

Maps To Furnish Complete Report

The final stage of the housing and planning survey report is expected by civic authorities about the end of this month. The report itself, prepared and presented to City Council last month by Town Planner Walter de Silva, is complete. But what has been termed the "master plan" for the future of the city is not complete until the various maps prepared in connection with the report are received. Mr. de Silva told council, at the time his report was tabled, he expected reproduction of the maps, which pinpoint the various "bright" areas of sub-standard housing, would take an additional six weeks. The maps are also expected to specify residential, commercial and industrial sections, and name suggested sections where establishment of municipal parking lots appears feasible as well as proposing possible location for playgrounds.

The three-act comedy of character was written by the 17th century playwright, Moliere who is considered to be the foremost writer of French comedy in the whole world of French literature.

The play which will be staged in the university gymnasium is a satire on doctors and the art of medicine as practiced during the 17th century.
