AN OLD FIGHTER RETURNS.

TUPPER CLUB HONORS DR. JENKINS

On His Return From The Great Northwest.

Not content with taking part in the historic event of the evening—the return of our soldiers from South Africa—the President and members of The Tupper Club determined to mark the event of the return of Dr. Jenkins to take part in the great contest now going on in Queen's West, by giving him a cordial reception and a warm welcome home. So, by order of the President, they met in their rooms on Kent Street at 10 o'clock.

Three-quarters of an hour were spent there during which short, stirring addresses were delivered by Mr. J. T. Mellish, Mr. Oland, Mr. S. W. Crabbe and Councillor Horne. These gentlemen stated their own impression of the canvass in West Queen's and reported that their private advices from the best sources here and elsewhere in Canada predicted victory all along the line.

Shortly before eleven o'clock the members of the Club took torches and went in procession to the railway station arriving in good time to meet the train and Dr. Jenkins, whose appearance they greeted with three cheers and a tiger.

The doctor, after shaking hands with his friends, was conducted to a carriage and accompanied by the President of the Liberal-Conservative Association and by President Dawson of the Club to the house of his son, Dr. S. R. Jenkins, where, amid cheers and the singing of "He's a Jolly Good Fellow," he alighted.

The doctor delivered a short impromptu speech, in which he thanked the members of the Tupper Club for their warm reception, and said that he had come nearly three thousand miles to help in the contest against a government of unfulfilled promises, extravagance and corruption. He predicted a great victory for the Opposition which, he said, really ought to win on the 7th of November.

A representative of THE EXAMINER called upon the doctor this forenoon, and found him a fresh and hearty after his long journey, in excellent health and ready for the fray.

Questioned as to the prospects in the West, particularly with regard to the Islanders who are candidates in British Columbia and Manitoba, the doctor said that the election of Mr. Albert McNeill (son of the Rev. Donald McNeill of this city) is freely conceded.

As to the election of Mr. J. Heber Haslam, in Selkirk, said he, there is scarcely any less doubt. Mr. Haslam is a prominent and influential man, not only in the district but in the city of Winnipeg, and as the champion of a good cause, he is almost certain of success, notwithstanding the fact that his opponent is a creation of Sifton and hoodlum, to any extent will be brought into requisition. But the fact that he is a Siftonite is likely to ensure his defeat; for that Minister is thoroughly discounted in Manitoba.

Siftonism is doing its best in Brandon, as elsewhere throughout Manitoba and the Northwest. Every "human device" is resorted to for the purpose of securing the defeat of Hugh John Macdonald. But the popular belief throughout the country is that Hugh John will triumph in this election as he did in the provincial elections of a year ago.

In Alberta Mr. Benuett, who is a most energetic and able candidate, has every prospect of beating Oliver who had practically a walk over in '96. The south end of the district where there was scarcely any Conservative vote polled in the last election, will give Bennett a handsome majority. Dr. Jenkins has worked that part thoroughly and overcome the indifference consequent in the selection of an objectionable candidate last time.

Altogether the doctor's diagnosis gives no hope, whatever for the case of the Tarte-Laurier-Sifton; and he hopes to see Prince Edward Island in full accord with the continental provinces.

Questioned as to the crops of this year and the ranches, Dr. Jenkins said that the crops in his neighborhood and throughout the Northwest had been good and for the most part, saved in good condition. The bad weather came on just as the harvest was finished. Ranches are prospering, prices of horses and cattle are improving, and the stock of the country is looking well.

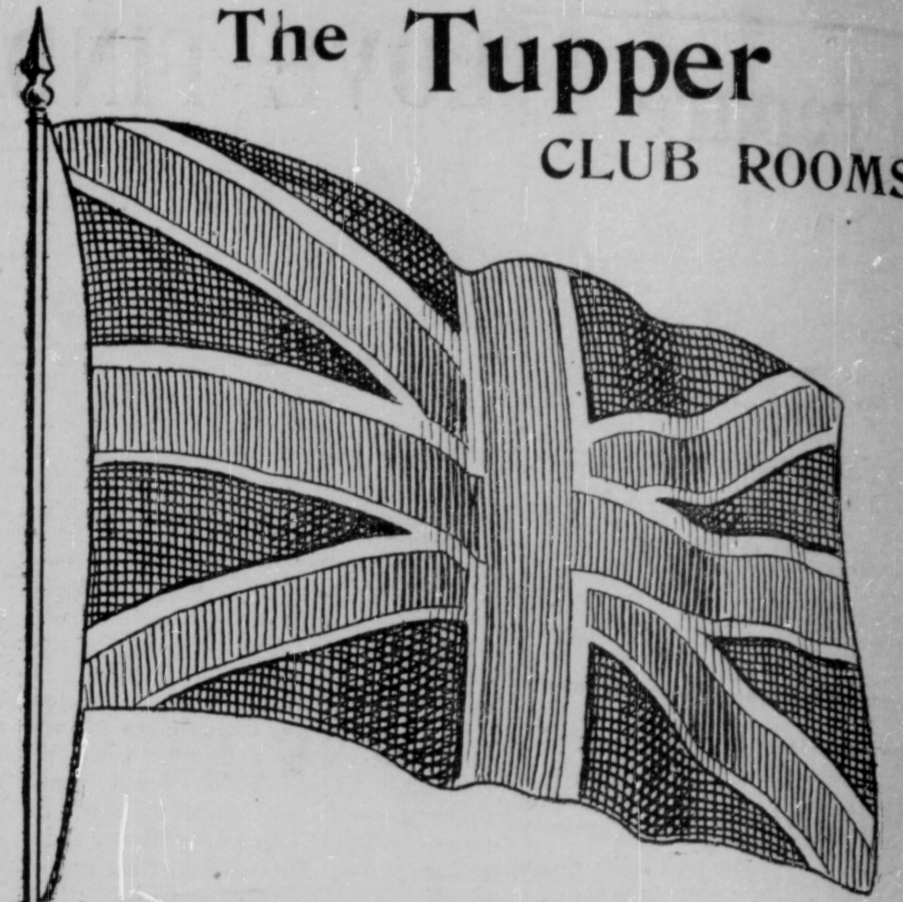
