MONDAY

Mr. Ernie Matheson of Matheson and MacMillan, contractors, achieved an ambition he had cherished since construction began on August 23, when he piloted the first ar over the North River Causeway at 3:10 p.m. on Saturday. Three minutes later, Hon. Douglas Macmillan, Minister of Public Works and Highways, accompanied by Deputy Minister, R. G. White made a similar crossing. Congratulatory handshakes with the men on the job and expressions of appreciation followed.

The death of Reginald Heber Rogers, M.A., B.C.L., retired Prothonotary of the Supreme Court, occurred suddenly on Saturday in his 83rd year. Mr. Rogers seemed to be enjoying his usual good health until noon when he suffered a heart attack and was rushed to the P. E. Island Hospital where he passed away shortly afterwards.

A congregation which filled Zion Presbyterian morning at 11 o'clock took part in the Service of Dedication and witnessed the unveiling of the memorial window to the late Rev. G. Parkie Webster.

The service was conducted by the minister, Rev. W. H. Brown, M.A. and the sermon preached by Rev. Canon J. T. Abbott, rector of St. Paul's Anglican Church, who also read the Scripture lesson. The invocation was by Rev. E. C. Evans.

The early yesterday morning featured one of the horse barns at the Charlottetown Driving Park. The building, which was 100 feet long and 22 feet wide, was a complete loss and it took the combined efforts of the Parkdale and City Fire Departments to keep the blaze under control. Other stables near at hand were in immediate danger. The cause of the fire is not known. There were no horses housed in the barn, which has been unoccupied for several weeks.

TUESDAY

The Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board is making some changes in its administration policy in conformity with the expressed wishes of the Island potato producers who voted on November 10, said Mr. Donald A. MacDonald, Board Chairman, yesterday.

The Board Selling Agency which was responsible for the merchandising of the entire Island crop last season is being closed and its equipment disposed of. "The responsibility of selling Island seed and tubestock potatoes to the best possible advantage at all times and to maintain uniform price levels to producers throughout the province now rests upon those whose efforts during the past several months were directed against the continuation of the Board's Selling Agency," stated Mr. MacDonald.

The Potato Marketing Board will endeavour to keep producers informed as to what price levels are for Island potatoes at the chief marketing centres outside the province and what those price levels should represent in net returns to the producer.

Mr. Hodges MacEwen, Stanley Bridge, Prince Edward Island, has been announced as the winner of the Victor Lyall Goodwill Scholarship at Prince of Wales College. This scholarship, which was provided in memory of her late husband, a prominent Island physician, is given to an outstanding student in the Second Year.

Mr. MacEwen wrote entrance from Kensington High School in 1953, and was the winner of a Bell Scholarship. He led First Year at Prince of Wales College in the session of 1953-1954. Mr. MacEwen is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Donald MacEwen, Stanley Bridge.

WEDNESDAY

Brigadier G. G. K. Peake, D.S.O., E.D., has been named Commander of No. 2 Group Headquarters, Charlottetown, under the recent reorganization of Reserve Forces on a group basis, with each Military Group located in a specific geographic area.

Lieut. Col. J. A. MacDonald, E.D., of Cardigan, P.E.I., has been promoted from the rank of Major, to assume new duties under the reorganization and Lieut. Col. J. T. Davies, C.D., has also been promoted from the rank of Major for a similar purpose.

The Reserve Force, one of the several components of the Canadian Army, provides the basis for the organization of a field force in the event of emergency.

In September of this year there was an extensive reorganization of this Force based on the recommendations of a special committee, set up by the Department of National Defence.

This committee recommended that the Reserve Force be reorganized on a group basis with each Military Group located in a specific geographic area.

Dorothy Jean Molyneux, nine-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Molyneux, Southport, is in a serious condition in the Prince Edward Island Hospital as a result of an accident near her home yesterday morning. It occurred near the Kinloch Road.

In company with her two other children she had alighted from a vehicle taking her home from school. The other children remained by the front of the car while she, according to reports, ran across the road from the rear of the vehicle and into the path of an oncoming gravel truck. The latter, driven by Mr. Elmer Lloyd Gillis, Grandview, was bound for the city.

The driver of the truck endeavoured to avoid hitting the child and drove the truck into the ditch. It was badly wrecked. The child is reported to be suffering from compound fractures of the upper legs, other fractures and a neck. Last night hospital authorities said she was in fair condition. The surgeon attending her is Dr. T. A. Laidlaw.

Dorothy Jean is a member of the Sunday School class at Central Christian Church and has one sister and a brother.

THURSDAY

Hon. Robert H. Winters, Minister of Public Works in the Federal government at Ottawa, in addressing the annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Liberal Association at Summerside last evening outlined several of the projects carried out by his department in this province during the past year, and forecast early action on the construction of a new ferry for the Wood Island-Caribou route, and the airport at Charlottetown.

