TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Grit Demonstration in King's.

Unbounded Interest and Enthusiasm!!!

Special Despatch to the Examiner. SOURIS, August 3.

There is no enthusiasm here. Only two persons left in train this morning for Georgetown, to take part in the Grit demonstration, viz., Messrs. McIntyre and Campbell.

Special Despatch to the Examiner. GEORGETOWN, Aug. 3—2.45 p. m.

There are from two to three hundred present at the Grit meeting. About one-third of these are Conservatives. There is no enthusiasm.

LONDON, Aug. 1.

In the House of Commons to-day, Parnell was named for offensive language and for disregarding the authority of the chair, and Mr. Gladstone moved his suspension for the remainder of the sitting. Mr. Parnell rose and interrupted Mr. Gladstone, and said he should go through the fare of awaiting the vote, as the speaker interfered with the freedom of discussion. He then quitted the House. The motion for his suspension was carried by a vote of 132 to 14.

Sir Chas. Dilke, under foreign secretary, replying to the Earl of Desline (Conservative) said England had received no communication from the Khedive of Egypt asking for armed protection because he feared a military revolt and the Government was not aware that France had received such a request. This refers to the statement of an anonymous correspondent, who wrote to the London newspapers implying that England had been asked, and had declined, to protect the Khedive.

MOSCOW, August 1.

To-day the Emperor and Empress are to attend the inauguration of a church at Nijini Novgorod. From thence they proceed to Kazan. On his return to Moscow it is extremely probable the Emperor will make a public declaration. It is believed the ceremony will take place immediately after, as in the event of Alexander III., dying before the ceremony the succession might and would, it is feared, be disputed by the younger brothers of the present and late Emperor.

BERLIN, Aug. 1.

It is stated that negotiations instituted by Bismarck at Kissengen for peace with the Vatican have been fruitless.

A By-Law to Encourage New Industries in the City of Charlottetown.

BE it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:

1. All applications for exemption of new industries from taxation shall be made by petition to the Mayor and Council, such petition to be signed by the person, company or corporation presenting the same, and to contain full particulars of the new industry sought to be exempted, the amount of capital proposed to be invested therein, and the amount to be paid yearly for wages, and the tax or taxes from which exemption is sought.

2. Every such petition shall be accompanied by proper proofs that the advertisements required by law have been duly inserted, and no application shall be considered by the Council until after the expiration of fourteen days from the date of the last publication of such advertisements.

3. The Council on such application may exempt such new industries from taxation or from any particular species of taxation.

4. In case such application is contested, the Council may adjourn the hearing thereof from time to time, should they think fit, but not more than one application by any new industry shall be made within the fiscal year.

5. No exemption will be granted to any new industry which does not propose to expend yearly at least the sum of five thousand dollars in wages.

6. Any false statement or suppression of facts contained in any petition so to be presented as aforesaid shall absolutely annul any exemption and the tax shall be collected as if the same had never been made.
