Island, laden with oil and seal skins, was brought into the above port, having been full in with by Capt. Curran, of the Albion, five days from Harbor Grace, Newfoundland.

SYDNEY, C. B., October 6th.—The French War Steamer "D'Estang" has arrived here, and reports the loss of the Transport "Abundance," and fifteen merchant vessels, with 73 lives, at St. Pierre, in the hurricane of the 22d ult.

BOSTON, Oct. 9.
N. Y., 9th.—Steamer Evening Star, from this city for New Orleans, foundered at sea 180 miles east of South Carolina coast, by which nearly 300 lives were lost.

The President has issued a proclamation for a National Thanksgiving on November 29th.

British steamer Quaco Victoria foundered at sea on the 4th inst., lat. 33 03, long. 70 30. The passengers and crew were picked up day before yesterday by the brig Pomfret, from New York. The Engineer died from exposure, and the mate was washed overboard.

N. Y., 9th, p. m.—A Toronto despatch says the Assizes opened yesterday. The Judge, in charging the Jury, paid a tribute to the Irishmen for devotion to their native land, and condemned the United States authorities for not crushing the Fenian movement in its incipency.

Santa Anna addressed the Fenians at their Pic Nic on Staten Island yesterday, in which he highly complimented the Irishmen.

Col. Roberts in the evening addressed the St. Patrick's Circle, and severely denounced the Government, Stephens, and the New York merchants who had failed to make good their promises. Gold 148.

OTTAWA, C. W., Oct. 5.—It is reported on good authority that the Canadian delegation to England on Confederation will consist of Hon. Messrs. Cartier and Langevin, of Lower Canada, McDonald and McDougall of Upper Canada.

Three columns of Engineers have arrived here, it is supposed, with a view of fortifying the city.

MONTREAL, Oct. 5.—The war ship Niger has arrived here.—Weather clear and cold, with sharp frost last night.

TORONTO, Oct. 5.—Preparations are actively progressing for the trial of the Fenians, captured last June, at the approaching Assizes. The best legal talent of the city is engaged on both sides.

TORONTO, C. W., Oct. 8.—The revenue of the Province for September was \$1,170,000, and the expenditure \$716,000.

Government is negotiating with the home authorities for the establishment of an Army in Canada. A notice from the English Admiralty Office is published, warning navigators against anchoring near the Cable.

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.

A rain storm of unusual violence has been experienced in the vicinity of Washington and Baltimore, causing much damage to property, and interrupting railway and telegraphic communication with the former city. Several houses on the banks of the Potomac have been swept away, and two families are said to have been drowned. The bodies of several members of one family have been recovered.

NEW YORK, Oct. 10, p. m.

A Toronto despatch has the following:—Sixty-first British Regulars had no sooner disembarked at Quebec than orders came to send them to Bermuda. Prussian Commissioner examining the working of municipal institutions in Canada.

Party of Royal Engineers that lately arrived here are now inspecting the country to decide on the feasibility of erecting fortifications.

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.
Cotton advices are very discouraging. General estimates of this year's crop now amount to less than a million bales.

A fire in Chicago last night, destroyed Lowenthal's Tobacco Factory. Loss \$100,000 dollars.

Seven additional passengers from the foundered steamer Evening Star, were picked up by the schooner Morning Star, which arrived at Charlottetown.

At a Cabinet meeting in Washington yesterday, it was decided to turn Jeff. Davis over to the civil authorities for trial, which will probably come off in November.