In the election of officers Mr. Ben Rogers of Charlottetown was elected president, succeeding Mr. W. A. Currie of Summerside, who presided at the meeting last night.

The holding of a Provincial election next spring or early next summer was predicted last night by Mr. R. R. Bell, Leader of the Opposition as he spoke during the annual meeting of the Queen's County Progressive Conservative Association at the Clover Club.

The County Association meeting was preceded by the annual meeting of the Fifth District Queens Progressive Conservative Association. Mr. Fred DeCoste presided over the district meeting and Mr. Reagh Bagnall was chairman for the gathering of the County representatives.

Mr. Angus MacLean, M.P., and Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan spoke at the County meeting.

Miss Joan Chalk, a graduate physiotherapist from the University of Queensland, arrived in the city on Tuesday night and assumed her duties at the Polio Wing of the Provincial Sanatorium yesterday morning.

Miss Chalk on graduating was attached to the staff of Brisbane General Hospital for one year, after which she was on the staff of St. Andrew's Hospital, London, Eng. for a year. This was followed by an appointment to Hornbush Hospital, near Copenhagen in Denmark. Her final overseas experience before coming to Charlottetown was gained on the staff of Galashiels Hospital in Scotland.

Miss Chalk comes to the staff of the Sanatorium on high recommendations from medical men who specialize in polio.

Associated with Miss Chalk in specialist work at the Sanatorium and throughout the Province is Miss Heather MacLean, a graduate from McGill University in physical and occupational therapy, who joined the staff during the summer.

FRIDAY

St. Dunstan's Dramatic Society received high praise from adjudicator Donald Wetmore last evening for their selection of "Antigone" as their vehicle for competition in the Provincial Drama Festival.

Presented at Parkdale Hall, under the distinguished patronage of Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. T. W. L. Prowse, last evening's production was the second in the three-day programme, and was competing with the Little Theatre offering of "The Whitehead Boy," presented Wednesday night.

Mrs. Bert Patterson, vice-president of the D. F. A. for Queens County, acted as chairman for the evening, and expressed the pleasure of the Association in having an entry from St. Dunstan's, the first time they had entered the Provincial Festival.

The following report covers the fisheries of Prince Edward Island for the period January to October, 1954, inclusive, compared with the same period for 1953.

The catch of all fish for this period was 7,529 hundred-weight more than in 1953, with an increase in value of \$6,802. The total quantity of all fish landed was 297,851 hundredweight with a value of \$2,597,693, as compared with 290,322 hundredweight taken in 1953.

Weather conditions were not as good as average, and were responsible, to some extent, for keeping the catch down. There were no very heavy storms and the loss of gear was small.

The fleet of small dragners, operating out of Souris, were responsible for the catch of haddock and plaice. A quantity of cod and hake was also landed by them. There are eleven Island owned dragners fishing at present.

Cod were plentiful along the

North Shore and the catch shows a substantial increase with a corresponding increase in value. The bulk of the cod were taken by the inshore fishermen, and seemed to be more plentiful, in deeper water, than usual.

Haddock and plaice were taken in greater quantities; almost all by the dragger fleet. A small quantity of haddock is taken by inshore fishermen in conjunction with their other ground fishing operations.

The catch of hake was small. There is little inducement for fishermen to concentrate on this fishery because of low prices.

A request that the Government take immediate steps to appoint a new slate of officers to serve on the Provincial Marketing Board, removing the authority now in the hands of the Potato Marketing Board, and that the present Potato Board be instructed to defer any request for financial support until such time as a new Board has been set up, was made to the Provincial Government yesterday in the form of a brief presented by a large delegation of potato producers headed by Mr. Reuben Large of Wilmet.

The Government was addressed by several members of the delegation, which numbered 76 and was said to be representative of potato growers from Alberton to Souris.

Premier Matheson assured them that the brief would be given full consideration.

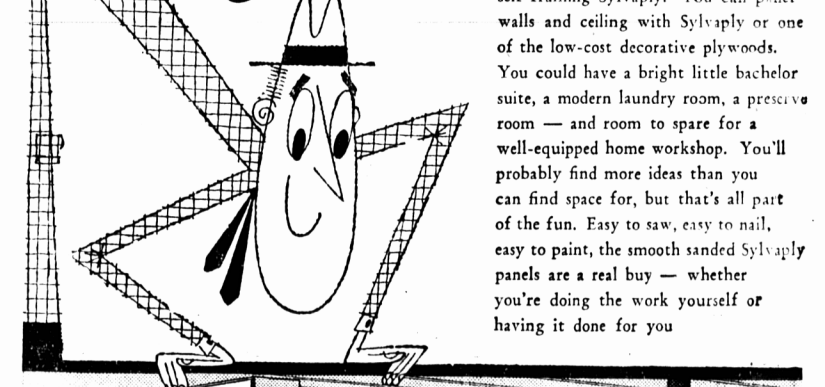
