Britain, Ireland Sign Trade Pact

LONDON (AP)—Britain and the Republic of Ireland signed Tuesday a free trade pact wiping out all tariff barriers between the two. It was another step toward ending three centuries of bitter hostility.

Irish Premier Lemass and British Prime Minister Wilson put their signatures to an agreement reached early in the day after a year of undercover negotiation.

Wilson called it a "significant and satisfactory development" in relations between the two countries. The agreement comes into force July 1 and provides for gradual elimination of all import duties by 1975.

Charlottetown's second duplicate bridge organization, the Abegweit Bridge Club, has opened for business with weekly sessions at the YMCA on Wednesday nights.

Co-directors of the new club are two members of the Charlottetown Duplicate Bridge Club — Bob Hamby and Roy Vessey. The Abegweit Club has been duly franchised by the Ameri Bridge League, which is the parent body of all bridge clubs in North America, and fractional Master Points will be awarded at the regular Wednesday night sessions. Master Point Night will be on the third Wednesday of each month.

Commenting on their new club last night, the directors said they expect a number of regulars from the Charlottetown Club, which meets on Monday nights, but they emphasized that they are looking for people of all ages who have played some bridge in the past but have never tried duplicate.

"We find most people think they are not good enough for duplicate, but this is not the case," Mr. Hamby said. "In the majority of cases, people underestimate their playing ability."

Tonight's session will begin at 8 p.m., and Mr. Vessey stated that, starting in January, the Abegweit Club will provide an instruction period of approximately one hour prior to the start of the session.

Donations Of \$8,000 Received In Campaign

Contributions amounting to \$8,000 have been received during the first three weeks of the current Christmas Seal Sale Campaign it was reported by Blanche Conway, seal sale secretary of the P.E.I. Tuberculosis League, yesterday.

Nov. 16 marked the opening of the P.E.I. TB League's 1965 annual crusade against tuberculosis. This is the 36th year that Christmas seals have been sold in P.E.I. to raise funds to assist local program of tuberculosis prevention.

The interest of the public, in the public health of their communities and in particular prevention of tuberculosis is reflected not only by the co-operation of over 400 voluntary workers throughout the past summer but also by the encouraging response

to the current seal sale campaign.

In P.E.I., contributions from the 20,000 letters that went into the mails in November 1965 will be spent in four ways. They will be used to finance community and industrial tuberculosis testing and mass x-ray clinics aimed at preventing the spread of tuberculosis from the sick to the well and gradually bringing tuberculosis in this province under control; to help pay for rehabilitation programs designed to re-establish tuberculosis patients in the community; to help pay for research programs; to find some of the answers to the unsolved problem of tuberculosis and to educate people about tuberculosis.

SLEEPING DRAGON

Tuberculosis has been likened to a sleeping dragon, which, through public apathy or neglect can awake at any time and cause great destruction.

In P.E.I. a great majority of cases are detected in the age group over 50. The last three patients admitted to the Provincial Sanatorium were over the age of 70.

Dr. E.M. Found, executive division of P.E.I. Tuberculosis League, says: "our greatest concern today are the people who now harbor the tuberculosis germ in their bodies and who may later develop active disease."

Thanks and appreciation was expressed by League President, Walter Coulson to those who are giving radio talks in Charlottetown and Summerside and to the 12 Charlottetown women who worked with Miss Conway in preparing appeal letters for mailing as well as the many volunteer workers who helped with the tuberculosis testing and chest x-ray clinics throughout the spring and summer of 1965.

Rule Violations Bring Penalties

Barry Robert Dodds of Belfast was fined \$20 and costs or four days on a speeding charge by Justice of the Peace, Albert Dennis in Traffic Court yesterday.

Two other accused, Clayton Alexander MacLeod, of Charlottetown and John Phalen Hughes of St. George, N. B., were each fined \$10 and costs on similar speeding charges.

John Thomas MacCannell, Campbell Cove, was fined \$10 and costs or four days for failing to dim his headlights when following closer than 200 feet behind another car.

