Restore Faith in Country, Is Seen As Pressing Need

MONTREAL (CP) — Canadians were taking place throughout the week to restore their faith in their own country and decide where they are going to go, says R. M. Fowler, president of the Canadian Paper and Paper Association.

He told the association's annual luncheon here that wherever you look in Canada "there is a feeling of uncertainty and anxiety."

This decline in confidence is widespread, both at home and abroad, and lies at the root of many of our problems, both internal and external," Mr. Fowler said.

He said that foreign investors and governments have somewhat less confidence in Canada than they had a few years ago, and that they have the cause may be that we have lost confidence in ourselves and the world is only taking us at our own appraisal.

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Steel Market Is Stronger

CLEVELAND (AP) — Steel-makers are agreed that the market for their product is getting stronger every day. Steel magazine says. A flood of automotive orders is the major reason.

"Shipments of all steel products are expected to climb 10 to 15 per cent this month, but slightly in February because the month is shorter," then jump 15 to 20 per cent in March because of inventory building and seasonal factors," the weekly Journal of Metalworking reports.

Orders for steel surged upward last week, and some steel-makers are convinced an inventory buildup is under way, Steel reports. But the magazine's survey says auto makers likely would add only half as much steel to inventory as they did last year—a 45-day supply rate of a 90-day supply.

January's automobile output is expected to exceed the month's record of 688,700 units assembled in 1960, Steel says. Cutbacks in Saturday shifts in February might drop this figure below 600,000.

Steel output this week is expected to be about the same as the 1,915,000 tons Steel estimated the industry poured last week. That level is the highest since last April.
