

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, Nov. 15.

Messrs. Lord & Co., card manufacturers of New Bradford, have failed. Liabilities, £139,000.

Archbishop Croke repudiates the statement that he sent a despatch to the New York "Irish World," admitting that he had given advice in 1880 to hold the harvest.

The Irish Executive has procured a copy of the secret Land League circular, containing instructions to the League organization.

LIMERICK, Nov. 15.

The sub-commission of the Land Court has reduced the rent of a tenant of Lord Clarina from £53 to £44, notwithstanding that the landlord contributed to the expense of building and drainage. The judgment is considered startling.

UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.

The pressure to obtain admission to the court room, this morning was notably greater than yesterday. After the ushers had admitted three-score respectable-looking people, the doors were thrown open and there was an impetuous influx of the regular elements. The five jurors sworn yesterday were in attendance. The court was formally opened at five minutes after ten. After the lapse of a few minutes, Guiteau was hurried into court in the custody of half a dozen policemen and deputy marshals. The handcuffs were removed, and he shook hands with his sister and brother, and took the seats reserved for him between them and his counsel. Mr. Scoville then made an application for an order for witnesses, which order was made by the Court. An additional panel of 75, who were summoned last evening, was called. Guiteau manifested less nervousness and excitability than yesterday, although in his whispered conversations with his brother he was quite demonstrative. Most of the panel summoned had formed an opinion and decided, or in other ways were disqualified. Only four additional jurors were sworn, making nine. A new panel of 75 were ordered and the court adjourned till to-morrow.

HARTFORD, CONN., Nov. 15.

By the will of Charles H. Northam, Trinity College receives \$125,000.

SAN JOSE, CAL., Nov. 15.

A severe shock of earthquake was felt here to-day.

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.

Steamer Bohemia from Hamburg to-day, brought 160 persecuted Jews, who were the first that emigrated from Russia to Spain during last summer. It is said that 5,000 will follow during the winter.

YOUNGSTOWN, OHIO, Nov. 15.

Burglars entered the house and blew open the safe belonging to Jesse Baldwin, a wealthy and eccentric citizen, this morning, and stole between \$30,000 and \$40,000 in gold.

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.

The tug Lehigh was blown to pieces at Glen Island yesterday, by the explosion of the boiler. One deck hand was killed.

It is stated one-eighth of the working horses of this city are sick with catarrhal influenza. Many cases are proving fatal.

EUROPEAN.

BERLIN, Nov. 15.

Cardinal Von Hohenlohe arrived yesterday. He states that he is the bearer of proposals for an understanding with the Curia.

The Bundesrath has approved of the budget. The revenue and expenditure are each estimated at 60,100,000 marks.

At a recent meeting between the Emperor and Bismarck, the Emperor expressed a wish for a restoration of peace between the Catholic Church and the State.

PARIS, Nov. 15.

M. Rouvier has been appointed Minister of Colonies as well as of Commerce.

Gambetta presented himself with his colleagues in the Chamber of Deputies to-day, and explained the policy of the Ministry.

The comments of leading journals regarding the new Ministry are expressed with reserve rather of mistrust than confidence.

LONDON, Nov. 15.

The Times says the composition of the French Ministry is somewhat of a surprise and perhaps a little of disappointment.

The significance of Paul Bert's appointment to the Ministry of Public Instruction cannot be mistaken. Of the new Ministry, it may almost be said, is not so much a ministry of Gambetta as it is Gambetta himself.

It is impossible not to see in the ascendancy of Gambetta a certain revival of personal government, and a possible menace to the spirit of the republican institutions. His accession to office is the turning point in the affairs of France and possibly even those of Europe, but history and his career are the strongest security that Gambetta will be proof against selfish ambitions.

The News' Paris despatch says: The Bourse is ill-disposed, owing to the fact that Say is not in the Cabinet. Allain Targe, the new Minister of Finance, enjoys in first class banking circles a high reputation for competence and respectability.

LONDON, Nov. 15.

Miss Anna Parnell was enthusiastically received at Bradford last evening.

The Daily News understands that the prospect for the speedy conclusion of an Anglo-French commercial treaty satisfactory to both countries, is regarded by well-informed persons as most encouraging.

Sir William Harcourt will send a deputation to examine the mental condition of Arthur Lofroy sentenced to be hanged for the murder of Mr. Gold.

At a meeting of the Royal Geographical Society last night, Sir Rutherford Alcock said the society had authorized him to communicate with the Chief Secretary for the Colonies, and to suggest that the Hudson's Bay Company be asked to send out an expedition by land to examine both sides of the Mackenzie River, to see whether the Jeanette's crew has been heard of. The society is prepared to contribute towards the expenses of such expedition.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 15.

In consequence of the forcible closing of the Turkish post offices in Greece, the Porte has taken preliminary steps to shut the Greek post-office here. Greek troops have entered Volo, which the Turks previously evacuated.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 15.

The trial of twenty-two nihilists has been simplified. First Lieut. Soukanoff has acknowledged the truth of the charge against him. He states that the dynamite used to blow up Sadova street was taken from the naval powder magazine.

PARIS, Nov. 15.

The Courrier du Soir thinks that Gambetta and the men whom he has gathered around him deserve a fair trial.

The National, reporting conversations in the lobbies of the Chamber, says the Ministerial list was read with profound astonishment, and that the comments were unfavorable.