John Bruce MacKenzie, North Wiltshire, was given a similar fine on a charge of driving on the wrong side of the road.

A Tracadie Cross man, Basil Peter MacQuaid, was fined \$10 and costs or four days on a charge of failing to bring his vehicle to a complete stop at a stop sign.

UNCOVER PLOT

LA PAZ (AP)—Bolivia's military government says in a communique it has uncovered a revolutionary plot directed by deposed president Victor Paz Estenssoro who is in exile in Lima, Peru. Participants in the plot, the government said, included members of Paz Estenssoro's National Revolutionary Movement, Communists and other extreme leftists. Co-President Gen. Alfredo Ovando told reporters it is not certain now that a state of siege—modified martial law—will be lifted Dec. 19 as planned.

More Student Loan Money Is Available

The second instalment of the Ottawa-backed student loans for university students—now being made available to qualifying students.

Letters have gone out from the office of Malcolm MacKenzie, deputy minister of education, to students and the money will be available for the second half of the university term.

Generally speaking, students who applied for the loans last September were given one-half of the loan at that time. The balance was available from the Canada government was not nearly large enough to cover the requests.

Ottawa later authorized further money to cover the amount of the loans requested by students who satisfied the provincial committees that they qualified for such assistance.

The loans are interest-free until the student completes his or her course and starts to earn money.

Mail Volume Increasing

With Christmas mail still on the upsurge and business really booming, an increase of 58,500 letters was noted at the Charlottetown Post Office Monday.

Post Master William Griffith said the normal amount of mail run through the letter cancelling machine is about 8,500 but Monday the number rose to 67,000 and before too long the machine is expected to be handling as many as 90,000 letters per day.

Over 1,200 bags of mail arrived in on the train Monday and 1,400 bags were sent out in the morning after crews worked continuously through the night.

More help is being hired on as it is needed. There are 66 part-time employees beside the regular staff with more people to be employed before the rush starts to subside about Dec. 20th.

Mr. Griffith said there generally is an overflow of people at the weighing wickets with parcels to be weighed.

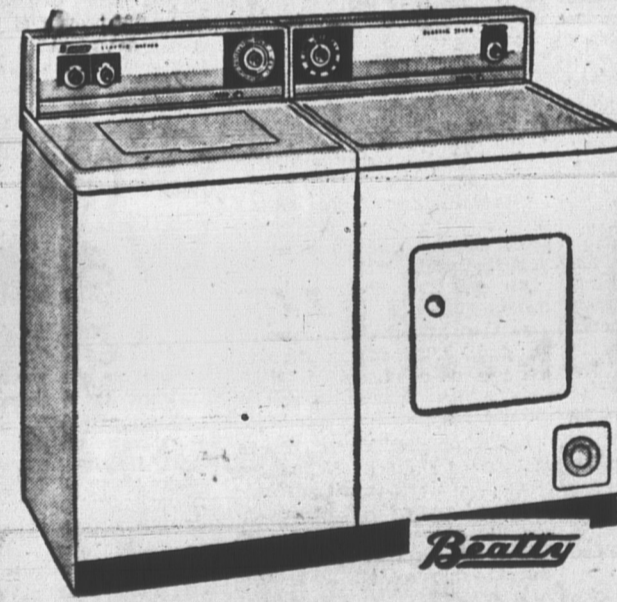

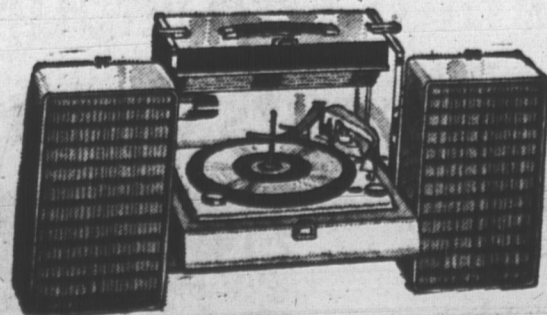
