

Moncton Hawks Defeat Fredericton Capitals 3-2

FREDERICTON (CP) — Moncton Hawks strengthened their third-place standing in the Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League by edging Fredericton Capitals 3-2 in a closely fought fixture Tuesday night.

Hawks emerged one point below the second place Caps, who in turn are only a single point behind the leading Amherst Ramblers, who lost a 5-2 decision to Charlottetown.

Ray Lacroix made it 1-0 for Moncton in the first period and the second ended 2-1 after Yvon Houle gave Hawks a 2-0 lead before Bob Leger opened the Fredericton scoring.

Dorrington counted for Moncton in the last session and Doug Hewey tallied for Caps.

Expect Decision Shortly On Sale Of Athletics

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The eight-man Philadelphia syndicate seeking to purchase Philadelphia's Athletics should learn Thursday if its bid has succeeded or failed.

President Will Harridge of the American League announced Tuesday that club owners will meet at the Waldorf-Astoria hotel in New York at 10:30 a.m. to consider the sale of the Philadelphia club stock.

Roy Mack, representing his family in the sale, presumably will ask the league to approve the sale of the franchise to the prominent Philadelphia lawyer.

Just what will happen at the league meeting Thursday, not even a Philadelphia lawyer was prepared to say.

SIT AND WAIT

Several of the lawyers involved in a proposed sale of the A's to an eight-man Philadelphia syndicate—and they outnumbered the would-be owners—said they don't know what to think.

The contract of sale is signed, so they say. The purchase money is in escrow in a midtown bank, so they say.

Nobody doubts all this is true, but the story's complexion has changed so often that observers are beginning to wonder if they can talk back from white even when they see it.

The latest rumor, fresh in from Baltimore, said that the A's are again headed toward Kansas City. Sports editor Jesse A. Linthicum of the Baltimore Sun wrote Tuesday that "Roy Mack is reported to be backing out of the deal to sell the A's franchise to an eight-man group Philadelphia syndicate."

STATE OF CHAOS

"According to reliable information," wrote Linthicum, "Kansas City seem certain now to get the franchise. The situation is in such a state of chaos at this stage that Harridge may step in within 24 hours and call the hands of all concerned."

Mack and lawyers for the Philadelphia syndicate said nothing. Unless the American League approves the local syndicate by 3 p.m. Friday, the contract of sale to the Philadelphia syndicate goes out the window. Roy Mack can either grant another extension of time or go back to Arnold Johnson, the Chicago businessman who wants to take the A's to Kansas City.

Golf Champ Seeks Treatment For Arm

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Ed Furgol, United States open golf champion, is home to seek medical advice on his ailing arm.

Furgol, whose left arm is permanently stiff and 10 inches shorter than his right arm as a result of a childhood accident, injured his right arm during a driving exhibition on Sydney, Australia.

Three Australian specialists told him, he said Tuesday, he might have to undergo surgery unless a gap in an arm muscle fills in.

They told him he would be unable to play golf for three to six weeks.

Furgol said he was forced to forfeit exhibition matches in Sydney and Hawaii.

Roughriders Open Bid For Ch'ship Away From Home

WINNIPEG (CP) — Saskatchewan Roughriders, the team with the choice, will open their bid for the Western Interprovincial Football Union championship away from home.

League commissioner G. Sydney Halter announced Tuesday Roughriders will meet Winnipeg Blue Bombers at Winnipeg Saturday night in the opener of the two-game, total-points WIFU semi-final.

The second game will be played in Regina Monday afternoon, with the series winner meeting Edmonton Eskimos in a best-of-three final starting Nov. 6 at a venue not yet announced.

Roughriders climbed into a tie with Eskimos Monday night as the regular season wound up in a thick British Columbia fog. But it was a tie that couldn't stand up against Edmonton's better points-for-and-against record.

Eskimos took a clear-cut 21-12 win over Blue Bombers at Edmonton while Roughriders were leading the B. C. Lions 15-9 at Vancouver when fog halted the game with six minutes remaining.

A game halted by weather is usually replayed but this one goes into the record books as a win for Roughriders.

Pacer Presented Raceway Owner

YONKERS, N. Y. (AP) — First Time, the first son of the great pacer Good Time, was presented Tuesday to William H. Cane, president of Yonkers Raceway and sponsor of the Hambletonian trotting classic.

The gift was made by trainer-driver Del Miller, who has a breeding farm at Meadow Lands, Pa.

"I heard that Mr. Cane was disappointed because his own mares bred to Good Time had produced only fillies and he had his heart set on a colt," Miller said. "When this foal turned out so good I felt Mr. Cane should not be without a Good Time colt."

Cane bred and raced Good Time, now at stud. Until recently he was co-holder of the world record of 1:57 4-5 for a mile in a race on a mile track, and was the world's greatest money-winning harness horse until Pronto Dan passed the mark last month.

Lumley Suffers Second Injury

TORONTO (CP) — Goaltender Harry Lumley of Toronto Maple Leafs Tuesday suffered his second injury in less than a week when a puck gashed his ear during a practice session. A flip shot off the stick of forward Bob Bailev cut Lumley's left ear while the team was holding a shooting drill. The NHL Vezeina Trophy winner later reported to hospital for stitching.

