Montague Town Council Meeting

*Routine business was transacted last evening at the regular monthly meeting of the Montague Town Council. The meeting was presided over by the Mayor B. H. Yeo. Present were Councillors Hessian, Nicholson and Greene. Following the reading of the minutes the bills were read and ordered paid. Correspondence was also read. Considerable discussion regarding improving the dumping system took place and a number of dump signs and danger posts were reported in order. There being no further business the meeting adjourned.

Opposes Tax

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settled in 1931 at \$3,000.00. Due to variations in the tax rate the grant got as high as \$4875.00 in the years 1945 to 1950 inclusive. In 1951 it dropped to \$4,500.00 and in 1952 it dropped to \$3,525.00 - an amount still substantially in excess of the original grant. Mr. Gordon went on to say that it had been brought to his attention that when the Charlottetown was constructed it was hoped that it would pay its way, but this had not happened. However because of the hope the grant in lieu of taxes had some justification. The president of the company also noted that it was pertinent to call attention to the fact that at the time of the original grant nothing was being paid on operating property of the railway here. At the same City Council meeting last night there was read a letter from Mr. M. MacLaren, Tax Commissioner, Montreal, replying to Mr. George Abbot and stating that a bill for taxes had been received concerning the Charlottetown. He stated that an assessed valuation of \$862,300 is shown with current taxes of \$715.25, plus arrears of \$16,739.05. Mr. MacLaren pointed out that the property is actually owned by "Her Majesty in right of Canada" and is therefore exempt from taxation by statute. He said that the position of the railway is simply that of a manager engaged by the Crown to operate the hotel by virtue of an Entrusting Order. He said that as the tax rate had been set for this year he was prepared to make a grant based on a valuation of \$150,000, but could not pay anything additional.

Fishermen At

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are of practically no help in lobster conservation, a fact which will probably reverse the opinion of many. However, he pointed out that it was a good regulation, and would probably remain. He stated that the most important regulation governing lobster conservation was size limit. Lobsters were non-migratory, he said, and were subject to the most intensive fishing, and as a consequence natural productivity was losing to such intensive extraction with the result that many areas were almost wholly populated by lobsters of the smaller group. By increasing the size limit, he said, a larger number of good size lobsters would remain on the grounds which in one year would increase up to 50% in weight, thereby leading more to market size lobsters with a consequent increase in revenue to the fishermen. He further stated that this increase in canner size had come about as a result of representations made by a large majority of Maritime fishermen who realized the instant need of lobster conservation. It was true, he thought, that P.E.I. was in opposition, but felt that with a clearer picture of the need, they would be in agreement. It was unfortunate that this opposition had not been presented earlier, he thought, since the regulation might have received more consideration last October when the government had more time to consider it, than at the present time when the season will open in about two weeks. No representation from all the fishermen of P.E.I. had been received up to the present, he said, and he felt that it might be somewhat late to effect a change in the regulation. However, he was sure that in the long run the new regulation would prove more advantageous to the fishermen, in that although they would lose a small amount this year, the greater number of market size lobsters in two years and henceforth would outweigh the present loss in financial returns, since canners sell at approximately 20 cents, while markets sell at approximately 30 cents. He admitted that the problem of enforcing the regulation was a paramount issue, and felt that the honesty of the fishermen themselves would be the best method of protecting and developing their own industry. He stated that one method employed was a minimum fine on each short lobster taken, but this also, he explained was not devoid of difficulties. Following Mr. Wilder's speech, the chairman, Mr. John MacNeill, Beach Point, opened the meeting to questions. Comments Fishermen - Rev. William Simpson, of the Extension Department, St. Dunstan's University, commended the fishermen of the area for the large representation present, and urged all fishermen to support the association to the fullest extent. He also urged endorsement of the new regulation, feeling that it would be of greater advantage to the fishermen in yielding more returns in future years. He strongly emphasized the need of stricter enforcement of the regulations, but said that the fishermen themselves must assist their own cause. Several others gave brief speeches
