**ALL RIGHT AGAIN.**—The young lad Herrell, who was operated upon for appendicitis at the Charlottetown Hospital a short time ago, was yesterday taken to his home quite recovered.

The Prince Edward began the work of dredging at the Railway wharf yesterday, and extensive improvements are to be made to the wharf itself, so as to enable the freight, etc., to be handled in the best possible manner.

**PRINCE OF WALES COLLEGE.**—The programme for the commencement exercises on Wednesday evening is a good one and the proceedings promise to be most enjoyable. The St. Cecilia Mandolin Club has kindly consented to assist on the occasion. The address to the graduates will be delivered by Rev. A. P. McLellan, rector of St. Dunstan's College.

**ACCIDENT YESTERDAY.**—A painful accident occurred in the railway yard yesterday afternoon about five o'clock. While brakeman Sheriff, of the Cape Traverse train, was walking along the top of a box car placing the line, he fell to the ground a distance of about fourteen feet, striking his head against either the rail or the sleeper, causing severe injuries to the forehead over the right eye. He was picked up in an unconscious condition and removed to the Prince Edward Island Hospital where everything possible was done for him. It was after three o'clock this morning before Mr Sheriff regained consciousness, and to-day he is reported "doing well." Dr. Warburton, who was called in directly after the accident, has been assiduous in his attention to the injured man.

**CROSSED THE BAR.**—News of the death at Montreal yesterday of Mr. Frank B. Kennedy, manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia, will be heard with deep regret by all who enjoyed his acquaintance. Mr. Kennedy was a son of the late Mr. Charles Kennedy, of Brackley Point, and was a brother of Mr. W. C. Kennedy, the well-known insurance agent. Mr. Kennedy has been manager of the Montreal agency for some eight years. Previously he had been manager of the branches at Annapolis, Amherst, Chatham and other points. He was a young man of splendid ability, and his death at an early age is to be regretted. Congestion of the lungs and pleurisy, from which he had been suffering about a week, was the cause of his death. His widow and three children in Montreal and his brother and other relatives in this province have our sympathy in their affliction.

The death at Drayton, North Dakota, of Mr. Geo. J. Wright, will also be heard with regret. Mr. Wright was a son of the late George Wright, East Ryalty, and was for some years engaged in business on Kent Street in this city. He is survived by two sisters, Misses Julia and Fanny Wright, to whom our sympathy is extended.

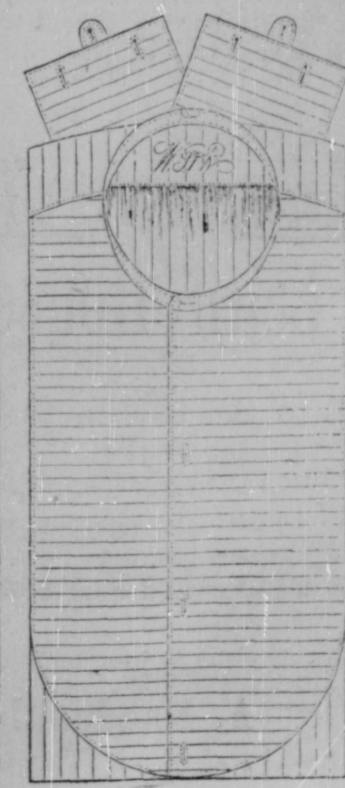
