said the commission, should be "sufficient to ensure that the work of the universities... may be carried on in accordance with the needs of the nation." All members of the National Conference of Canadian Universities should be eligible.

The commission said the threat to the universities, because of higher cost pressures particularly in the fields of arts, letters and pure (non-commercial) science. However, it said, there should be Federal support for both professional training and the other faculties.

The commission noted that the Federal Government now is providing money for research and other purposes, and it recommended its population-based grants be in addition to this.

Undergraduate assistance, under a "University Training Advisory Council" including representatives of Federal and Provincial governments and the universities, would include:

1. One hundred annual four-year "Canada Scholarships" worth \$1,000 for students of exceptional promise.

2. Two hundred and fifty "National Scholarships" annually of \$500 for "distinguished" and promising students.

3. Two thousand \$500-a-year bursaries for four years, for "able and diligent" students on the basis of need.

4. A loan fund for all students whose work is acceptable to university authorities.

In the post-graduate field, there would be scholarships in the natural sciences, the humanities, social sciences and law. There would be about 160 of these, the values unspecified.
