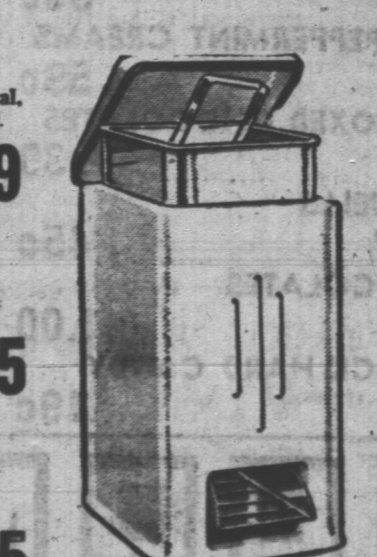
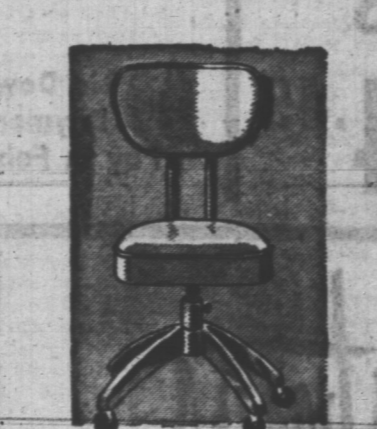
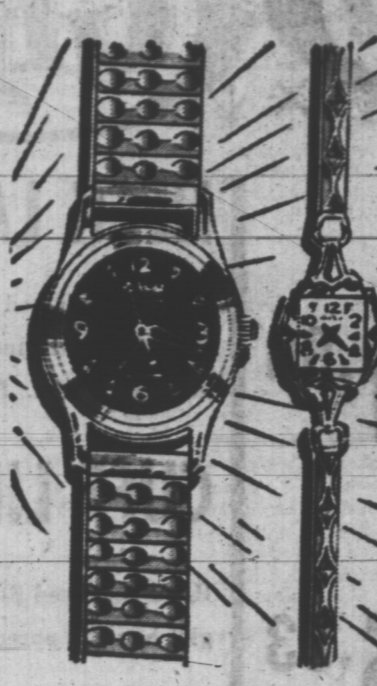

New Laser Beam Expected To Aid In Communications

By RALPH DIGHTON CULVER CITY, Calif. (AP)—A light beam three inches wide spiked through the night between hilltops four miles apart. It looked solid enough, as light beams go, but it was literally chopped into bits—30,000,000 times a second—and each bit was a tiny part of a television picture. The transmitter, on one hill, was a powerful new source of light called a laser. The receiver, on the other hill, was a device similar to a telescope, with a mirror at its base to reflect the chopped-up light signals into electronic tubes that converted them into images. They added up to a breakthrough in communications that some day may lead to live, home-quality TV between earth and other planets. Television by light waves instead of radio waves, long a dream of space scientists, has become a reality in experiments at Hughes Aircraft Co. Laboratories. Their laser television system now being tested at the Manned Spacecraft Centre in Houston, Tex., is one of several under study as a way of giving physicians and engineers on earth a constant visual check on astronauts and their instruments. **KEEPS STRENGTH** Engineer Charles V. Smith says laser television is better than conventional television in space because its energy is concentrated in a narrow beam—not broadcast in all directions—and thus provides a stronger signal over extreme distances. "Light waves also are much shorter than radio waves, so a light beam can be chopped into smaller pieces each carrying a distinct bit of information needed to reconstruct an image," he said. "Mariner IV radioed pictures of Mars across 134,000,000 miles in July, 1965, but the signals that made up the black and white dots in the images came in at a rate of only 8-13 bits of information per second. It took eight hours for enough of these bits to come in to construct one crude picture. If a laser television system had been available, Smith says, the bits would have streamed in at a rate of 30,000,000 a second and the pictures would have been reproduced instantly with quality as good as that on a home television set. Lasers work best in space because light waves are distorted by atmosphere and blocked by clouds. Smith foresees the day when ships far out in space will be able to talk to each other by laser beams millions of miles beyond the range of radio. To talk to earth they would train their beams on communications satellites which would convert laser information into radio waves for relay to earth stations. Direct communication between satellites and earth stations by laser is possible, but only in good weather.

Walter Gordon Resignation Is Forecast

TORONTO (CP)—The Globe and Mail says Walter Gordon, former finance minister, is expected to resign from Parliament in the next few weeks. The newspaper quotes friends of Mr. Gordon as saying he had intended to announce his resignation Friday but the announcement was postponed to next week at the urging of his supporters. Mr. Gordon declined comment Monday night. The newspaper quotes sources as saying Mr. Gordon's decision is primarily a matter of conscience—"He is said to feel he must resign because he believes the government has no intention of curbing foreign investment." Mr. Gordon, who has represented the Toronto riding of Davenport since 1962, campaigned in the last election on the issue of restricting foreign investment, particularly United States investment, in Canada. He was appointed finance minister April 22, 1963, following the election that month in which the Liberals ousted the Progressive Conservative government of John Diefenbaker. **LEFT CABINET** Mr. Gordon resigned from the cabinet three days after last year's election in which the Liberals were returned with another minority government. Mr. Gordon said then he felt he had no choice but to resign from the cabinet because he had advised the prime minister to seek a majority mandate from the electorate. The newspaper quotes Senator Keith Davey as saying in Ottawa that Mr. Gordon might give in to urgings of his supporters and stay on as a member of Parliament at least for a few more months. It also quotes other sources as saying Mr. Gordon's wife is insistent he get out of politics.

Report Says Farmers Live Poor, Die Rich

EDMONTON (CP)—Farmers live poor but die rich says a rural finance expert. It's a "basic paradox," said Dr. G. R. Furnell, director of the economic division of the Alberta agriculture department, addressing 50 rural finance officials including bank managers, accountants and employees of farm credit agencies. The net worth of farmers was four to five times higher than the net worth of non-farm workers. "It would require a payment of \$40,000 to each non-farm family to bring them equality of net worth with farm families," he added. Farmers had a strong tendency to skip on living costs. Instead, they invested most of their annual income in the farm operation. Thus the farmer is "one of the few people who has relatively low income and often inadequate living standards and yet can retire with a nice little nest egg." Continued reform in agriculture would emphasize the need for an outstanding flow of capital into the hands of farm people. **TOUGH TO BORROW MONEY** Young farmers, who need financing the most and could use it best, found it most difficult to obtain. Dr. Furnell said "a strong program of farm management advice and farm credit implementation must be provided." If the farmer had to obtain his credit from several sources, none of these credit sources could analyse properly the farm unit operation, and appraise capital needs and the impact of the injection of various types and amounts of capital. BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP)—Jayne Mansfield is recovering from a relapse of pneumonia, a spokesman for the actress said here. Her temperature was down to 100 degrees from 103, her doctor reported, but she is still required to stay in bed. The blonde actress was stricken with pneumonia shortly after her six-year-old son Zoltan was mangled recently by a lion and underwent several operations. He is recovering. **CAN'T REDUCE TAXES** FORT MACLEOD, Alta. (CP)—This town of 2,500 had a budget surplus of more than \$100,000 and used \$14,000 of it to hold down the 1966 mill rate, but the provincial government did not approve. Mayor George Buzonis then offered to lend the province the surplus at 6 1/2 per cent but says he has had no reply to the offer.
