—BRIDGE CONTRACT LET —
The Prince County firm of Bagloe and Noy have been given the contract to build a new bridge over the Dunk River on the Borden-Summerside highway. It was announced yesterday by Hon. Dougald MacKinnon, Minister of Highways. The bridge is to be of crescent timber and construction and work is to commence immediately. It is hoped to have it ready for Spring traffic. Last summer the approaches for the bridge were built but not paved and when the job is completed the road will by-pass Ross Corner and eliminate a dangerous curve in the road and make snow removal easier in the winter.

—POLICE COURT — In Summerside Police Court yesterday, presided over by Magistrate E. H. Strong, Q.C., a charge against two Summerside men of breaking, entering and theft from Robinson's Bakery was withdrawn by the Crown. Three Lancasters Leaving For Texas Next Sunday

Three large four-engine Lancaster aircraft, under command of Group Captain A. G. Kenyon, C.D., commanding officer of R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside, will leave their Summerside base on Sunday, January 11th on a non-stop flight of 2025 miles to Wago, Texas. This will be the beginning of a three weeks tour of U. S. naval bases by members of the specialist navigation course now undergoing training at the Central Navigation School at Summerside. After visiting several bases in Texas they will visit bases in Florida, Virginia, Maryland and Ohio. They are expected to return to Summerside on January 29th. Such visits form an important part of the training of the specialist course and a similar flight has already been made to visit various Canadian establishments. Later the course will visit the United Kingdom and during the latter part of April some Arctic flying will be carried out. This will mark the first time that Group Captain Kenyon has accompanied one of these flights since coming to Summerside as commanding officer of this important R.C.A.F. Station.—S

NEW YORK, Jan. 7 — (AP) — Mrs. Cornelius Vanderbilt, for years the acknowledged leader of New York society's most exclusive circle, died tonight at her Fifth Avenue home.

She was the widow of Brig-Gen. Cornelius Vanderbilt III. She was born Grace Graham Wilson, a southern society girl. She married Vanderbilt, who was eight years her junior, in 1896.

That marriage was said to have been the reason the bulk of a father's estate was left to another son, Alfred G. Vanderbilt.

The father was Cornelius Vanderbilt II, the son of Commodore William Henry Vanderbilt, railroad magnate of a generation ago.
