Thoughts For Our Time

In an age so torn by anxieties and fears as our own, an age in which a past generation's dream of progress has changed into a nightmare of destructive power, it is consoling and enlightening to ponder for a few minutes the Mercy of God.

The material progress of the last generation had given us a false sense of independence. We had the idea that we could find the solutions of all our problems, that human achievement could only lead to a golden era of prosperity and peace. Such an era is not at all an impossible ideal, but its realization will only come when we admit in all humility before God, as individuals and as nations, that we are utterly dependent on Him, and that our failures, and the fears that oppress us, are the result of an ignorance which He alone can dispel and the punishment of the sins which He alone can forgive.

It is God's mercy, His infinite love in His compassion for our weakness, that will enlighten our ignorance and forgive our sins, and the punishment we are enduring as the result of our sins. We are fallible creatures, and our failings reduce us to real misery. This misery is evident in the unhappiness, the spiritual degradation of individuals. It is evident in the countless broken homes where the bright promise of married happiness has dulled to the sombre gray of a loveless existence. It is evident in the poverty, the religious persecutions, and the racial hatred of whole nations. In each case this misery is the result of sin, of offenses against God and His law.

It is this human misery that is the object of God's mercy, of His forgiving love which is waiting for us to turn to Him to find the peace which we have cast away by our offenses. Great is man's misery, but immense is the mercy of God.

This misery, this unhappiness, stems from the root of ignorance. This ignorance is both a cause and an effect. As a cause, it is the origin of many transgressions of the law of God. At the same time, ignorance is the effect of sin, which beclouds our intellects. It is for this ignorance that we especially need God's mercy; too often it is the deliberate ignorance of those who refuse to seek or acknowledge the Divine Truth which alone can guide us to the fulfillment of our purpose on earth.

And sin itself is misery. Every sin draws us further from the centre and source of happiness - God's will. God's wonderful phrase, "His will is our peace." Even in the natural order this separation of the heart from God has its serious effects. Recently the newspapers reported an address by a doctor experienced in the care of the aged. In his remarks the doctor spoke of the unhappiness he finds increasingly evident in elderly people, and he placed the blame for this, in large measure, on the lack of religion in their lives, and the resultant lack of a realization of the meaning of life that religion alone can give.

The result of sin is punishment. And all who have a religious view of life must grant that much of the anguish and misery of modern life is the punishment of sin - the sins of individuals and the sins of nations. "God is not mocked," and His justice permits the punishments of unhappiness, poverty and war to befall the individuals and nations which dare to live outside His law.

God's justice is ever tempered by His mercy, but only if we make it possible for God to exercise His mercy. The object of God's mercy is that triple misery of ignorance, sin and punishment. He will open the arms of His loving kindness if we but ask Him, ask Him as individuals and as nations. This petition must take the form of prayer and holiness of life. It is only by a humble acknowledgment before God that we have sinned, and that we are sorry for our sins, and that we stand in need of His merciful love, that we can gain that Divine mercy.
