The Maria Teresa May Yet be Saved.

BRITISH ADMIRALTY WILL TRY TO FLOAT HER.

The American Consul's Protest Against the Attempt Being Made.

NEW PROVIDENCE, Nov. 12.—The British Admiralty to take charge of the Maria Teresa as a derelict. The American consul has protested against this, of course claiming everything, less salvage.

The steamer Matella is leaving for Cat-land with customs officers and police on board.

Russia's Proposal Accepted.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 10.—Great Britain, France and Italy have accepted Russia's proposal to appoint Prince George of Greece High Commissioner of the powers in the island of Crete. The Turkish government has appealed to Germany and Austria against the proposal, but the appeal has been ineffectual.

NEW YORK, November 10.—The Herald publishes the following statement from Colonel Roosevelt, made after his election was assured:

"I am a good Republican, and I believe I can best serve the Republican party by doing everything to help it serve the State. I shall try to administer the office of Governor in the interest of the whole people.

"It is by so doing that I can best show my appreciation of the support given me by the independents and Democrats who have themselves put that welfare of the State first, declining to follow those of their leaders, who, in this crisis, either ranged themselves outright on the side of the forces of dishonesty or else supported the real contest."

PARIS, Nov. 10.—The Matin says that at a council of the admirals held yesterday it was decided to fit out all the French war vessels available, and thirty reserve ships have been ordered into commission.

TRAGEDY AT SHUBENACADIE

Killed by the Accidental Discharge of a Gun.

SHUBENACADIE, Nov. 12.—This town was startled last night by the sad news that James Irvin, blacksmith, was dead. The discharge of a gun was heard in the vicinity of his shop, but no notice of this was taken. An hour after a son of his went to the forge and found him dead beside his anvil.

Coroner Halliday, of Shubenacadie, immediately empanelled a jury, and the evidence went to show that he had been endeavoring to extract a load of powder from a muzzle-loading gun, when it discharged, entering his left temple. Death was instantaneous.

Mrs. Irvin, wife of the deceased, was buried only two weeks ago today. A family of nine small children are left.

The New Line

TORONTO, Nov. 12.—A London cable says the first steamer of the new Canadian Steamship Line will leave Liverpool on December 3rd. The trips will be fortnightly at the outset.

The sailing of the proposed line, having Milford Haven and Paspebiac as terminal ports, will commence in May.

Emperor of Germany's Visit.

MADRID, Nov. 10.—Inquiries made here concerning the proposed visit of the Emperor of Germany to Spain, show that the Spanish government have been notified that two German warships, one of them having the Emperor and Empress of Germany on board, will arrive at Cadiz on Nov. 20, but it is not yet known whether the visit is of an official character.

Approve of Salisbury's Speech.

PARIS, Nov. 10.—The newspapers of this city, notably the Gaulois and Figaro, express satisfaction at the Marquis of Salisbury's speech, delivered at the Guildhall banquet last night, which they consider as tending towards a peaceful solution of a misunderstanding and as a replacing of the Fashoda question on its proper ground.

Madman in a Palace.

Berlin, Nov. 11.—A few days ago a lunatic named Dellinger slipped into the royal castle at Stuttgart and took possession of a vacant suite of rooms. He rang the bell, bullied the servants in princely style, called for supper, wrote letters to King William of Wurtemberg and to other princes on crested paper, which he found in his apartments, and then retired to his couch, leaving his boots in the corridor to be blacked. The harmless madman, who declares he is the rightful King of Wurtemberg, was promptly handed over to the police.

France Intriguing.

LONDON, Nov. 11.—The Rome correspondent of the Daily Mail says: "It is asserted positively that Major Marchand has established communication with Emperor Menelik, of Abyssinia and that France is now intriguing with that monarch."

PUNISHMENT FOR MURDERERS

Of American Missionaries at Sierra Leone.

THIRTEEN OF THE MURDERERS WERE HANGED

The Murders Were Committed by Them Last May.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Nov. 12.—The mails from Sierra Leone, West Africa, bring news of the hanging at Kivellu of thirteen murderers of American missionaries, members of the United Brotherhood of Christ, in the Sherbro district of Sierra Leone last May. The massacre of the missionaries referred to in the foregoing dispatch grew out of the dissatisfaction of the natives with the local hut tax.

A number of chiefs rebelled and the insurrection spread through the Sherbro district where the headquarters of the missionaries of the United Brotherhood of Christ were located.

The in-urgent buried the mission house and murdered a number of missionaries among them Mr and Mrs Cain and Misses Aronura, Hatfield and Schenex.

Several of the missionaries, Mr and Mrs Bruuer, Mr and Mrs Menisall and the Misses Muller and Ward succeeded after a terrible experience, in reaching Freetown, the capital of the British Colony of Sierra Leone.

Not Pleasing to the Czar.

LONDON, Nov. 11.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Times says "The signs of Russian disenchantment with the Americans have been rendered conspicuous by the demand of annexation of the Philippines. The Russian papers openly denounce the proposal and suggest that Russia should join Germany in a refusal to acquiesce in American annexation."

Recruiting in Canada.

OTTAWA, November 10.—Information has been received that the British War Office has ordered the Hundredth Leinster Regiment. Leinster Royal Canadians, to be recruited in Canada, and that recruiting offices will shortly be opened in Ottawa, Toronto, Montreal, Halifax and other cities. The recruits will be sent down to Halifax at the expense of the British Government. Whether this is a temporary war measure or is to be a permanent arrangement is not yet known.

Denmark Makes Protest.

Berlin, Nov. 11.—The kingdom of Denmark continues to protest, through her Minister here, against the expulsion of Danes from northern Schleswig. The eviction of persons alleged to be hostile to Prussian authority—are increasing in number daily.

The International Conference.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—The Anglo-American commission held a brief session today and adjourned until next Tuesday.

That Maria Teresa Fake.

NOSSAU, New Providence, November 10.—The steamer ashore off Cat Island, supposed to be abandoned cruiser Infanta Maria Teresa, is now described as being a disabled warship flying the American flag, showing signs of having been on fire and has leaked slightly. She stranded in an exposed position on Thursday night last.

A Train Held up.

FERGUS FALLS, Mich., Nov. 10.—A great Northern railway train was held up five miles west of here tonight by eight armed robbers, who blew open a safe in the express car and got away with considerable money.

A Very Disastrous Fire.

JOLIET, Ill., Nov. 10.—An overturned kettle of grease caught fire in the Great Western Tinplate Co's mill today. Owing to the hurricane blowing the plant was in ashes in half an hour. The plant employed 275 skilled workmen. Loss \$120,000.
