PROFESSOR GOLDWIN SMITH has received the degree of Doctor of Civil Law from the University of Oxford.

THE Canadian Wimbledon Team, under the command of Major Tilton, leaves Quebec to-day for England.

SIX hundred and seventy-five British immigrants passed through Montreal on the 21st for the North West.

IT is said that the Quebec Government intends to impose a fishery license which is expected to yield about \$20,000 per annum.

A HORRIBLE TRAGEDY has been committed at Hamilton, Ont., by Alexander Forbes, a married man, who shot and killed his wife, from whom he had been separated for some years, and her employer, Geo. Ralston. After committing this double murder Forbes shot himself fatally.

TUESDAY last Queen Victoria attained the 45th year of her reign. The reigns of only three other English sovereigns have exceeded hers in length. They were that of Henry III, which lasted 56 years; that of Edward III, which numbered 50, and that of George III, which was the longest of all—60 years.

THE Princess Louise, accompanied by the ladies and gentlemen of her suite, left Quebec on the 21st, in the steamship "Druid," for a trip. The Governor General remains until the return of her royal highness and party in about ten days, when the whole Vice Regal party will leave for the fishing grounds on the Metapedia.

H. H. WARREN, of Rochester, continues his prizes for the disco ery of comets for the year 1882, \$200 for each new comet. He also offers \$200 for any meteoric stone found this year, which shall contain fossil remains of animal or vegetable life, thus proving the inhabitation of planets. For any meteoric stone seen to fall in the United States this year, \$50 is offered, if not less than two ounces in weight.

REV. MESSRS. BRIGHAM AND SMITH will deliver their last lecture in the Athenaeum Monday evening, June 23rd, at a quarter to 8 o'clock. Subject: "The purpose and ultimate success of the movement represented by the organization, called the Catholic Apologetic Church. A REPORT has been received in Ottawa of a horrible case of fatal burning at Lewis. The victim was a widow named Fortin, lately in the employ of Mrs. Powell, of that place. The unfortunate woman was heating some milk with a spirit lamp, when, imprudently packing the alcohol too near the lamp, it took fire in the bottle, which exploded, sending the burning liquid all over her clothing. Before the flames could be subdued the poor woman was burned alive almost to a crisp.

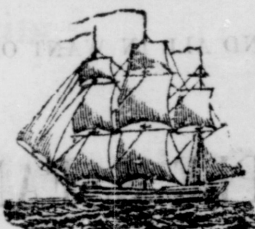