Six days ago Lumley suffered a spinal injury when he sat down on the sharp end of his stick.

Islanders Defeat Amherst 5-2

Whitlock Sparks Local Team To First Victory

The Prince Edward Islanders, displaying the great ability that Island teams have been known for in the past, broke into the win column of the newly formed ACSHL last night as they became the first team to defeat the Amherst Ramblers this season with a 5-2 victory at the Forum last night.

Time after time in the fast, rugged encounter, fans rose from their seats as the local team literally stormed in on the faltering Amherst defence and goalie Joe Lacoursiere. The Amherst forwards were strong but not strong enough to out-manoeuvre the powerful Island defence. The majority of the Amherst shots were taken from the vicinity of the opposing blue-line and when they shot at close range, goalie Jim Shirley was more than equal to the task as he turned in a fine performance.

None of the Islanders could be labelled as having played a poor game because each one was worthy of individual honors for the way they handled their positions. Perhaps the line that had the most chances was that of Campbell, Whitlock and Hennessey. Several times during the game, these boys showered Lacoursiere with rubber and many are still wondering now it is that the red light failed to blink more often.

INDIVIDUAL HONORS

Buck Whitlock, Charlottetown's sensation, won individual honors as he scored two goals and assisted on the third. Buck opened the scoring at the 9:56 minute mark of the first period on a pass from defencemen Steve Brklacich and Copper Lette while three Ramblers and two Islanders were in the penalty box serving time for infractions caused at the 8:10 mark. The fast-breaks all started when D. Kiley of Amherst and Norm Carpenter of the Islanders became involved in a shoving duel at the Islanders' blue line. Copper Lette and Lou Kiley, Morrow and Jodoin, and O'Connor and D. Kiley all tangled before the referees could intervene. The result was that three majors and two minor penalties were handed out to the two clubs.

Twenty-eight seconds after he scored his first goal, Buck put the Islanders ahead 2-0 on a pass from Campbell and O'Connor. At the 13:00 minute mark Shirley made a beautiful save off the stick of Amherst defenceman Don Rogers who blazed a close-in angle drive at the Island net. The local club had the better of the play during the opening session and out-shot the visitors 10-6.

It looked as though the Ramblers would change the picture somewhat as D. Kiley opened the second-period scoring at the 28 second mark on a pass from Reid and Jodoin. However, coach Hughie Campbell was back for the Islanders a minute and 13 seconds later to put the Garnet and Gold men ahead 3-1 on a pass from Hennessey and O'Connor. Normand Carpenter showed fans that he has lots of know-how as he split the visiting defence with ease at the 2-minute mark. The Islanders had three minor penalties during the period but the Ramblers failed to score as they had difficulty organizing attacks against the strong Island defence. Campbell, Lette and Morrow all had several good scoring chances after the 15 minute mark as the Islanders closed in on the opposing net depending on strategy more than luck to get them their first win.

Hennessey and LeDuc tallied for the Islanders in the final frame while Gagnon picked up the Ramblers' second marker.

Tonight, the local club will continue play in Moncton, the third game in as many nights combined with a road trip to Amherst earlier in the week. The boys will leave by bus for the mainland late this morning and will arrive in the Hub City during the early afternoon.

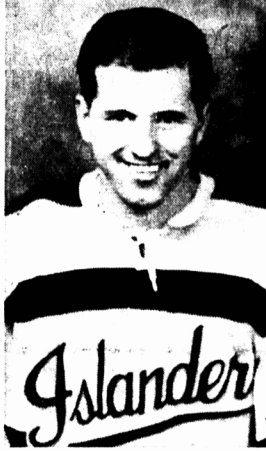

Sticks To Story Coach Claims Players Injured

VANCOUVER (CP) — The Vancouver Sun says it will stand behind a story quoting British Columbia Lions' coach Annis Stukus as saying other teams in the Western Interprovincial Football Union deliberately injured his players. Stukus has denied making the statements.

The newspaper Tuesday ran side-by-side a Canadian Press story from Winnipeg in which WIFU commissioner G. Sydney Halter said he would exonerate Stukus in view of the denial, and a transcript of notes taken by a reporter at the meeting where Stukus is alleged to have made the remarks.

The two stories were headlined: "Sun stands by story."

The dispute arose when a CP item from Vancouver covering the Halter under WIFU rules providing fines for such remarks.

Halter said Stukus denied in a letter that he made any remarks from which there reasonably could be inferred such a statement."

