THE TUNNEL QUESTION

DISCUSSED BY THE COMMONS.

An Excellent Speech By John McLean.

Other Island Members Speak.

Kenny and Wood Declare Themselves in Favor of the Tunnel Scheme.

SPEECH BY THE FINANCE MINISTER

OTTAWA, July 2.

Last night was an "Island night." When the House met Mr. Cockburn gave another exhibition. He read the Ottawa telegram in last Thursday's EXAMINER, and demanded that the EXAMINER should be removed from the reading rooms and the file of the House of Commons. The House roared with laughter.

John McLean then continued the debate on Mr. Davies' motion. He spoke for nearly an hour, and delivered an excellent speech, in the course of which he went over the whole case, particularly dealing with it from the commercial standpoint. He ridiculed Mr. Cockburn and his figures until the House was consulted.

Mr. McLean held the attention of the House from the start to the finish, and at the conclusion was warmly applauded and congratulated by both sides. Mr. Kenny of Halifax and Mr. Josiah Wood strongly supported the Island's case. Messrs. Pary, Yeo, Welsh, and Austin Macdonald also spoke. Hon. Mr. Foster spoke, and although he was cautious, as became a Cabinet Minister, his speech plainly showed that the Island's position is better understood and appreciated by the Government than ever before.

Mr. Cockburn also spoke, repeating his previous statements about the Island, notwithstanding the fact that Mr. Kenny told him he was all astray.

FIREMEN'S TOURNAMENT.

Islanders Very Successful.

MONCTON, July 2.

The firemen's tournament on the Athletic Grounds yesterday was very successful. The sports began about ten o'clock, in the presence of a great number of people.

The Island team took first place in the look and ladder competition, and the Island reel team was second in that event. The drivers' race was won by an Island representative, and the Islanders run a draw with Halifax in the three-legged race. McKinlayson won the officers' race, and J. McKenna took second place in the one hundred yards professional race.

A Big Suit for Libel.

NEW YORK, July 2.

The officers of the New York Life Insurance Company have instructed their counsel, William B. Hornblower to commence a suit at once against the editors, publishers and proprietors of the New York Times, for one million dollars damages for libel, and have retained as associate counsel, Messrs. Joseph H. Choate, Frederick R. Coudler and Henry Beekman.
