Probe Of Money Theft Has City Court Sequel

As a result of investigation by city police into a theft Monday night, David Sylvester, 31, Charlottetown, appeared before Magistrate A.J. Haslam, QC, in city police court yesterday.

Birt is charged with the theft of money over \$50, the property of Mrs. Margaret Evelyn Wilson. Earlier this week Mrs. Wilson, who was widowed recently, reported that \$400 had been stolen from her room.

Following a request by the accused for time to obtain counsel, no plea was taken and he was remanded without bail until Oct. 5.

Accused Nabbed After Jail Break

Birt had been remanded to custody by Magistrate A.J. Haslam, QC, yesterday following his being charged as the result of police investigation into the theft of approximately \$411 from Mrs. Margaret Evelyn Wilson, 249 Prince Street, last Monday night.

Ben Bella Seeks To End Revolt

ALGIERS (AP) — President Ahmed Ben Bella assumed full emergency powers Thursday and his government sent out cautious feelers for talks in an effort to end the Berber revolt without bloodshed.

Government sources said there was no immediate reaction from the Kabylie Mountains east of Algiers where fierce-eyed Berbers manned gun positions, vowing to bring down the government.

Gov't Plans Submissions To Board

With the announcement that the Atlantic Development Board will meet in Charlottetown Oct. 28 and 29, it has been learned that the provincial government will submit a number of economic development projects to the board's consideration.

Industry and Natural Resources Minister Leo Hostler said yesterday the cabinet will meet with the board on the morning of Oct. 28.

That afternoon Mr. Rossiter, liaison officer between the government and the board, accompanied by Hartwell Dahey, provincial research director, will present the provincial submissions.

"We expect," said Mr. Rossiter, "to present about six projects to the board for consideration. Among the projects to be proposed are industrial development, new access roads and adequate electric power for industry."

Agree To Ban Arms In Orbit

UNITED NATIONS (CP) — Soviet Foreign Minister Gromyko said an agreement in principle on banning nuclear weapons in orbit was reached Thursday night at East-West talks here.

Gromyko met with U.S. State Secretary Rusk and British Foreign Secretary Lord Avon for a two-hour wind-up session of the current round of talks. He said he hoped a conclusive agreement can be reached "quickly" and said he would confer with President Kennedy in Washington Thursday.

Flora's Damage Reported High

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, (AP) — Damage caused on Tobago by hurricane Flora, which struck Tuesday, may exceed \$25,000,000, by unofficial estimate Thursday. Police have given the names of 30 persons believed dead but have been unable to confirm only 17 deaths.

No foreigners were on either island.

In Scarborough, the Tobago capital, there is no public transport. Only two shops are open. Electricity is off in most sections. There is a shortage of fuel and hardly any chance of anyone getting a cooked meal.