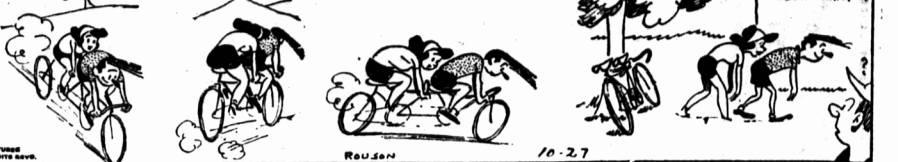

Sport Echoes From Prince County

Our first sample of Allan Cup hockey at the Charlottetown Forum this year was a pretty good show. We've seen major league games that looked worse than Amherst Ramblers have a smart little team. Little seems to be the correct word for most of their players, and practically all of their really good players, seem rather light. There doesn't seem to be any bruisers on the lineup, although their coach, Lou Kiley, has the sign up on occasion. The line of Bernoquez, Thierien and Gagnon were top dogs all evening. You couldn't expect them to feel right at home the first night. All the local youngsters performing showed definite promise.

With Gignac and Gray coming into the picture and probably other newcomers, we suppose the axe will have to fall on some of the aspiring locals. Now that we have reverted to senior hockey, however, more attention should be paid to the home-grown hockeyist. Prince Edward Island has before, and can again produce senior players, if they get a chance under competent coaching.

Somebody should organize a "farm" team in Charlottetown where the boys who couldn't quite make the Islanders might play with coaching help from Campbell or some of the older Islanders players. These boys could be ready as reserves to step into the Islanders roster when the need arose. Of course, they'd have to get some competition, but we think this might be furnished by Summerside, St. Dunstan's or some of the smaller centres on the mainland.

Things are pretty much up in the air about the proposed boxing card to have been held at the Raceway Stadium on November 10. Reports are that one or two of the boys wanted something like a mortgage on their wares here. Of course, the boxer, like all other laborers, is worthy of his hire, but there is this business of garnering some little profit from a fight card, else such functions never would take place. The boys shouldn't be too excessive in their demands. It is to their future advantage that the promoters reap a little margin of profit too.

At a press conference held after last night's game at the Forum, Howard Hobbs, vice-president of the Prince Edward Islander's Hockey Club, announced the resignation of Hughie Campbell as playing-coach of the local team who had just won their first game in the infant ACSHL schedule.

Mr. Hobbs stated that Hughie's and had brought to the Island the makings of the kind of colorful team that local fans enjoy watching. He also got the boys in the ACSHL win column last night as they dumped Lou Kiley's apple cart with a 5-2 victory and by the way the boys performed, Campbell's successor should have little trouble in making the upper ranks of the league before too long.

After Hughie announced his resignation to the club, they asked him if he would suggest a possible successor. A club member last night stated that Campbell highly recommended Islander defenceman, Steve Brklacich for the job. The club had followed his advice and Steve will guide the team as they meet Moncton Hawks for the first time tonight. For Steve it will be his debut as a coach and his chances of reasons for resigning did not concern the club, the team or the Forum management but that they were strictly of a personal nature. This was later verified by Mr. Campbell himself, as he also stated that he was through with hockey for good.

While with the club Hughie proved very satisfactory to work with

making it a bright one are very good as he will have two new players in the Islander line-up. They are forwards Bob Gray and Guy Gignac, both of whom played with the Islanders last season. Guy arrived in town last evening and Gray now resides here.

Does it mean we are obliged to ruin a pet, as I did a few years ago, by using a shotgun, on a milk, who was raided my hen house? The pet brought a few dollars while according to grade if it had not been damaged was worth \$50.00. I lost about \$40.00 on that one shot.

When the writer says, "Let's do something", whom does he mean, a few of those "Sportsmen" we see every fall driving along our roads looking for game, leaving our gates open, getting stuck in our newly seeded meadows because they seem to think it is too far to walk 200 yards from the road to the woodland. I would gladly have turned them in to our Game Officer on many occasions. But one thing I know, no true sportsman uses those tactics.

Turk's Blood Is Favorite For Cambridgeshire

NEWMARKET, England, (AP) — Turk's Blood Tuesday night was listed as favorite at 8 to 1 to win the 112th Cambridgeshire Handicap stakes Wednesday over 1 1/8 miles of Newmarket's autumn turf course.

The odds were set in the final callover at the Victoria Club in London. Alpenhorn was quoted at 9 to 1.

Thirty-eight horses remained on the probable list late Tuesday as the race shaped up as one of the biggest in several years. An Irish sweepstake is based on the Cambridgeshire. Nominations originally totalled 102.

The winner last year was Jupiter and he will run again but his backing is weak. He carries 122 pounds—seven more than last year. Turk's Blood carries 101 pounds and Alpenhorn has 115.

Lightly-weighted Turk's Blood doubtless would be an overwhelming favorite to win the \$3,119 first prize except that the black gelding never has won over more than one mile. Two other well fancied horses are Sunny Brae and Durante. Both are six-year-olds and Cambridgeshire victors for horses of that age are rare.

ROYALS DEFEAT SAGUENEENS 3-2

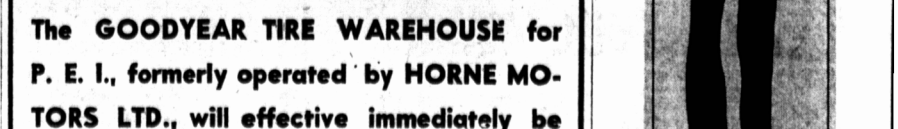
